Driver Cards for People Who Are Undocumented Belong in the Proposed State Budget

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The School Sisters of Notre Dame are members of the WISDOM organization: www.wisdomwisconsin.org and Sisters are on the Immigration Task Force.)

Driver Cards for people who don't have proper documents is not just good policy: it has fiscal impact and included in the state budget. Fees from cards issued by the DOT generate income. The state's Division of Executive Budget analysis determined in 2015 that allowing for driver cards will increase state revenue by \$3,000,000. Additionally, it will boost the broader economy by purchase of car insurance and other related expenses.

The Real ID Act took effect in 2007. Because driver's licenses are now federal identifications, they now require social security numbers. Since that time thousands without documents haven't been able to obtain a driver's license and have no legal way to drive or purchase insurance. This causes untold suffering and financial burden: loss of income from not

being able to get to jobs; being afraid to drive children to doctor appointments; cars impounded for driving without a license; being deported for having done so.

There is no reason for this. It is cruel. People without documents drive the economy in Wisconsin. They work, even without proper documentation. Undocumented immigrants in Wisconsin paid an estimated \$101.1 million in state and local taxes in 2018. People without documents provide the unseen labor that makes life more enjoyable. They are 11 million strong in this country. Their U.S. born children are growing up, and watching, and they will be voting.

Members of the Joint Finance Committee should do the right thing. They should make sure Driver Cards stays in the 2021-23 budget.

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St. Mary's Orphanage

In June 1859, an infant named **Mary Ryan** was the first child admitted to St. Mary's Orphanage in Elm Grove, Wisconsin. Her mother died in childbirth and her father died shortly after. The orphanage, operated by the School Sisters of Notre Dame, housed and educated hundreds of girls until it closed in 1940.

St. Mary's Orphanage only accepted girls and there were rarely more than 50 children at any given time. Many of the girls who came to the orphanage had lost both parents, but others had at least one living parent. In these instances, a single parent would place their daughter with the Sisters because they were unable to find anyone to care for the child while they were at work.

There is little information about what life was like at the orphanage prior to the 1920s, except for the occasional mention in the convent chronicle. In April 1877 there was a smallpox outbreak in the orphanage. The sick were separated from the healthy

and the slits in the sickroom doors were stuffed with rags. Only Sisters who had smallpox were allowed to work as nurses and little bags filled with camphor were worn to prevent the spread of the disease. Despite these precautions, 18 children, two babies, two candidates and two Sisters got sick. Everyone recovered, except for one of the infants.

Accounts from girls who lived at the orphanage in the 1920s and 1930s describe structured lives that were regulated by prayer, school, housework and play. The girls wore matching dresses, all had the same Buster Brown haircut and each was given a number which was sewn into all of her clothes.

The girls attended Mass daily and school during the week. The rest of their time was filled with chores and play. The girls did a variety of chores around the orphanage, including cleaning, working in the kitchen, laundry, ironing, helping on the farm, sorting apples, darning socks,

The younger girls turn in earlier — whilst our High school Students have longer hours — but 9:30 finds them all enroute to bed.

Saturday's Routine is somewhat varied — we have no regular Daily order as each Saturday brings different duties and with them different hours. On Saturdays we rise an hour later and retire after "Perpetual Help" Devotions which is usually 7:30. We are happy to—for Saturday is a hard day. It's wash day, mangling day — ironing day and extra cleaning day.

Sunday finds us up at 6:40 and in the Chapel for Holy Communion at 7:15. After breakfast we have High Mass, Sermon and Benediction at 8:30, the 2nd and 4th Sunday we have vespers at 4:00 p.m. From 10:00-11:00 we have study period, the rest of the day is ours. We have Sodality Meeting—Mission Prospect Works, etc.

They hold meetings the first Sunday of each month preceded by the recitation of the Blessed Virgin's Office. They have their Communion that same Sunday. Members led in by banner and wearing the medal. The 3rd Sunday of month they sponsor some social activity for the Sisters of the Marianum members are all H. S. S. and 7 and 8th grade girls, their principal feast is the Feast of the Immaculate Conception on which day they have reception into the Sodality. St. Agnes is the second patron. The officers and others attend the regional meetings of Sodalities in Milwaukee.

GUARDIAN ANGEL SOCIETY

Members—all 3, 4, 5, 6 grades who have made their first Holy Communion. Second Sunday is G. A. Sunday—lead in with banner wearing badges. Meetings also held. Members take charge of the entertainment of girls for different occasions.

HAND MAIDS

4th Sunday of the month. All girls are members. They keep Vigil before the Blessed Sacrament on Holy Thursday. The fourth Sunday of the month they take turns in Sentinel Duty from 10:00 to 6:00 p.m.

Birthdays are celebrated once a month. The hand maids take it upon themselves to entertain the groups among themselves. All Saints Day is a big day for all the girls as they all have Name day on that day.

OUT-DOOR ACTIVITIES

Among the out-door activities we count tennis, roller skating, baseball, croquet. Hikes are also very frequent. Sand boxes, swings, teeter totters are among the playground equipments. Once a week if possible we go to the lake for a swim. This is always a big day as it means the packing of dinner and supper lunch, a long ride in the truck, swimming, wading and lots of other fun.

The first week of vacation we begin our out-door life which means meals in the open. Breakfast, dinner and supper are taken in our out-door dining room. A screened pavilion is on our playgrounds. Meals are brought from the main kitchen via the coaster also our water for dishwashing. Rain or shine finds us outside as we have more than one pavilion under which we seek shelter. Our sewing and mending is done outside too. The girls take turns in helping in the garden, hot house and all around.

During the winter they go sleigh riding, ice skating and out for brisk hikes. Indoors—they have ping pong, volley ball, bad minton, hop scotch, etc. The little ones have their doll-buggies, play house, etc. Different games for both in and out-of-doors—progressive games, table games.

They also have quite a nice library and this last year we've been trying to open class room library

running errands and even operating the switchboard. Sunday was the only chore-free day.

The family room was outfitted as a playroom with games and toys. In the evening, the girls would gather in their pajamas to listen to stories. Four times a year they were shown a movie. There was also a playhouse, a swing set, slide and tennis court on the grounds.

The Sisters found ways to make things special for the children. In the summers, the girls spent time at **Archbishop Samuel Stritch's** summer home on Okauchee Lake and in the winter, the girls would take sleigh rides. The Sisters especially went out of their way to make Christmas special by decorating a large tree in the family room and laying out gifts for each girl.

In 1923, the orphanage at Elm Grove was licensed under the name Guardian Angels Orphanage. At the same time it became affiliated with the Catholic Social

Welfare Bureau, which meant that it fell under the direction of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee.

In 1940, the Archdiocese consolidated orphanages and the children at Guardian Angels to other orphanages, boarding houses or home to relatives. The last four girls left Elm Grove on August 16 and the orphanage was officially closed.

Sister Eustace Roy, who worked at the orphanage for several years, wrote the following: "The dispersion was painful. The social worker took some to their destination. Some were taken by me. Day by day the number grew smaller until no one was left. Once settled in their new home the girls were happy. By the end of June, 1940, no children could be heard at play, no children's voices could be heard in the choir. We missed them, of course, but the change was beneficial for them."

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A Reflection: How I Became a Sister

I became a certified nursing assistant after high school. I worked at the hospital on the orthopedic unit. I belonged to a prayer group for college age people. One evening we were discussing what we wanted to do with our lives. I shared that I wanted to help people, maybe as a missionary. The sister in charge of the group said there were lay missionaries. Then she looked at me and asked, "Why don't you become a sister?" I looked at her and said, "Me a nun? Yah right!" I thought to myself, "No way!"

I went home that night and prayed. "God, I want your will for my life, but in this I have to say no." I couldn't get this thought out of my mind so I talked with another sister. She told me there was a

weekend gathering for women thinking about becoming sisters. It was the next weekend. I told her I had to work that weekend. She encouraged me to see if I could trade weekends with someone. I went home and again prayed. "God, I'll ask one person to work for me. If she says yes, I'll go. If not forget it." I went to work the next day and asked Rita if she could trade weekends to work with me. She said, "I'd love to." I was shocked. So, I went to the gathering for women interested in being sisters. It was held at the motherhouse in Mequon, Wisconsin. I enjoyed it and thought I could do this.

The rest is history. I became a sister in 1987. I am so happy I did.

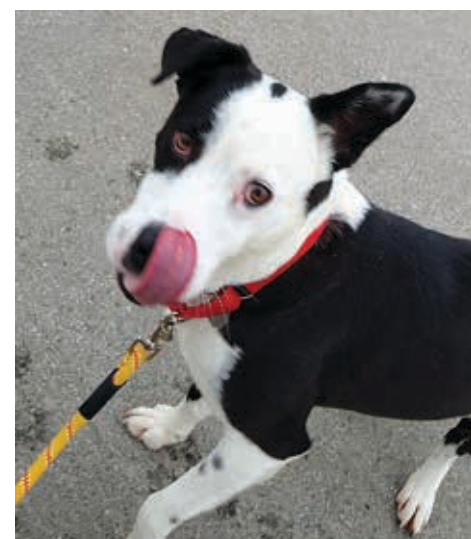

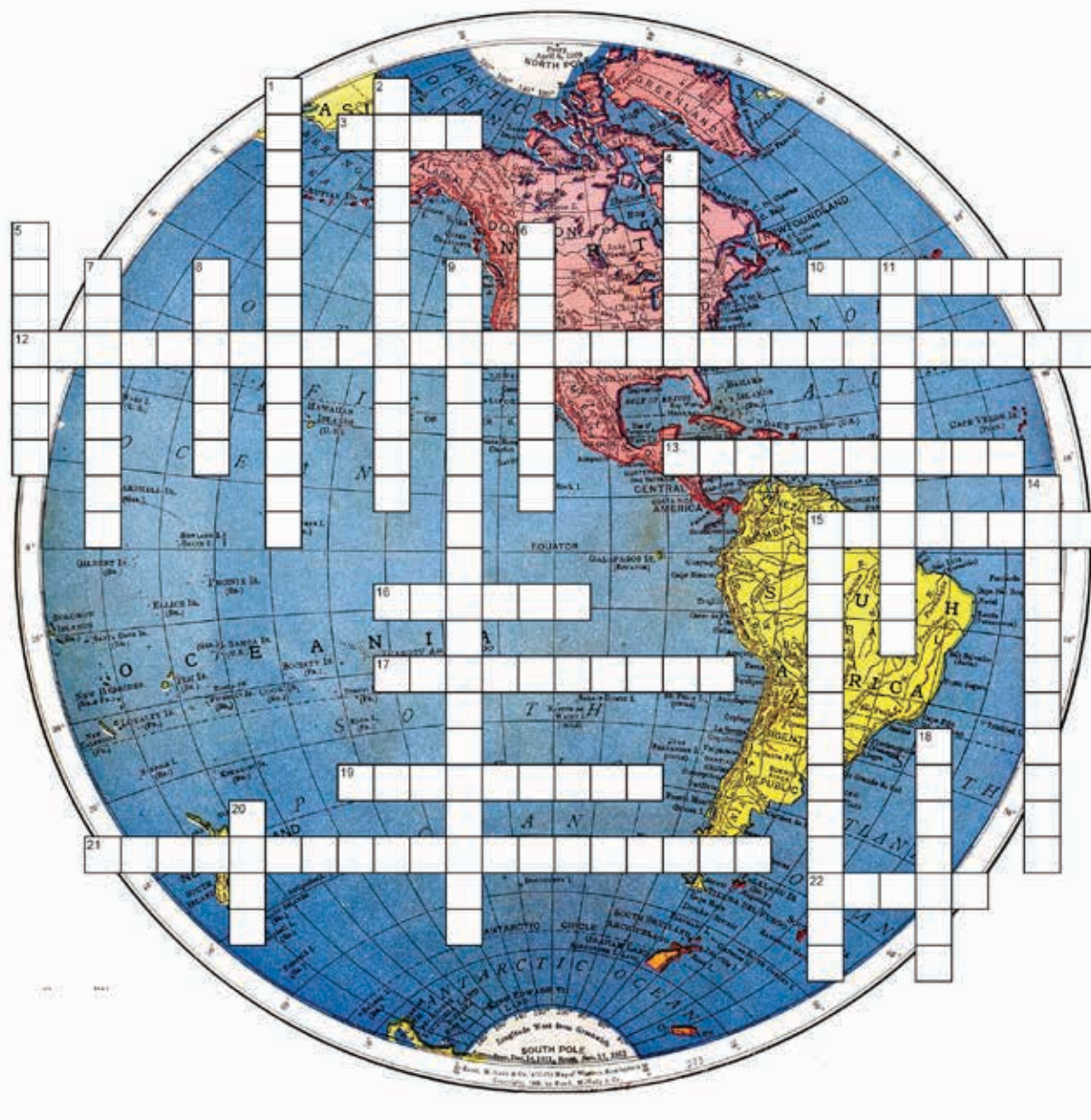

Estate Planning: Common Revocable Trust Mistakes

The revocable trust, also known as the “living trust” has long been an important option in estate planning. It can greatly simplify the management of your assets in the event of incapacity as well as the settling of your financial affairs after you pass away. It is crucial, however, that the trust be executed and administered correctly. Common mistakes include:

1. Assuming that the trust protects your assets from creditors: During your lifetime, your revocable trust is an extension of you and, as such, is just as liable for your debts as you are personally. This includes any costs of long-term care. The trust is equally responsible for any legitimate debts upon your death as well.

2. Not funding the trust: Simply executing a revocable trust is not enough. Once the trust has been completed, it must also be funded. This process involves coordinating the assets with the trust by either titling the asset into the name of the trust or naming the trust as the beneficiary to receive the assets upon your death. This is particularly important for any assets outside of Wisconsin. Neglecting this step could result in a probate proceeding or even undermine the estate plan entirely.

3. Improperly funding the trust: Some assets should never be titled to the

trust. Instead, the beneficiary designations should be coordinated with the trust, which may require specialized language. However, in many instances the best, most effective option may be to not coordinate them with the trust at all. This is particularly true of retirement accounts. The process of funding the trust should be done under the guidance of an estate planning attorney or an experienced financial professional.

4. Not naming enough alternates: Your estate plan should address not only the immediate future but also the long term. Your trust may not be administered until well into the future and your successor trustee(s) may no longer be able to serve in that capacity. Do you have enough alternates named? If not, a court proceeding may be necessary to address the situation.

5. Not reviewing the trust. Your trust should be reviewed upon any major life change. However, even the simple passage of time creates a need to review the plan. Your trust and the funding of the trust should be reviewed every five years or so to ensure that it all remains properly coordinated. You may have moved, changed banks or brokerage firms, or you may have even retired. Your life is a work in progress and your trust plan needs to be one as well.

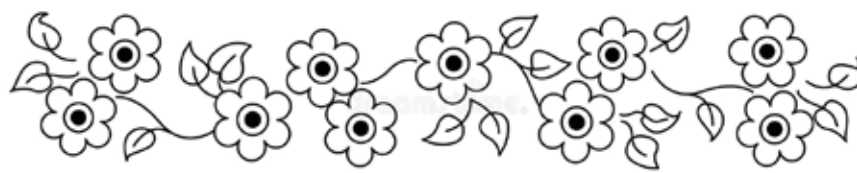

There are three paths to becoming a Presidential Scholar. Most students are selected based on their broad academic achievement and high scores on either the SAT or ACT. Approximately 20 students are also selected based on their abilities in the fine arts such as visual arts, performing arts or creative writing and 20 more qualify based on their accomplishments in career and technical education fields. Application to the program is by invitation only.

Perelman and Singh are among only 82 candidates from Wisconsin in the running to be Presidential Scholars this year.

A panel of educators will select 600 semifinalists and the Commission on Presidential Scholars, appointed by the President, will select finalists. The U.S. Department of Education will announce up to 161 Presidential Scholars this spring.

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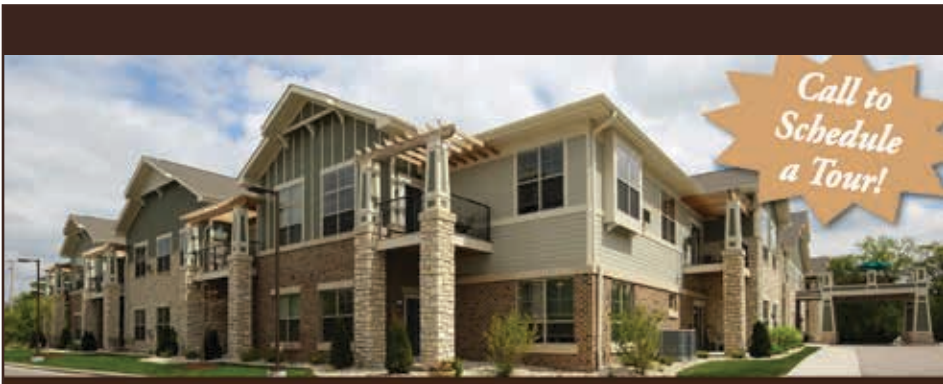
