Village Emergency Services Manage COVID-19 **Emergency Response**

The Elm Grove Emergency Services, Police, Fire and EMS along with the Village Manager, have been meeting on a daily basis to review CDC, State, WHO, and County Emergency Management coronavirus releases and directives. Our Team has been strategizing and planning to provide uninterrupted services to our residents and businesses.

In order or keep our responders healthy, we have limited access to the Police and Fire Departments to emergency providers only, and suspended station tours and public relation events. Our Police, EMS and Fire Dept. personnel may arrive at your call-for-service wearing varying levels of Personal Protective Equipment from a N95 face mask to full turnout gear and SCBA air masks depending on the nature of the call.

To protect our responders and those we serve we are disinfecting the Police and Fire Departments facilities, apparatus and equipment on a regular basis and after calls-for-service. The Village Hall is also being treated daily for the protection of the front office staff and the public who we serve.

Village Update

The COVID-19 Pandemic made March a very busy month for the Village of Elm Grove staff and Board members. The public health needs of employees and of Village residents moved to center stage and impact every aspect of Village operations.

In order to comply with state and federal guidelines and to protect the health of our staff, we have suspended all recreation programs and closed the library. The playground in the park is also closed, as it is not practical to properly sanitize the equipment after each use. The Recycling Center at the Village Department of Public Works yard is closed to protect our very limited staff. All these closures create temporary inconvenience, but are necessary.

We are blessed to presently have a healthy staff which allows us to continue necessary Village Services. All public safety functions are fully staffed. Public Works department activities, except the recycling yard, are continuing including normal spring brush pickup. Remember, our Public Works Department employees also serve as daytime Fire and EMS responders.

The Spring election on April 7 will also create special challenges of keeping people separated and the facilities properly cleaned. The Village Board is strongly urging all voters to take advantage the option to use an Absentee Ballot through the mail.

Wisconsin 'Safer at Home' Order Issued

(MADISON) Governor Tony Evers in late March directed Department of Health Services (DHS) Secretary-designee Andrea **Palm** to issue a Safer at Home order that will remain in effect until 8 a.m., Friday April 24, 2020, or until a subsequent order is issued.

"I know the COVID-19 outbreak has been difficult and has disrupted the lives of people across our state... Each and every one of us has to do our part to help slow the spread of COVID-19 so we can flatten the curve to ensure our doctors, nurses, and healthcare workers have the opportunity to do their important work..." Evers said.



You can obtain a ballot at the following website: http://www.myvote.wi.gov and following the simple instructions. If you have any difficulties contact **Mary Stredni**, Elm Grove Village Clerk, at mstredni@elmgrovewi.org or by telephoning (262) 782-6700. Absentee ballots are mailed to you promptly after your request. Complete the ballot promptly and mail it back to the Village. All Absentee Ballots must be received by April 7 to be counted in the election.

In-person voting is planned for Tuesday, April 7 between the hours of 7 a.m. and 8 p.m. at Village Hall. Compliance with state and federal guidance will require adequate separation of members of the public and staff and constant sanitizing activities. It may be necessary to use multiple separate rooms to accommodate the vote. In-person voting is likely to be more time consuming and difficult than normal elections. I urge everyone to vote through the mail by Absentee Ballot.

The Village of Elm Grove Emergency Services are closely monitoring the state and federal requirements and guidelines to manage and limit human exposure to the COVID-19 virus. The new requirements may prompt emergency responders to be using emergency personal protection equipment when responding to calls for service. Protective actions are necessary to protect the EMS employees and the wider public. Elm Grove has been lucky this far to have only a couple of diagnosed COVID-19 cases and we can keep it that way if we all practice social distancing, frequent hand washing and limit our number of contacts with others.

While it is not possible to determine when local activities will return to normal, we do know that all the temporary lifestyle changes prompted by the coronavirus will end. Right now, all our efforts are to get through the month of April and if we all make enough progress most restrictions will be lifted. It is, however, likely that large gatherings like our Memorial Day Parade may not be allowed this year.


Under the heading of life must go on, there are several other items to mention this month.


More people being at home and walking for exercise is likely the reason for an increase in the number of complaints and concerns over **pedestrian safety**. Pedestrians should always walk on the left side of the road if there is not a pathway (facing traffic.) Bicycles should follow the same rules as motorized traffic. Nighttime visibility is also a concern. It is very hard to see pedestrians on roadways without lighting. The best protection is to wear a reflective vest or other reflective apparel.

More people at home and better weather has also increase dog walkers and along with that come the **complaints about dog owners** not cleaning up after their pets. Please, not picking up the feces of your pet is just rude. You also can be ticketed for failure to clean up after your dog.

The Village Board approved a resolution designating the Village a **Bee City Affiliate** at the request of the Village Beautification Committee. This action recognizes that bees and other pollinators have experienced significant population declines due to a combination of habitat loss, poor nutrition, pesticides.

Past Times: I REMEMBER...

Local Visits of Presidential Candidates

My March 2020 Past Times column about John F. Kennedy's 1960 campaign visits to southeastern Wisconsin prior to the April presidential primary produced some interesting remembrances from readers. I had planned to focus this month's effort on past public appearances of various presidential hopefuls in Elm Grove, but the recollections of readers have provided some interesting additional stories of their "first person" encounters.

My friend Gary Fischer of Elm Grove told me that he, his brother John and their friend Jim met John F. Kennedy on his final campaign swing of the preprimary race that March. Then residents of Glendale, the three youngsters had learned that JFK was to appear outside of the Bayshore mall. Intrigued at the prospect of meeting a celebrity, they pedaled their bikes to the mall and shook hands with the future President outside the front doors of Boston Store. Campaign aides were distributing buttons and bumper stickers to the crowd and the boys were able to snag a couple. Gary recalls that Jim asked Senator Kennedy to autograph the back of his, which JFK dutifully did. Jim later sold it to John for \$1.00, proud of his profit for the day. Gary reports that the signed sticker went missing years ago, but he still has the unsigned one.

In noting past White House aspirants who campaigned in Elm Grove, I had long been aware of the visit by California Governor Earl Warren in 1952. Although he would be defeated in the April primary by Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio, he was named as Chief Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court in 1953 by new **President Dwight D. Eisenhower**. The month prior to the Badger state's primary found him shaking hands and talking to voters at Ramstack's tavern at 13225 Watertown Plank Road (now O'Donoghue's Irish Pub). My friend Tom Ramstack remembers seeing photographs of Gov. Warren holding his older brother **Charlie** on his lap. Tom and Charlie's grandfather Joe and their father Joe, Jr. were active in local politics and involved in the county Republican Party, which probably accounts for the arrangements leading to Gov. Warren's appearance. Taverns, especially in rural communities, were viewed as neighborhood gathering places in those days and also a good place to campaign if a candidate wished to meet the voters. This was particularly true of areas

settled by German and Irish immigrants and their descendants, as was the case in Elm Grove.

In asking Tom Ramstack to tell me again the details of this story, I got more than I had bargained for. Tom suggested another story I had not previously known. In 1964, former U.S. Congressman Glenn Davis was seeking to reclaim his old congressional seat. He had scheduled a campaign stop at the Mayfair mall in Wauwatosa and asked supporter Joe Ramstack to bring along some volunteers to distribute pamphlets and campaign cards. Joe brought along his sons Tom and Charlie, but they were told they could not solicit votes on mall property, so they had to retreat to the south side of North Avenue. With them was a Michigan congressman who had come to endorse Davis and help him campaign, Gerald R. Ford. Cut off from most Mayfair patrons, Ford asked the teenagers if they'd like an ice cream. After an affirmative response, he took them down the street to the **Boy** Blue ice cream stand and bought them cones. Congressman Ford, of course, would become the 38th President of the United States in 1974 when Richard M. **Nixon** resigned the presidency in the midst of the Watergate scandal. (I never knew Tom's story before preparing this article, perhaps because, already following politics, I favored Davis' opponent in that race, James P. Buckley of Waukesha. Davis trounced him that November, but I still have my old Buckley button.)

The last presidential candidate that I know of to make a public appearance in Elm Grove was former Minnesota Governor Harold E. Stassen who spoke in the community room at the Elm Grove village hall on March 27, 1980, just five days before the Wisconsin primary on April first. I remember it well because I had arranged it. I was state chairman of Wisconsin Citizens for Stassen that year and set up interviews and campaign appearances for him from Milwaukee to La Crosse, and points in between. The Elm Grove speech was a natural, since the former Governor had some old friends in the village, including Loyal Eddy, who had been a Stassen delegate to the 1948 G.O.P. convention, and **Joe Dries**, who had known him when he worked as a speech writer in the Eisenhower White House in the 1950s. I had first met and corresponded with the Governor in 1968.

Although Stassen's name today is primarily associated with his multiple bids for the presidency, he had a long and illustrious career in public life which should not be forgotten. Elected in 1938 at age 31 as the youngest governor in U.S. history and re-elected twice thereafter, he resigned Minnesota's governorship in 1943 to enter active duty in World War II. As a Commander, U.S. Navy, he served as assistant chief of staff to Admiral "Bull" Halsey in the Pacific theater, decorated three times and awarded six major battle stars. At the war's end, he led a daring raid on a Japanese POW camp which freed U.S. prisoners, including USMC Col. "Pappy" Boyington, leader of the famed Black Sheep squadron.

In the post-war era, Stassen took a post as president of the University of Pennsylvania and, later, as president of the American Baptist Convention. In 1953, he joined the Eisenhower administration as Mutual Security advisor to the President. His continued presidential campaigns were simply efforts to place before the voters issues and solutions that he felt would otherwise be neglected by the other candidates. His speech that March evening to Elmbrook area voters centered on such concepts. I especially remember his conversations with Brookfield East social studies instructor George R. Hunt about America's proper role in

foreign affairs and with World War I veteran Harvey J. Celley about the Berlin Wall and the continuing Cold War with the Soviet Union. My most lasting impression of the evening is, however, the Governor's graciousness in sitting down with a young student reporter from Brookfield East High School's Spartan Banner newspaper after the meeting to patiently answer her questions about presidential politics. "That young lady is the future", he explained to me later. "She will carry her thoughts into the next century." When I last saw Governor Stassen at his 90th birthday celebration in 1997 in Minneapolis, I was surprised that he still remembered that interview.

As far as I know, Harold Stassen remains the last presidential aspirant to speak in Elm Grove, although several others have campaigned nearby in Brookfield and Waukesha. If *News-Independent* readers know of further examples, I would be delighted to know of them, and amend the record accordingly. If "all politics is local" as the old adage goes, then Elm Grove's contributions to national affairs are as worth noting as those of other communities.

"Until Differences Make No Difference...."

Pilgrim Park & Wisconsin Hills Students Take the Lead to Stop Bullying

(BROOKFIELD) "Differences: Gotta Have 'em!," a unique presentation by teens, for teens, that motivates young people to treat others with dignity and respect, was held at Pilgrim Park Middle School and Wisconsin Hills Middle School, on Tuesday, March 3. Members of the ARCh Youth Team (Association for the Rights of Citizens with handicaps) conduced the presentation for the 6th and 7th grades.

"Differences: Gotta Have 'em!" featured skits, music and personal stories, using "positive peer pressure" to encourage students to accept others' differences and to not be a bystander when they see bullying.

8th grader **Pranav Sundararaman**, a member of the ARCh Youth Team, was the impetus behind bringing the presentation to these schools. Pranav joined the ARCh Youth Team like his older brother **Atal**, a senior at Brookfield East High School, because he believes everyone deserves to be treated with dignity and respect, and wants his peers to hear the message.

Pilgrim Park Principal **Kelly Szesterniak** said, "The most exciting aspect of this project is that it is student-led; Pilgrim Park is strongly committed to promoting respect in the educational environment, and we believe that our students need to be actively involved in achieving this goal. We



commend Pranav for working hard to bring this program here."

According to the U.S. Department of Justice, in the year 2014 more than 160,000 students missed school every day due to their fear of being bullied. Facts About Garlic Mustard

By Nicci Sternitzky

An invasive species is defined as a nonnative plants, animals, or pathogens rapidly takes over a new location and alters the ecosystem. The Wisconsin DNR currently has 63 plants on the restricted invasive species plants list, one of which is garlic mustard, or *Alliaria petiolata*. This plant is a biennial that was introduced to the U.S. in the 1860s. In Europe there are 30 species of insects that attack the leaves, stems, and seeds specialists herbivores that use it as a food source, but there are no such enemies in North America to keep this noxious weed in check.

Given that each plant can disperse 600-7900 seeds that will remain viable for up to 7 years in the soil, and that plant exerts negative chemically mediated effects on nearby plants and microbes, its dense growth will replace a native woodland in less than 10 years. These effects are more notable the higher an area's deer population is as deer won't eat garlic mustard, but help spread the seeds.

So, what can a homeowner do? The first step is just being aware, knowing how to recognize it, and perform periodic surveillance to remove any plants before they set seed. Helping to spread the word

to neighbors and friends is crucial as well. The plant looks slightly different its first year versus its second year, but it is still quite easy to identify with very few native look-alikes (toothwort).

As anyone who has ever tackled a patch of garlic mustard can attest to, it's very satisfying to pull after a soaking rain in the spring. One bonus is that all those plants are edible and nutritious (assuming no herbicide use).

Proper disposal is ideally in paper bags placed into the trash as composting cannot eliminate seed viability.



What Documents Will Your Family Need?

After you pass away, your surviving family members will need to gather many of your personal and financial records in order to settle your affairs. Keeping these documents organized and accessible is important for both you and your loved ones. Your filing system doesn't need to be elaborate, just organized. Your family will need the following documents when the time comes:

- List of Funeral Instructions and prepaid funeral contracts
- Last Will and Testament
- Revocable/Living Trust agreements
- Prenuptial/postnuptial agreements
- VA File Number, Military discharge papers
- Birth certificate and Death Certificate
- Marriage license or Divorce Decree
- Medicare Card/Health Insurance Card
- Bank statements, checkbooks, check registers, certificates of deposits
- Safe deposit rental agreement and keys
- Deeds, mortgages, leases, homeowner's insurance information

- Stock and bond certificates and account statement
- Pension, IRA, retirement statements/ current employee benefit information
- Life insurance policies or statements
- Last several years' income tax returns
- · Documentation regarding any debts, such as auto loans or credit cards

It is not necessary to give copies of these documents to anyone during your lifetime, but they should be easily accessible in the event of your death. The information should also be kept reasonably current.

"Our team is working around the clock to address COVID-19. This threat is serious, and we should treat it that way," Evers said.

Under the Safer at Home order, Wisconsinites are able to:

- Perform tasks essential to maintaining health and safety, such as obtaining medicine or seeing a doctor;
- Get necessary services or supplies for themselves or their family or household members, such as food and supplies, pet food, and supplies necessary for staying at home;
- Care for a family member in another household;
- · Care for older adults, minors, dependents, people with disabilities, or other vulnerable persons.

"I want to give you an update on the tough decisions we have made since the start of the outbreak," Evers noted in a March 27 media release:

• Issued an emergency order suspending utility disconnections,

- assessing late fees, removed any administrative barriers for customers establishing or reestablishing utility
- Directed the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction to suspend administrative rules and grant schools flexibility during the public health emergency;
- Requested FEMA assistance in obtaining crucial protective medical supplies for our first responders;
- Won approval from the U.S. Small Business Administration for lowinterest federal disaster loan access for small businesses affected by COVID-19.

Governor Evers said that he hopes that everyone will continue to follow these simple steps to prevent illness and avoid exposure:

- Frequent, thorough handwashing with soap and water
- Covering coughs and sneezes
- Avoiding touching your face
- Stay home as much as possible






