### New Elm Grove Police Officer Appointed

Officer Paul Weber joined the Elm Grove Police Department on February 20, 2023, and is currently assigned to patrol. Office Weber has approximately 18 years of law enforcement experience, as well as 8 years prior military experience with the United States Airforce, where he completed deployments to both Afghanistan and Iraq.

### Waukesha County Board of Supervisors

I am a proud graduate of the Elmbrook School District and have lived nearly my entire life in Waukesha County. I chose to start a family here because I believe, as my parents and grandparents did before me, there is no better place to call home. That is why it is a privilege to be appointed to the Waukesha County Board to represent the Village of Elm Grove and part of the City of Brookfield.

The Waukesha County Board of Supervisors is a 25-member legislative body that sets policies through ordinances and resolutions and makes decisions about how to spend more than \$100 million of your tax dollars. I believe local government should be administered efficiently; exercise accountability, restraint, and fiscal responsibility; and adhere to the rule of law.

I am excited to get to work this month on behalf of District 8. I will be serving on two important County Board committees: Health and Human Services (HHS) and Judiciary and Law Enforcement (JLE). These two committees oversee the most essential functions of county government and account for 65% of tax dollars sent to Waukesha County each year.

HHS and JLE work hand in hand tackling some of the most pressing issues facing the county, including the fentanyl crisis and mental health. Unfortunately, these are topics with which I am all too familiar and from which no family or community is immune. In my work with the Wisconsin Department of Justice I managed a statewide prescription drug abuse prevention campaign and developed an opiate abuse prevention training curriculum that was used nationally. My background in criminal justice issues will help me contribute to the many successful programs the county already has in place.

Waukesha County was the first county in the state to declare fentanyl a community health crisis. Waukesha County Health & Human Services has launched its 'One Pill Can Kill' media campaign, in partnership with the U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency, to educate the

public on the dangers of fentanyl. The County Board has a unique opportunity to build upon this campaign and reduce the impact of the opioid epidemic in Waukesha County.

Last year, Waukesha County Health & Human Services partnered with the Sheriff's Department to create a program to address the significant amount of time law enforcement spends on mental health calls. The embedded mental health professional program has clinicians listening to 9-1-1 calls and responding to the scene with law enforcement when a mental health response is appropriate. I am looking forward to learning how the county can build on the success of this program and find creative solutions and partnerships to tackle other public safety issues.

Representing the constituents of District 8 is an honor that I take seriously, and while I have a strong background and passion for public safety, my primary focus always will be listening to constituents.

The Village itself does collect hazardous or electronic equipment waste, however those services are available through Waukesha County at: https://www. waukeshacounty.gov/hazardouswaste/



The 2022 Elm Grove Police Department annual report is available on the Village website. The report illustrates the outstanding work our officers do, often under trying conditions. Thank you EGPD.

Current Trustees Katie Cornell and Tom Michalski will be leaving the Board at the end of this term on April 17th. Katie and Tom worked hard and committed countless hours to help preserve and improve Elm Grove. During their terms they both always approached issues and problems with an open mind and desire to find solutions that best serve the Village in both the short and long term.

I will also be leaving the Board on April 17th. It has been a great honor and pleasure to serve as your Village President since 2005 and as a Trustee since 1991. From helping negotiate settlement of the Sewer Wars dispute and lawsuits, 1997 & 1998 flood disasters and recovery, leading the effort to create our stormwater management plan (daylighting the creek between Watertown Plank Road and Wall Street soon is the only remaining structural requirement), employee contract negotiations, deer, turkey and coyote control, annual budget deliberations, countless zoning, planning, development and redevelopment projects and issues as Planning Commission Chair and judging the annual Bike Decorating contest on July 4th, I have mostly enjoyed it all.

Many of you know that my professional career requires me to work with local governments in numerous states. I can tell you with absolute confidence that Elm Grove is blessed to have the best staff



I have encountered. We have this great staff and have the good fortune to keep them because the Board has respected their expertise and experience. Municipal governments have different obligations and responsibilities and operate under different funding and accounting laws than private businesses. The job of the Village Board is to set policy. Implementation of policy and day-to-day operations is the job of the staff.

I will miss many things, especially the camaraderie of people working together to solve problems. I will not miss having to weed through what often seemed like hundreds of emails a President receives trying to sell everything from table drapes to fire trucks to latex gloves. Wait, I did receive one email this week that would be fun to respond to; the Miami Grand Prix offered a cabana at the yard club to watch the race. It accommodates seven people and includes chef prepared food. All for only \$69,000! After 32 years that only works out to about \$2.00 per hour.













# Our History: Remembrances of Things Past



THE VILLAGE OF ELM GROVE LOOKING WEST ON THE WATERTOWN PLANK ROAD (circa 1911) SUNDAY MORNING: To the left, on the south side of the plank road is the gate to the Catholic Parish cemetery, Frank Ramstack's horse stable, tavern & boarding house. Beyond, stands Charles Reusch's tavern, boarding house, and horse stable. Ladies can be seen, in the distance, walking up the grade of the road dressed in their Sunday best while warding off the sun with their open umbrellas. On the north side of the road is Charles Sanders' wagon & blacksmith shops. Telegraph poles run along the roadside, leading down to the train station at the base of the hill where village residents often gather to get the latest news over the wire. The Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railroad runs through the village here, out of view, at the base of the hill, beyond the thick grove of Elm Trees. Overall, the scene gives the appearance of quant, quiet village, while in reality "The Grove" provided only a short 20-minute rail jaunt to the large metropolitan city of Milwaukee.

#### WHATZZIT?

The above photograph is of Leland School, Elm Grove's first "modern" school facility. It was taken in the late summer of 1930, prior to opening for its first year of classes that fall. Located at 700 Sunny Slope Road, it sat on land donated by Charles Leland, son of pioneer settler Joshua Leland, a farmer from Massachusetts. The two-story red brick building was located on the east side of the road, about 300 yards south of the intersection of Watertown Plank Road and Sunny Slope. It replaced Gregg School, a small wood frame structure to the north, not far from the present location of the Elm Grove Woman's Club. Gregg School had said goodbye to its last students that spring while Leland was under construction. A farewell picnic was held on May 25th on school grounds.

Over the next fifty years, Leland School was expanded, remodeled and modernized, but the original portion of the building still remained on the northern side of the structure. (My fourth grade classroom was in the "old" portion of the building.) Eventually, the building was repurposed when the enrollment in the Elmbrook school district declined. It became a facility for special needs students, and was later closed when the Elmbrook school district sold the property for residential development. In spite of some community opposition, Leland was demolished in 1983.


Soon, the new homes of Woodfield Hills were under construction at the site. Attractive cul-de-sacs, Fairfield Court and Stonefield Court, were approved. (A plan for a third court with an entrance from Meadow Lane was subsequently abandoned.) Interestingly, the entrances to the courts all utilized the previous entrances to Leland's parking lots and circular driveway. In retrospect, I


regret not asking the village board if one of the Woodfield Hills courts might be named Leland Court, keeping the name of the old school as part of local lore and memory.

The only remaining evidence of Leland School today is the old tennis court at the north end of the property. It is now the western auxiliary parking lot for the Elm Grove Woman's Club. The old Century chain-link fence that separated Leland's lower playground from the Woman's Club property remained for many years, but was quietly removed a few years ago.

It should be noted that the photo of Leland school in 1930 was passed to me from the collection of Margaret Moore, a longtime member of the Elmbrook school board and a lifelong advocate for public education. She was also a stalwart member of the Elmbrook Historical Society and of Elm Grove Community United Methodist Church. Margaret passed away in 2022 at age 99, but left behind a legacy of love for local history and quality education.

MARKET DAY: The Milwaukee Sentinel reported the following regarding the village of Brookfield on May 25, 1902: "The big day of the week is Friday, when the farmers do their marketing. On that day as many as eighty vehicles of all sorts may be seen grouped about the depot. As the major rail center of the town, dairy products, potatoes, grains, and livestock are brought in, while feed, dry goods, and other necessities are taken out. On this day, old acquaintances are renewed, and new ones formed. Farmers may be seen socializing in large numbers, while smoking cigars in a true metropolitan fashion."





- On average adults have completed 3.5 years of education.
- · 30% of the children fail first grade at least
- 7th grade school attendance drops as children go to work to supplement their family income.
- 18.6% of students graduate from high school.

#### The need for Housing is high:

• 67% of families live in homes without roofs and sufficient living space.

- · Homes with cornstalk walls and dirt floors are unsafe and unsanitary.
- Families often live without basic electricity.

This year, the 9-person Elmbrook Rotary Vision Team assisted in preparing a school for the return of students by cleaning and organizing the school. The Team also constructed a house in three days! They started with building prefab panels, delivered them to the site, and created a home for a family in need. A great accomplishment by the Vision Team and a housing upgrade for the family.

#### Response to State Representative Michalski's Article

The February 2023 issue of *The News-Independent* included a letter from Representative Tom Michalski in which he cites the three principles of redistricting as "compactness, contiguity, and preservation of community interests". Regarding the third principle, Representative Michalski states that District 13 "represents a community, including those portions of Wauwatosa and the Town of Brookfield, which are populated by individuals arguably similar to their Brookfield and Elm Grove neighbors."

It should be noted that while compactness and contiguity are easy to assess using generally-acknowledged mathematical calculations, the principle of preservation of community interests is subjective, and can lead to "packing" and "cracking", two tools

used to gerrymander districts (see page 10 of "Redistricting in Wisconsin 2020: The LRB Guidebook" <a href="https://docs.legis.wisconsin.gov/misc/lrb/wisconsin\_elections\_project/redistricting\_wisconsin\_2020\_1\_2.pdf">https://docs.legis.wisconsin.gov/misc/lrb/wisconsin\_elections\_project/redistricting\_wisconsin\_2020\_1\_2.pdf</a>).

Representative Michalski's letter also states that he did "not wish to discuss the perceived impact of redistricting on some of the 99 assembly districts". We trust that Representative Michalski and his corepresentatives have not used preservation of community interests to pack or crack districts, but if this has occurred, we trust that Representative Michalski will in the future wish to discuss this issue in a follow-up letter to *The News-Independent*.

# Legal Issues

#### **Estate Planning and Remarriage**

Marriage is a time for celebration. However, in the event of a remarriage, it is imperative that you and your future spouse also focus on the less romantic process of redrafting your estate plans. Wisconsin is a Marital Property state, which means your marriage will affect the ownership of all of your assets, regardless of how the asset is titled. This change in ownership will affect not only the division of your assets in the event of a divorce, but also the distribution of your assets upon your death. In many instances it will result in a distribution that is substantially different from what you intended.

You and your future spouse's respective financial situations and family situations are most likely more complex than when you first married. You probably have more assets and one or both of you may have children from previous relationships. It may, therefore, be in both parties' interest to execute a prenuptial agreement. In deciding whether or not a prenuptial agreement is appropriate, you and your future spouse should address the following issues:

1. How do the two of you plan to share, or not share, your income and expenses?

"Brookfield: A Fine and Fertile Land - Volume 1"




