Elections 2018:

Nominations Sought for Trustees, School Board

Local residents interested in taking active leadership roles regarding current and future issues of importance to our community may wish to consider running for a seat on the Village of Elm Grove Board of Trustees or the Elmbrook School Board next year.

A Primary Election, if needed, will be held on Tuesday, February 20, 2018; the Spring Election is set for Tuesday, April 3.

The Village Board seats up for election include those of Trustees John Domaszek, George Haas, and Pat Kressin, whose terms all expire on April 17, 2018. Trustees serve two-year terms and receive no financial compensation.

To qualify as a candidate you must be a citizen of the Village of Elm Grove, age 18 or older, a resident of the Village for at least 28 days before any election, and an eligible elector.

The first day to circulate nomination papers is December 1, 2017. No less than 20 and no more than 100 signatures are required. All forms are available at Village Hall and on the Village website: www.elmgrovewi.org (under Departments, Clerk, Elections).

Nomination Papers, Declaration of Candidacy, and a Campaign Registration Statement all must be filed at Village Hall no later than 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, January 2, 2018. Call (262) 782-6700 for further information.


Concerns over crime in Elm Grove expressed on social media and resident contacts have increased recently. Some people have even communicated that they believed Elm Grove has become a dangerous place to live.

Our long-term Police Department records really don't show significant change in the amount or even type of crime from the 1990s. What has changed is how the Elm Grove Police Department communicates with residents.

Up until about 18 months ago the EGPD relied on the news media to inform the public about crime. Previously the EGPD issued a weekly media update by email on Monday mornings. In most cases, by the time the media received the incident information the media was not interested, and therefore rarely or never printed or covered. The media controlled the message.

Now the EGPD uses social media like Facebook, and more recently incorporating our Village website police alerts for those who do not have access to Facebook. We use Facebook as an immediate conduit for crime activity with our community and the news media to share not only interesting police related activity in the Village, but also to address the public safety concerns. Often crime information is released in real time.

I believe the current heightened concern is a small growing pain of having a better-informed public. In the past residents who simply were not aware of events are now being notified directly and social media spreads news very fast. The greater public awareness is generating more resident contact with the Elm Grove



Police Department which is also a benefit of the new efforts.

The increased public awareness is also helping people understand that even in Elm Grove we must all practice common sense: lock your car, lock your house, and report activity that simply doesn't look right. If you plan to be away from home travelling inform the police and ask that your home be checked in your absence. The Village of Elm Grove continues to be one of the safest places to live in the region. Plus, we have an excellent police department.

The Village Board approved the updated Village **Wildlife Plan** at the October meeting which now includes provisions for active management of the wild turkey population. We expect our contractor to begin culling the turkey population this winter. The updated plan includes information about control of coyotes. The plan is available on the Village website: www.elmgrovewi.org.

Crime Prevention Tips from the EGPD & the *Elm Grove News-Independent...*

PLEASE!!!

- LOCK YOUR VEHICLES (even those parked on your property / driveway).
- DO NOT LEAVE KEYS IN THE IGNITION when the vehicle is unattended!
- LOCK DOORS & WINDOWS at your residence (even when you're home).

The Elm Grove Police Department responds to numerous incidents each year regarding unlocked vehicles which are stolen along with purses, wallets and other valuables left within them. Home invasions have occurred, sometimes due to doors and/or windows left unlocked at Village residences. Be aware of this. Take precautions.

Play it safe and avoid becoming a victim.

While Holiday shopping...

- * STAY ALERT! Be tuned-in to your surroundings and the people around you. Don't be taken by surprise. Be aware and prepared, even in your own neighborhood.
- * STAND TALL! Walk confidently, don't show fear, and don't look like a victim.
- * TRUST YOUR INSTINCTS! If you feel uncomfortable in a place or situation, leave right away and get help if necessary.
- * Shop with a friend. There is safety in numbers & avoid carrying large amounts of cash.
- * Women: If you must carry a purse, do not wrap the straps around your arms or shoulders. Carry a clutch purse tightly under your arm or wear a fanny pack.
- * Men: Do not carry a wallet in a back pocket. It should be placed in a front pocket of your pants for safety.
- *Be alert that crooks look for the

- "high dollar" shopping bags with your purchases. When possible, slip bags/purchases in a plain, nondescript bag.
- * Watch purchases while at food courts; bags can easily be switched or taken.
- * Educate your children about what to do if they are lost, as well as "stranger danger".
- * Have your car keys ready in hand before leaving the store.
- * Place purchases in the trunk of your vehicle or cover them so they are "out of sight" to avoid theft.



Milwaukee Holiday Gemutlichkeit

All of us, with the annual arrival of the Christmas Season, are easily caught up in our memories of holidays past, and remembrances of the people, traditions and celebrations that made the Season special. For me, it is also a time to recall the "Gemutlichkeit" of the fine German restaurants that my family frequented in the 1950s and 1960s. The above term, familiar to many Wisconsinites, is of vague translation, but was probably best defined by local historian Robert W. Wells as "the feeling a Milwaukeean gets when the food is piled high on the plate, the beer is flowing freely and someone from out of town is there to pick up the check." A more sober rendering might simply embrace 'Peace, Fellowship and Hospitality'.

Traditional German dishes were popular favorites at Christmastime, and dining establishments often featured Wiener Schnitzel, Sauerbraten with dumplings, Kassler-Rippchen and Rouladen, but the true seasonal favorite was the Roast Duck with stuffing, red cabbage and cranberry sauce.

Fifty years ago, the old Germanic culture of Milwaukee was still widely displayed, and many area restaurants specialized in German or Alpine cuisine. Every Christmas, my uncle Paul Hauser would visit from Iowa and our family would make a point of dining out at one or two of these establishments.

I can recall some tasty Christmas meals at John Ernst Café on Ogden Avenue (established in 1878 and said to be Milwaukee's oldest restaurant), the Bavarian Wurst Haus on Appleton Avenue, operated for many years by the Dietz family and later by Chef Norbert Holland, Kegel's Inn on National Avenue in West Allis, the Alpine Village on N. Highway 57 in Mequon, Stemmeler's White Coach Inn on Main Street in Thiensville, the old Ritter's Inn at 37th & Lisbon Avenue, Imberger's Deutsche Wurstkueche on Fond du Lac Avenue and, of course, Mader's on Third Street downtown. (Today, only Kegel's and Mader's remain.)

The best of them all, however, may have been the Golden Zither at 50th & Vliet Street (now the location of O'Brien's Irish

Inn). The food was "wunderbar", but this was equally true of the other eateries noted above. Many of them featured live music, but it was often of the polka variety. Only the Golden Zither featured the beautiful sounds of the Zither, a stringed instrument popular in central Europe whose origins can be traced to ancient Greece. In the hands of a skilled Zithermeister, it is an instrument of great depth and subtlety. The Milwaukee Zither Club once boasted many such musicians.

The resident Zithermeister at the Golden Zither was **Albert Mueller** from New Glarus, an historic Swiss settlement twenty miles south of Madison. Al took requests from diners, but most such suggestions didn't stray too far from standards such as "Edelweiss" or the "Third Man Theme". Left to his own devices, however, Al would conjure long ago folk melodies from Germany, Austria-Hungary and Switzerland, beautiful but unfamiliar to the American ear.

On the occasions when Al Mueller was unable to play at the Golden Zither his place would be taken by Ludwig Kalbrunner, formerly of the village of Ruhpolding, Bavaria. As is true of all folk musicians, Ludwig's playing differed in style from Al's, but was just as warm and engaging. I was reminded of all this (and inspired to write this column) in October, 2016 when I attended Klub Osterreich's (the Milwaukee Austrian Club) annual Weinfest at the Schwabenhof in Menomonee Falls. I was there to say hello to club president Frank Schmitz and to hear my friend Kurt von Eckroth play his Zither, as he does masterfully. I was suprised to find that he would be playing alongside none other than Ludwig Kalbrunner, now living in Illinois. It was wonderful to see Ludwig and to share great memories of the Golden Zither. I think he was as happy to talk about those days as I was. He gifted me with a copy of his Christmas CD, Frohe Weihnachten, containing Zither stylings of "Greensleeves", "Silver Bells". "Little Town of Bethlehem" and, naturally, "Tannenbaum" and "Stille Nacht, Heilige Nacht" (Silent Night), the classic German carols. (I learned that he had recorded no less than 33 albums and CDs.) His Christmas CD was a special part of our family Christmas last year, and will be again this season.

As I recall those old German restaurants decorated with handmade ornaments, wreaths and garlands and, of course, Christmas trees, I smile with amusement at the dining families

The first quarter of this 2017-2018 school year has been a giving quarter at Tonawanda Elementary. We are so proud and excited about our generous giving!

As a Tonawanda school community of students and their families and staff, we collected \$1,482.41 for the United Way! Our school had a goal of \$1,200.00, so we exceeded the goal! Students were able to purchase a strip of duct tape for \$5 to assist in duct-taping the principal (me) to the gym wall. All that tape worked and (I) was truly off the ground for a few minutes! Each year our Tonawanda 5th grade students complete a service project. This fall our 5th graders raised more than \$1,600

for Hurricane Relief through generous donations earned by the students themselves and help from our school community. The students completed chores, did odd jobs for others, or held lemonade stands, to name a few. Additionally, they sold ice cream sandwiches at lunch recess to the student community!

The fourth grade students at Tonawanda are participating in an event called Classroom Book a Day this year. Teachers all over the United States are participating in this challenge with their students to read picture books daily and have been sharing book ideas and lesson ideas online. A sixth grade teacher from Vidor, Texas posted a picture of her Classroom Book a Day bulletin board

before and after the destruction of Hurricane Harvey. She also explained that they have been displaced from their school until March. That picture really had an impact on Tonawanda's fourth grade students. So (they) developed a plan to help children who have had their homes or schools affected by the hurricanes. Within less than two weeks, the students collected \$800. The students wanted to show their support to hurricane affected schools. So far, there have been 33 new picture books donated to 5 teachers in Texas and Florida. Tonawanda's students are supporting a love of reading across our nation.

Our first grade students collected 295 pairs of socks for the homeless for Socktober!

Our second grade students had a field trip to The Humane Society. In preparation for that field trip, the students made tiedfleece blankets for the animals and brought dog/cat food and toy donations, too!

Science Field Trip

On October 27, 2017, the St. Mary's Visitation eighth grade took a field trip to two different sites for our Science class. These field trips required some time on bus rides, but I thought that they were beneficial to our education. The first part of the trip was at the Manfred Olson Planetarium at the University of Wisconsin – Milwaukee. The second part of the trip was at the Plasma Sciences Expo at the Wisconsin Center.

The reason we went to the planetarium was that we were in the middle of a unit about astronomy and space. Our teacher, **Mrs. Biernat**, knew the person who ran the planetarium, and she thought that it would be a great tool that would help us learn about space more by visualizing it. The first thing we did was look at all of the planets and hear some interesting facts about them. I learned that Venus's atmosphere is so dense that it would crush a human being like a pancake, and that Pluto has only made one orbit since it was discovered in 1930. We learned about other objects and classifications like the

Asteroid Belt. We identified constellations like the Bid Dipper, Pegasus, and the Summer Triangle.

(Later that day) we got to the Wisconsin Center. There were many great experiences at the exhibition. One of them included sitting in a metal box and watching plasma rays run around you, produced by a 1 million volt generator. There was also a machine that created static electricity when you touched it, so you could give people static shocks. The best place to get them was on their ears. In a different exhibit, the instructors put marshmellows into liquid nitrogen and let them sit for a few minutes. When they took them out, they had hardened, and they tasted like Lucky Charms. Mr. Falk, our Math teacher, challenged a Rubik's Cubesolving robot in a 'Cube-off', and the robot defeated him.

All of these different exhibits taught us something new, and they were all very entertaining. I would recommend that other classes should go here, too.



Estate Planning: Where Do I Begin?

Whatever the size of your financial estate, it is important to plan. The legal and financial issues raised by your death or incapacity, will be more difficult and expensive for your loved ones without a proper estate plan. Unfortunately, most of us procrastinate because thinking about and then planning for death or disability is an unpleasant prospect. However, before any legal documents can be drafted, there are initial steps you will need to take and issues to which you must give at least some preliminary thought.

First: Consider yourself. If you become incapacitated, but do not die, who should manage your finances? Who should make decisions regarding your health care? What values are important to you regarding your health care?

Second: Consider your spouse. If you pass away, should everything go to your spouse? Do you have a blended family? Should part of your estate pass to your children even if you have a spouse? Have you signed a prenuptial agreement that addresses this?

Third: Consider your children. Who should raise them if they are minors? Who will be their guardian? Choosing a guardian will force you to decide what values are most important to you: religious beliefs, cultural identity, parenting styles, education, family size, geographical location, financial skills, just to name a few. Also, consider whether your children are mature enough to manage their inheritance. If not, the funds should be placed in a trust for their benefit. Who should be the trustee? The trustee will not only manage the trust funds, but also decide when and why to make distributions to your children.

Fourth: Consider your other beneficiaries. If you do not have a surviving spouse or children, who should receive your assets? Would you like to leave your money to other family members, your church, your favorite charities, or all of the above?

The initial phase of the estate planning process is the hardest because the nonfinancial decisions are always more difficult to make than the financial ones. Once these decisions have been made, however, the rest of the process should flow smoothly.


