Village Update

As anyone who has watched TV, turned on a radio or used social media in the last 60 days knows, Tuesday, August 9th is Election Day for Partisan Primary elections. Elm Grove voters have choices to select general election candidates for State Representative, State Senator, Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, U.S. Senator and Congressional Representative. Seven Waukesha County communities also have referendums seeking increased property taxes to pay for Fire and EMS services. Absentee voting at Village Hall is available until 4:30 p.m. August 5th. Residents can view a sample ballot on the Village website or at: www. MyVote.wi.gov

In addition to the important races to select candidates for U.S. Senator, House of Representative and Governor there are important races to select candidates for our State Senator and our State Representative. In many ways these races to represent Elm Grove in the State Assemble and Senate have the most direct impact on Village operations and finance. Please make time to vote.

The Village Board rescheduled the Village fireworks show for Sunday, September 4th to make up for the cancelled show of July 4th. There is not a "rain date" for this new date. If we are unable to hold the September 4th event, we will save our fireworks payment deposit for next July. Several years ago, our July 4th fireworks were cancelled due to draught conditions, and we also rescheduled the Labor Day weekend. At that time, many residents expressed preference for that schedule as a "Back to School" celebration, as many noted that July 4th is already a very busy time for many people. What do you think?

The new "Pickle Ball" courts should be available now. The new courts were recommended by the Recreation Committee after discussions with resident advocates. We also intend to add Pickle Ball beginners' classes in the future.

Speaking of recreation, the installation of the new swimming pool diving board seems to have attracted many young fans. The pool splash pad area has encountered some operation problems apparently caused by an underground leaking pipe, but Village staff has developed a protocol to keep the area open for use until a permanent fix can be scheduled.

Safety **Public** Committee discussed issues regarding use of electric scooters on Village roads and pathways at a recent meeting. Elm Grove Police Chief Kubiak noted that scooter use has not been a source of complaints or issues. EGPD and the Public Safety Committee recommend that parents need to educate their children on proper and safe use of scooters and bikes. The Public Safety Committee also discussed traffic safety in the northwest portion of the Village where a high-speed car accident occurred. Elm Grove police have increased patrols and radar control in the area.

The Village Board voted 4 to 3 at the July meeting to finalize the language of a "Request for Proposals" seeking outside legal counsel to review the approval of the Tax Incremental District for the redevelopment of the School Sisters of Notre Dame campus and to review the work of the Village Attorney in the process of negotiating the TIF agreement and the subsequent approval by the Board of Trustees. The approved RFP seeks submissions of proposals to conduct the review, prices and a schedule from submitting law firms. The RFP anticipates action to select the outside law firm at the August Village Board meeting.

The Village Board voted unanimously at the July meeting to move forward on efforts to acquire the vacant "One Hour Martinizing" property on Watertown Plank Road at the railroad tracks for use as part of the planned project to "daylight" the Underwood Creek south of Watertown Plank Road.

The Village Board approved the creation of an ad hoc Committee on the Future of Fire and EMS Services along with the recommendations of members from the Village President. Trustee John Schindler will serve as Chair and other members will be Trustee Tom Michalski, David Irwin, Richard Edwards, and Wesley Parkin. Staffing fire and EMS services under our current structure has become increasing difficult and likely unsustainable. This important committee is charged with identifying alternatives for providing and paying for these critical services and making a recommendation to the Board for consideration. The Board seeks to begin consideration of a new operating structure by the end of 2022. Many (most) area communities are struggling with the same problems of staff availability and costs to provide fire and EMS services. Recently, the Village of Thiensville and the City of Mequon agreed to form a new entity designated the "Southern Ozaukee Fire District" to serve both communities. Other communities in the state already have or are considering formation of consolidated services across municipal boundaries.

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

WHATZZIT?

The tiny kiosk at 13601 Juneau Boulevard pictured here may appear to have been a newspaper stand or a village message board, but from April 14th to July 11th, 1998, it served as the gathering spot for Elm Grove commuters wishing to board a morning passenger train into Milwaukee. For 90 days, the "Amtrak Hiawatha Extension Service" made two stops in the village each morning and two westward-bound return stops each evening.

As noted in last month's Whatzzit?, "Cannonball" commuter rail service between Milwaukee and the western suburbs had been retired in July of 1972 due to declines in ridership and revenue resulting in growing operational deficits. In 1998, however, the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, with the backing of then-Governor Tommy Thompson, agreed to undertake an experiment coinciding with the repaying of the I-94 freeway corridor. The DOT agreed to a \$1.4 million grant to Amtrak to subsidize three months of suburban commuter rail. The train would run from Watertown, making stops in Oconomowoc, Pewaukee, Elm Grove, and

Wauwatosa before arriving in Milwaukee. (A proposed stop on Barker Road at River Road in Brookfield was nixed.) The train would also secure connections to Amtrak's Hiawatha commuter run to Chicago.

Originally, the train was to make its Elm Grove stop at the site of the old passenger depot (now long gone) on Watertown Plank Road, but it was decided that this would create a nuisance by tying up traffic in the village's downtown business district as passengers boarded or exited the train. As a result, this small structure was built on Juneau to direct passengers there instead.

When the commuter train's experimental run ended that July, 32,446 suburban riders had taken the train. While ridership had increased somewhat in the last few weeks of the run, it was still far below the number needed to ensure future viability and the experiment came to an end. The little makeshift "depot" was dismantled and removed shortly thereafter.

Immersed in Nature... Tom Ramstack

19th Century rural Brookfield farm families had one gift which modern day Brookfield families in the year 2022 are unable to experience. Today, parents can take their children to a number of area parks to play and run over neatly mowed grass. But they are missing something our mid-19th Century town families had. Residents of that era had to merely step out their front door to be totally immersed in nature in all its beauty and forms--they could smell it, touch it, see for themselves that they were simply part of it all. What a world it must have been!!!

*Reverend Porter Barnes recalled his father viewing the night sky (1840s):

"Our father, Porter Barnes, was a student of the stars. Many a night, as a young boy, have I stood under the blue dome and had him point out the planets and the constellations of fixed stars, giving their names as readily as an astronomer. He loved the storm. He would brace himself against the wind and rain and stand in rapt admiration, while the lightning flashed, and the thunder crashed—just because he loved nature!"

*Kate (Gregg) Warren recalled a cold spring on their family farm (1850s): "I am glad to fly away from the house and tell you of the many days I spent outdoors

immersed in mother nature's beauty! We'll run down to the old spring in the hollow first and refresh ourselves with a drink of pure cold water. The spring was my father's pride. He thought nothing equaled it in the country for purity and coldness; with a hole drilled through to admit the water to bubble up. It was walled with cobblestones four feet thick. Then a large flat stone was placed over the top, with a hole large enough to admit dipping my water with a pail. I loved to lie flat on my stomach on this stone and peer down into the depths and watch the water boil up from the bottom. It seems as though some unseen power was pushing it up as though for our benefit. An outlet near the top permitted it to run into a long box that we set the butter and cream in to keep cool."

*Laura (Grover) Carpenter recalled the beauty that surrounded her (1840s):

"The many varieties of birds on our farm were a novelty to us, children, at first. The 'whoo-hoo' of the owl; and the song of the whip-poor-will, were heard far into the night. Soon the cleared land was put into crops, and a garden was made, flowers grew about the house, and everything was oh, so beautiful, for we were living close to nature's heart!"

Wisconsin Transitions to 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline

Free and confidential behavioral healthcare and support available 24/7

(MADISON) Gov. Tony Evers and the Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) announced on July 16, 2022 that the state has transitioned to the 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline. The new calling code of 988 will allow people of all ages who are experiencing a crisis—whether that is thoughts of suicide, a mental health concern or substance use issue, or any other kind of emotional distress—to get help for themselves or a loved one by connecting them with a trained crisis counselor. The 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline is a free and confidential service that is available 24/7, and anyone can access the Lifeline by calling 988 (multiple languages available), texting a message to 988 (English only), or using the chat feature at 988lifeline.org (English only).

"Talking about mental and behavioral health is an important part of reducing stigma and making sure folks know they can get the support they need when they need it. In our state, nobody carries their worries alone, and it's important for Wisconsinites to know that help and hope are only a phone call away," said Gov. Evers. "The nationwide transition to 988, an easy-to-remember 3-digit number, will provide greater access to counseling services across our state and country and will undoubtedly save lives."

Individuals who call 988 will reach the existing National Suicide Prevention Lifeline, which is being renamed the 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline. While 988 will provide an easy-to-remember number,



the 10-digit National Suicide Prevention Lifeline (1-800-273-8255) will also remain in effect even with the transition. Individuals in Wisconsin who contact 988 will be routed to the Wisconsin Lifeline, the only National Suicide Prevention Lifeline affiliated call center in Wisconsin. Wisconsin Lifeline is funded by DHS and operated by Family Services of Northeast Wisconsin. If you or someone you know is in imminent danger, please call 911.

"A person experiencing a behavioral health crisis does not need to manage alone," said DHS Secretary-designee **Karen Timberlak**e. "Just call, text, or chat 988. The 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline is here and ready to help all Wisconsin residents handle stressful situations."

In 2021, approximately 29,000 calls from Wisconsin were answered by the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline.




Rotary Club's Focus is Community Service By Jackson Bubolz

About Milkweed & the Mission of Our Monarch Map By the Elm Grove Beautification Committee / beautification@elmgrovewi.org

Milkweeds are the required host plants for monarch butterfly caterpillars (female monarchs lay their eggs on milkweeds) and their flowers provide nectar for bees, butterflies, and other beneficial insects. Being a required host plant means that the ONLY species that can support a monarch caterpillar is milkweed, or Asclepias.

By planting milkweed, you can provide habitat for monarchs and also attract and support pollinators. Within the United States, the Xerces Society recommends planting milkweed species that are locally native. Here in Wisconsin, we have 12-13 varieties of milkweed:

- A. syrica—common milkweed
- incarnata—swamp or rose milkweed
- tuberosa—butterfly milkweed
- verticillata—whorled milkweed
- amplexicaulis—clasping leaf milkweed
- A. exaltata—poke milkweed
- A. hirtella—tall green milkweed
- viridiflora—green flowered or short green milkweed
- A. sullivantii—prairie, smooth, or Sullivant's milkweed (threatened)
- A. ovalifolia—draw or oval-leaf milkweed (threatened)
- A. lanuginosa—wooly (threatened)
- A. purpurens—purple (endangered) speciosa—showy


You can help! Plant milkweed in your

yard, community, and natural areas to protect both the diversity and abundance of milkweeds in our state, and the monarchs which rely on them. Encourage your neighbors to do the same.

If you have any variety of milkweed in your yard, provide your Elm Grove address and we will add an orange dot on the map—let's see what we can do to make Elm Grove a butterfly haven!

What to do with my Asclepias syricae that spreads where I don't want it?

- Share it with a neighbor or friend
- · Post it on Next Door or Facebook to share with a random stranger
- Cut it off at the ground when it emerges. Under most conditions, when a common milkweed stem is cut off near ground level, in about two weeks a new shoot will appear from the roots. These new shoots are highly attractive to female monarchs, receiving two to 10 times more eggs than older stems. In addition, re-growing stems harbor fewer predators, giving young monarchs a chance to grow. In some studies, survival of eggs and young larvae was two to 2.5 times higher on re-growing stems. We have observed that older stems are important, too. As caterpillars mature, they often move from younger stems onto the older ones, so it may be that maintaining diversity in milkweed stem age is key.

Story of a Missing Soldier

It was a sunny morning on November 11, 1947, and as I walked into Arlington National Cemetery, memories flooded my mind. I stared at the letter my brother, Martin, sent me on my fourteenth birthday in 1917. I put the letter back in my dress pocket and laid down a bouquet of white roses near the tomb of the missing soldiers. As I pushed the flowers a little closer to the tomb, the memories of my late brother transported me back to our childhood in Wisconsin. I remembered the day Martin turned seventeen in the summer of 1915 and joined the military. My grandfather and father served in the army, and Martin always wanted to follow in their footsteps, but he finally got the chance to serve that year.

Still today, I have dreams about that day when Martin sent me that letter on my birthday in May 1917. But on August 5, 1917, we got a telegram from a military base camp in France, and the message changed our lives forever.

"Deeply regret informing you Lieutenant Martin Hansen has officially been reported dead of battle wounds and body unrecovered. He is declared a missing soldier after extensive search on battlefield."

Captain Thomas Whitmore August 5th, 1917

Soon after reading the telegram, my mother collapsed on the floor. Before I could call for help, my head began to spin, and everything went dark. The World War ended on November 11, 1918 but they never found his body. So, my mother hoped that he was alive and would be home soon. She kept gifts for Martin under the Christmas tree every year and would talk to Martin's picture in uniform hung on the wall. We would celebrate Martin's birthday every year. It hit Mother even harder, a few years later, doctors diagnosed her with severe depression and recommended her medications. I couldn't believe how the two deaths led to my mother not being the same. Mother passed away in 1920 of old age but was hoping to see Martin even during her last days. I became a nurse at a Veteran's hospital, where I took care of retired veterans. Whenever I helped them and talked to them, I could understand the grief and sorrow they went through and how they have such a brave soul when there is no light of hope. I looked for Martin in those veterans.

The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, an historic monument dedicated to deceased U.S. service members whose remains were not identified, was built on November 11, 1921. Today, visiting the Arlington cemetery has brought closure for myself. I honored the sacrifices of the missing army personnel like Martin. The personnel stayed away from their families and the comfort of their homes to fight for the country. We should celebrate and honor the lives of the brave soldiers who sacrificed their lives serving the country. These brave soldiers should not be forgotten.

Alzheimer's. He will describe strategies which did and did not work for him and provide guidance to other families caring for a loved one with Alzheimer's.



Estate Planning: Vacation Properties

Whether it is a lake home, a cottage in the woods or hunting land, vacation properties can be the source of your family's best memories. However, if you are lucky enough to own such a property, you need to decide what will happen to it after you die, otherwise it could drive a wedge between your family members.

Begin by determining what your goal is for the property. Do you want it to remain in the family or are you okay with it being sold? If it is to remain in the family, are you willing to transfer full or part ownership of the property during your lifetime, or only after your death? Consult an attorney as to not only what legal steps need to be taken for either option, but also what the tax consequences would be to both you and your children. Lastly, discuss what form of ownership, such as a trust or LLC, would be the best manner for multiple family members to own the property together.

Once you have made some decisions and have the necessary information, have a meaningful discussion with your children. Find out who actually wants the property. What they have to say might surprise you. One or more of your children might enjoy visiting the property now, but may not have interest in it after you are gone. Another may simply live too far away, or may not be in a financial position to take on the taxes, insurance and maintenance of the property.

Lastly, once you decide who will receive the property, you must also decide whether your other children will receive something else from your estate instead. When everything has been addressed and decided, follow through with any necessary legal work. Working through these matters with your family will require effort. However, a successful transition of your vacation property to the next generation will be well worth it
