S. Mary Lorenzo Schuster, SSND

At 103 years old, Sister Lorenzo is the oldest sister living at Notre Dame of Elm Grove. She was born on May 21, 1915, in Marshall, Wisconsin. Sister Lorenzo served as a homemaker following her first profession of vows on July 17, 1941. She lived in a number of communities in this capacity for 50-plus years in Wisconsin: Milwaukee, Wauwatosa, Butler, Sun Prairie and South Milwaukee. Her expertise and love for raising roses was a skill that stands out along with her cooking. She helped to create a wonderful community environment in which many sisters, priests and even kindergarteners enjoyed her company. Many have given testimony to her gifts! Now she spends much of her time deepening her love relationship with God, reminiscing and enjoying visits with her family, SSND community and friends.



S. Frances Therese Jungwirth, SSND

Sister Francis Therese was born in Milwaukee on September 1, 1916. She served as an elementary school teacher for one year before her first profession of vows on August 5, 1936. She then taught junior high and high school for 20 years at schools in Illinois and Wisconsin before serving at Mount Mary College in Milwaukee as a professor for 43 years. Later, she was a part-time associate professor at Mount Mary for seven years before beginning her current prayer and presence ministry at Notre Dame of Elm Grove in 2006. She holds a bachelor's degree in German and English from Mount Mary College and a master's degree in German from the University of Notre Dame.

She is cared for and loved by her sisters and staff at our retirement home in Elm Grove.



S. Mercita Batog, SSND

Sister Mercita was born in Grand Rapids, Michigan, on December 22, 1918. After first profession of vows on July 28, 1938, Sister Mercita taught primary students for more than 40 years. In Wisconsin, her missions included: St. Francis Xavier in DePere, St. Francis Xavier in Green Bay, St. Agnes in Butler, Holy Cross/Consolidation in Mount Calvary, St. Mary in Menasha and St. Gabriel in Prairie de Chien. She also taught in Chicago and Detroit. She holds bachelor's degrees in education, sociology and theology. When she left fulltime teaching in 1986, she continued to tutor and serve in volunteer ministry. She retired in 1997, joining the NDEG community where she serves through prayer and presence. Sister Mercita still likes to sing and has a delightful sense of humor.



S. Helen Siwicka, SSND

Sister Helen was born on January 26, 1919, in Grand Rapids, Michigan. She professed first vows on July 28, 1939, and went on to teach primary school students in Wisconsin, Michigan, and Indiana. When she left the classroom in 1978, she embarked on ministering with the elderly and in-home health care. She volunteered from 1993-1998 with Independent Services in Milwaukee. Sister Helen received a bachelor's degree in education and social studies from Mount Mary College in Milwaukee. After retiring in 1998, she joined the Notre Dame of Elm Grove community where she continues to minister through prayer, presence and service. Sister Helen says she loved to dance when she was young. While she can't do that now, she "dances" for us with her eyes and smile.

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Past Times: I REMEMBER...

God with Us

"...And his name shall be called Emmanuel, which means 'God with us.'" — Matthew 1:23 By Stephen K. Hauser

Most Americans are well aware of the first Thanksgiving celebration, held by the Pilgrims at Plymouth, Massachusetts in 1621. (For my take on that famous occasion, please refer to my *Past Times* column of November, 2015.)

Far fewer folks today know when and where the first Christmas was celebrated on America's colonial shores. The Pilgrim settlers of Plymouth, along with the Puritans of Boston and the Anglicans of Jamestown stoutly abstained from 'making merry' on the 25th of December in celebration of Christ's birth. They believed that to do so was frivolous and led to excess and debauchery. Christmas observances were actually forbidden by law in England in the 1600s, going so far as to outlaw the baking of mince pies! While it was no doubt quite true that some among the citizenry tended to excess in their merrymaking, it was also true that some of the overly pious religious practitioners simply "didn't get it".

British Catholics, however, had no misgivings about what they were celebrating. They saw the annual commemoration of the Nativity as a joyful recognition of "God with us" through the birth of Jesus Christ in Bethlehem's manger. Often persecuted back in England for their glad recognition of the significance of God's arrival in our midst, it is therefore no surprise that they took advantage of the freedom and isolation of the New World to establish America's earliest Christmas tradition.

Theologically and politically, Roman Catholics were as unpopular in England as were Pilgrims, Puritans and Quakers. **Lord Baltimore**, a stalwart Catholic aristocrat, negotiated with **King Charles I** in 1632 to establish the proprietary colony of Maryland as a refuge for Britain's Catholics.


The following year, 130 settlers were dispatched aboard two cargo ships, the Ark and the Dove. Also aboard was Fr. **Andrew White**, a Jesuit priest. Fr. White noted in his journal that the passengers celebrated Christmas on December 25, 1633 while still at sea. The ships dropped anchor on Maryland's coast on March 25, 1634. The colonists founded St. Mary's City, Maryland's first capital, and the first building erected there was a chapel, built under Fr. White's direction. The following December, they celebrated the first Christmas to be observed in Great Britain's American colonies. Despite initial skepticism expressed in other colonies toward the Holiday, its observance spread across the young nation to become almost universal by the late nineteenth century.

By the time of my youth in Elm Grove in the 1950s and the early 1960s, Christmas was the most ardently anticipated celebration of the calendar year, for both religious and secular reasons. Of course, youngsters of the "baby boom" era eagerly looked forward to Christmas vacation and the promise of two weeks away from school. Those of us who attended Leland School and our neighbors who were enrolled at St. Mary's grade school shared a desire to be free of homework through the end of the year. A mere couple of weeks seemed a long time back then. But make no mistake: with planned choral recitals and Christmas pageants, much of the Holiday activity revolved around our local churches and our family commitments to them.

There were five church congregations located in the Village of Elm Grove during those years. By virtue of its heritage as a Catholic community, by far the largest was St. Mary's Visitation parish, shepherded by Monsignor Leonard Lieven (who had replaced longtime pastor, Fr. Andrew Kunny). His assistant pastors were Fr. John Arens (who doubled as coach of St. Mary's basketball team) and Fr. Richard Thomas. St. Mary's Visitation was a huge parish, with three weekday Masses scheduled for daily communicants and six celebrations of the Mass on Sunday mornings. (Sorry, no Saturday evening Mass in those days.) During Advent, activities at St. Mary's increased markedly. St. Mary's congregation was still meeting in their 1921 sanctuary at the Watertown Plank Road/Juneau Blvd. triangle in those days, hence the need for so many scheduled services, given the rapidly expanding number of parishioners of those years.

My family and I were members of Elm Grove Community Methodist Church on Watertown Plank Road, pastored by Rev. Marlin Smith, succeeded in the early 1960's by **Dr. Dale E. Strong**. Christmas Eve services were a high point of our church year, and I can still recall being a part of the youth choir in 1962, having to learn the words to "We Three Kings of Orient Are" and wondering why the verse "we traverse afar" was not more simply put as "we travel so far". Dr. Strong would deliver specially written Christmas sermons for us each year, and I looked forward to them. He reminded us one year, "It's not the things we do at Christmas, it's the Christmas things we do all the year through".

St. Edmund's Episcopal Church was also located on Watertown Plank Road, just to the east of the Methodist Church. It occupied the most inventive and modern of the sanctuaries in the village, designed



in 1956 by noted architect William P. Wenzler, who envisaged an upward sweep that exemplified the hopefulness of the post World War II era. St. Edmund's pastor was Fr. James DeGolier, an Episcopal priest of the old school who valued the majesty of the liturgy and lifted high the glorious tradition of "God with us", especially so on Christmas Eve.

Elm Grove Evangelical Lutheran Church (Missouri synod) extended welcome to its parishioners, visitors and guests at its beautiful new sanctuary located on Terrace Drive, just north of Watertown Plank Road. The growing congregation was thriving under the leading of its longtime pastor, Rev. Victor A. Bartelt, and they had outgrown the colonial-style church they had occupied since 1942. That previous house of worship was sold to the Elm Grove Woman's Club, and it still serves as their clubhouse today. Rev. Bartelt was much loved by his parishioners, and he continued as their pastor until retiring in 1986. His sermons were noted for their deep understanding of Scripture, and he was respected in the larger community for his intellect, his faith and his service to his church and his community. His Christmas Eve sermons were said by some of his congregation to be the best they had ever heard.

The Elmbrook Baptist Church was the fifth congregation to call Elm Grove home in those days. They met in the gymnasium of Leland School on Sunny Slope Road under the direction of Pastor Robert G.

Hobson. In 1965, they would relocate to their first building on N. Calhoun Road in Brookfield. **Pastor Bob Hobson**, who would later become a good friend of mine, didn't believe in Christmas Eve services or special Holiday sermons. He argued instead that "God with us" meant the presence of Christ in our lives every day, thus making the Christmas moment a year-round, all-encompassing reality.

In the early 1990's, my wife Janice and I attended the Christmas Eve services at Aldersgate United Methodist Church on Lisbon Avenue in Milwaukee. The pastor was Rev. Thad Rutter, former associate pastor of Elm Grove Methodist Church in the 1960's. I had first met him in 1964 as our youth pastor, and he would go on to lead our Confirmation classes. Thad has remained a valued friend ever since. I will long remember his gentle retelling of the age old Christmas story at those Christmas Eve services at Aldersgate, even though 25 years have passed since then. His own spiritual journey has given him much wisdom to share, and I can remember him telling us at a candlelight service on a chilly Christmas Eve in 1992, "Sometimes, in our own desperate search to find God, God finds us". Hearing that, I was immediately struck once again by the blessed miracle of Christmas: God has come amongst us. Indeed, the eternal Christmas message is still: "God with us".

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
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Village Update

A cold, yet busy month in the Village. The Village Board Finance Committee completed work on the 2019 Village Budget and sent it on to the Village Board for consideration at the November 26 meeting. We are fortunate to have Monica Hughes, Finance Director, and David **DeAngelis**, Village Manager, to assist the Finance Committee. Municipal budgets have constraints imposed by state law that make municipal budgeting quite difficult.

The proposed Village tax levy is \$7,013,090, which is 2.23% (\$53,310) increase over last year and within the limit set by the state. The tax rate derived from that levy is \$6.2417 per \$1,000 of assessed value, which is a 4.26% decrease from last year. 2019 user fees for sewer, storm water, and trash disposal are set at \$705.24, a small decrease from last year.

At the Village Board meeting held on November 14, the Board approved a resolution to extend the current moratorium on the issuance on new commercial building permits within the central business district to February 28, 2019. The previous moratorium end date of November 20, 2018 was established in May to create a time out while the Downtown Master Plan process could be completed. While progress is being made, the Master Plan process is taking a little longer than anticipated. Watch for notice of the next public discussions of the consultant findings and proposals.

The annual Lights of Love celebration hosted by the Friends of the Elm Grove Library (FOEGL) is scheduled for Sunday, December 2, 2018 from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. I hope many of you will attend and bring your children and grandchildren. The celebration

starts with children's activity in the Village Hall basement, followed by singing of Christmas carols and tree lighting, and concluding with lots of excellent treats in the Village Hall courtroom.

Families with young children are invited to have brunch with Santa at the Elm Grove Woman's Club on Saturday, December 15 from 10 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. Tickets can be secured by visiting: www.ElmGroveJuniorGuild.org. Space is limited for this special event.

The Gingerbread House, a new business addition to the Village, will be opening in early December. The bakery and specialty drink space is at 13320 Watertown Plank Road. Since approving the business plan for this new bakery, I have noted what a foodie hub we are becoming. Just down the street from Gingerbread House is Great Harvest Bread and then across the street in the Park & Shop is the fabulous Fazio's Chocolate shop and a little further south in the 890 Building courtyard is Crumby Art, home of incredible cake creations and wonderful cookies. I encourage everyone to visit our shops for holiday celebration treats.

And after the holidays, if you have had a few too many treats and want to get in better shape, you can visit one of our other two new businesses: Shred Fitness in the Autumn Grove shopping area on Bluemound specializes in interval training sessions led by trainers. TB Fitness (Toned Body) in the courtyard of the 890 Building off Wall Street has class and individual training and wellness offerings.

The Village of Elm Grove has been served and protected by the Elm Grove Volunteer Fire Department since 1956. The department is comprised of a dedicated and highly trained group of individuals who live or work within our member response boundaries. The department averages approximately 120 calls for service per year, which include structure and other fires, vehicle accidents, water/ice rescues, mutual aid to other communities, and various service calls. We participate in a joint Survive Alive program, fire prevention programs, and other public relations events and activities. Providing the Village residents and business owners with a high-quality service gives the membership great pride and satisfaction while performing their duties. Currently we have 39 members, with an average of 16 years of community service. Camaraderie and the personal satisfaction are two reasons why our average years of service are so high. If this organization sounds like one you would like to learn more about, please take a few minutes to review the following information.

Dept. Member Response Boundaries

In order to be an active line member, i.e. firefighter on the EGVFD, you must live or work within the following Village boundaries or within a reasonable distance from the station determined by the

Officer Corps: Burleigh Rd. on the North; Greenfield Ave. on the South; Highway 100 on the East; Calhoun Rd. on the West. The reason for these boundaries is to provide the Village with the safest and most expedient response possible.

Paid-on-Call Program

In 1998, the department evolved from a purely volunteer organization to a volunteer paid-on-call, which means our members are modestly compensated for their service. The membership is paid quarterly for service provided the preceding quarter. The average firefighter earns approximately \$3,000.00.

Education & Training (Probationary Period)

Each applicant must complete a background and an interview process. Upon successful completion, each new firefighting member must successfully complete the WCTC, one-semester Firefighter I Certification Course and those interested in driving the apparatus attend the WCTC one-semester Motor Pump Operator Certification Course. Then the probationary member must successfully complete the Elm Grove Probationary Training School (PTS). At the completion of PTS, the member will be eligible to be sworn in as an active member of the department. The probationary process

takes approximately one year. During that year the probationary member is allowed to respond on the apparatus to calls depending on the level of training attained. We realize that the commitment is big, but the rewards are high. The life saving skills we learn are carried over and shared with our families and friends.

Social Events & Activities

Throughout the year, a number of social events are held, including the annual Family Christmas Party and May Dinner. Knowing that being a member of the EGVFD takes us away from our families, it is extremely important to make our families feel an integral part of our department.



In the weeks since the synagogue shooting in Pittsburg, I've had the opportunity to spend time in conversation and worship with a variety of people from a myriad of faith backgrounds — members of the Jewish, Baha'i, Sikh, Muslim, Buddhist and Christian communities. Each time I enter into one of these experiences, I am overwhelmed with gratitude for

the unity we find, even in our diversity. Compassion wins over violence. Dialogue wins over debate. Love wins over hate. Each time, I learn something new — a prayer, a song, a passage of holy text — and I am made better for it. This is what community can do for us. It challenges us, blesses us, calls us toward something larger and more powerful than ourselves.





Legal Issues

New IRS 199A Regulations Benefit Out-of-**Favor Service Businesses**

If you operate an out-of-favor business (known in the law as a "specified service trade or business") and your taxable income is more than \$207,500 (single) or \$415,000 (married, filing jointly), your Section 199A deduction is easy to compute. It's zero.

This out-of-favor specified service trade or business group includes any trade or business

- involving the performance of services in the fields of health, law, consulting, athletics, financial services, and brokerage services; or
- where the principal asset of such trade or business is the reputation or skill of one or more of its employees or owners: or
- that involves the performance of services that consist of investing and investment management trading or dealing in securities, partnership interests, or commodities. For this purpose, a security and a commodity have the meanings provided in the rules for the mark-to-market accounting method for dealers in securities [Internal Revenue Code Sections 475(c)(2) and 475(e)(2), respectively].

If you were not in one of the named groups above, you likely worried about being in a reputation or skill out-offavor specified service business. If you were worried, you joined a large group of worried businesses, because many businesses depend on reputation and/or skill for success.

For example, the National Association

of Realtors believed real estate agents fell into this out-of-favor category.

But don't worry, be happy. The IRS has come to the rescue by regulating the draconian reputation and/or skill provision down to almost nothing. The reputation and/or skill out-of-favor specified service business includes you if you

- · receive fees, compensation, or other income for endorsing products or
- license or receive fees, compensation, or other income for the use of your image, likeness, name, signature, voice, trademark, or any other symbols associated with your identity; or
- · receive fees, compensation, or other income for appearing at an event or on radio, television, or another media format.

Example. Harry is a well-known chef and the sole owner of multiple restaurants, each of which is a single-member LLC disregarded tax entities that are taxed as proprietorships. Due to Harry's skill and reputation as a chef, he receives an endorsement fee of\$500,000 for the use of his name on a line of cooking utensils and cookware.

Results. Harry's restaurant business is not an out-of-favor business, but his endorsement fee is an out-of-favor specified service business.

Regional Bus Transportation is Essential

MCTS Route 61 will be reconfigured and continue to run from Milwaukee's central city into Menomonee Falls for an extra nine months, thanks to a lastminute budget amendment included in the Milwaukee County Budget.

If Milwaukee County, with all of its challenges, is able to find money to run a bus into Waukesha County, we'd like to see that Waukesha County could make a serious effort to do the same.


