Village of Elm Grove 2022 Elections Preview

Elm Grove residents who wish to take an active role regarding current and future issues of importance to our Village may want to consider running for a seat on the Board of Trustees next year.

A Primary Election, if needed, will be held on Tuesday, February 15, 2022 with the Spring Election set for Tuesday, April 5, 2022.

Village Board seats up for election include those of **Trustees John Domaszek**, **George Haas**, and **Patrick Kressin**, whose terms all expire on April, 19, 2022.

To qualify as a candidate, you must be a citizen of the Village of Elm Grove, age 18 or older, have resided in the Village for at least 10 days before any election, and be an eligible elector.

The first day for circulating nomination papers is December 1, 2021. The deadline to file nomination papers, declaration of candidacy, and campaign registration statements with the Village clerk is not later than 5 p.m. on Tuesday, January 4, 2022. Elm Grove Plan Commission to Hold Public Hearing on Possible Tax Incremental District (TID)

(ELM GROVE) On Monday, December 6th at 6:00 p.m. in the Court Room at Village Hall, the Plan Commission will hold a Public Hearing for public comment on the proposed creation of Tax Incremental District #3, its proposed boundaries, and its proposed Project Plans. The Plan Commission may take action on a recommendation of the Project Plan to the Board of Trustees at this meeting.

Additionally, the Commission will continue the review and possibly make a

recommendation to the Board of Trustees on the request for approval of a Certified Survey Map, Comprehensive Plan Amendment, Conditional Use Permit (Continued Cemetery Use), Rezoning and Redevelopment Plan for the School Sisters of Notre Dame Campus.

On the morning of November 6, a



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

Village Update

Dr. Jon Robinson, Elm Grove EMS Director, has been named "Physician of the Year" by the Wisconsin EMS Association.
Dr. Robinson organized a local COVID-19 vaccination effort which provided first and second dose vaccinations to more than 1,000 residents and Village staff. Jon, his wife Sue and others have grown and staffed the Village EMS service over the past 3 decades. While most of us likely do not want to see the EMS at our door step, I hope everyone is grateful to have such a highly skilled and dedicated service one phone call away.

The Village Board of Trustees held a public hearing in late November to receive public comments on the request to rezone the land of the School Sisters of Notre Dame campus from the current Institutional Use to Residential and Planned Development Overlay (PDO) and to amend the existing Comprehensive Plan. Twenty residents spoke both for and against the proposed rezoning by ZOOM and in person.

Informal discussions of redevelopment of the School Sisters campus began about 5 years ago. After the Sisters announced they had selected Mandel the consideration became more formalized as shown on the charts.

In addition to all the events listed above there have been numerous small group meetings with different groups in the Village. The Village staff, Attorney, Finance Director and the Village president have participated in hours and hours of meetings with our financial and engineering consultants and negotiating sessions with Mandel and the City of Wauwatosa.

The Village Board continues to consider the request to redevelop the campus zoning, the request for rezoning, Tax Incremental Financing, and negotiating an agreement with the City of Wauwatosa to supply municipal water from Lake Michigan. It is anticipated that the Board will act on some or all these matters before the end of the year.

The Public Works Committee and the Ad Hoc Pathway Committee held a joint meeting to discuss a comprehensive planning approach for roadway and pathway improvements. The Village Board has expressed strong support for efforts to improve and expand the Village pathway system while also maintain streets. The two groups will meet again in January, after the completion of street condition evaluation. The goal of the two committees is to create a plan and calendar for future improvements.

At the regular November Village Board meeting the Village Board approved the 2022 Operating and Capital Budgets

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recommended by the Finance Committee. The new budget calls for a total tax levy of \$7,444,435, an increase of \$141,024 or 1.93%. The estimated tax rate on property for the new levy is \$5.9982 per \$1,000 of value. This budget satisfies the requirements of the State levy limits and the State expenditure restraint program.

2022 User fees will increase for sewer service, stormwater management fees and solid waste services to \$1,012.18 for a single-family residence. This 33.59% increase over 2021 is due to a 58% increase in solid waste fees and the Board decision to move the annual Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage District annual charge from tax levy to the user fee.

Also, at the November Board meeting the Village Board voted unanimously to approve a two-year contract with the Police Department Union. The new contract calls for a 2% increase in pay beginning on January 1, 2022 and a 1% increase on July 1, 2022. The same 2%/1% increase was granted to most non-represented staff.

Scale models of Elm Grove buildings from decades past.


My Childhood Memories of Elm Grove By Terry M. Warner

Although, some structures aren't in their original spots (to allow room on a small area), they include: The Depot, Reinders Bros. silos, Wayne's Barber Shop, The "Cove" bar, Elm Grove Inn, Sunset Playhouse (which was originally a turquoise color), The Milwaukee. Road "Cannonball" commuter train* (along w/automobiles that pre-date 1960). The Depot was destroyed in an infamous train wreck (people still talk about). The Cove-bar & barber shop were both destroyed by fires.

Other future models I have planned (waiting in the wings) are C. Sander's Blacksmith Shop, Food Fair groceries, Leland School, & any other buildings (existing or now-gone in 2021), that "played a role" in my childhood. I hope you enjoy 'em.

*Incidentally, that commuter train, came in handy, at times. If Dad's ol' '53-Fordcoupe, wouldn't start on a cold winter's morning, he'd call a taxi to take him down to the depot and catch the 7 a.m. train to his job in downtown Milwaukee.





Kate Gregg-Warren (1855-1908) wrote about childhood friends gathering at their family's home

"When the long winter evenings came on and the family gathered about the blazing wood fire one of the children would be delegated to go down into the cellar and bring up a big pan full of apples. These were Spitenburgs, Greenings and Seeknofathers (all popular 19th Century Wisconsin apples) while a good-sized pitcher of cider would accompany them, and we would all sit down by the hearth to warm a while eating and drinking. Sometimes when young folks came in to spend the evening, a kettle of maple sugar was hung over the fireplace and we would sugar off, bring in pans of snow on which to make wax.

This was rather an expected treat for young people when they came to visit them Greggs. When the evening was past, the guests gone, and the embers on the hearth were sinking low, my father would rise and wind the old wooden clock with its mournful picture of John Quincy Adams expiring in the House of Representatives, and that was a sign for bed. My mother would fold up her knitting, the dusky embers were covered with ashes, and soon the household slumber."



Sisters (Left to right): Sarah, Kate, and Clara—were members of the Gregg family whose family's farm was located in Brookfield (section 25) during the middle years of the 19th Century. Kate married Joseph Warren and managed her family's household throughout most of her adult life. In 1905, Kate wrote a colorful journal describing memories of her childhood days on her family's life on their farm in the Elm Grove area during the 1850s and 1860s.

Register to Receive Landscape Pesticide Notices

(MADISON) – The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer start March 15, when pesticide applicators Protection's (DATCP) landscape pesticide registry is available until February 1, 2022 for homeowners and renters to sign up for 2022 growing season notices. Registrants receive advance notice from commercial lawn care companies that apply pesticides to lawns, trees, and shrubs to nearby property. As a registrant, you can submit addresses on or near your block that you want to receive notification for. There is no cost to register, and you must re-register every year. February 1 is the last day to sign up on the landscape registry for the 2022 season.

To register, use either of the following methods:

- Online: Visit https://mydatcp.wi.gov and click on "Registries/Lists" and select "Landscape Registry."
- Paper: Download, fill out, and mail a paper form available at https://datcp. wi.gov/Pages/Programs_Services/ LandPestReg.aspx.

The landscape pesticide registry will are required to notify individuals at least 12 hours in advance when registered addresses are to be treated with pesticides. The registry applies only to commercial landscape applications. The registry does not apply to the following:

- Homeowners or landlords who do their own pesticide applications
- Pesticide applications to the inside or outside of buildings; including around a workplace, school, or day care center
- Pesticide use in agriculture

This registry is a service offered by DATCP. For the 2021 growing season, over 4,400 addresses were registered to receive notice. Pesticide is a broad term that can include herbicides, fungicides, and insecticides. 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

Elmbrook Rotary's 2021 Business Person of the **Year Announced**

(ELM GROVE) The Elmbrook Rotary Club (ERC) reports that Phil Landry, Owner of C3E Geomatics, LLC, is the recipient of its 5th annual Business Person of the Year Award which recognizes the leadership and accomplishments of a successful Brookfield or Elm Grove individual.

In a span of five years, Phil completed his bachelor's degree and founded C3E Geomatics, LLC, a land surveying company, in 2017. Community support, sharing, and mentoring have been a significant part of Phil's life and career. This includes being a supporter of the Community Warehouse, an organization designed to support backgroundchallenged individuals by providing employment, job skills, and practical housing support. Phil also supports Partners in Hope, a faith-based community reentry program for ex-offenders run by Community Warehouse. C3E Geomatics is also writing a custom career packet about land surveying for The Community, another organization working to aid offenders in their career decisions long before release. The long-term goal is to be able to offer employment opportunities and mentorship to the individuals served by these organizations.

Phil founded his business with the goal of helping ex-offenders because he himself served a two-year prison sentence. During understand that he needed to make a radical District 6270.

change in his life so that he wouldn't end up in prison again. Even with Phil's careful planning for his release (including enrolling in a university, arranging for a place to live, and applying for financial aid), he still needed the additional support of community organizations and a local church in order to get established on the right path. Because he understands the tremendous hurdles ex-offenders face when released back into society, he feels committed to supporting released offenders in the greater Milwaukee area.

In order to continue growing the business he founded in 2017, Phil needed to gain professional licensure in the state of Wisconsin. However, he faced numerous obstacles in this process because of his criminal record. Working with a local assembly member as an advocate, Phil finally obtained licensure and has been able to grow C3E Geomatics from a revenue of \$65,000 in 2017 to \$385,000 in 2020. He is projected to make well over \$500,000 in

Elmbrook Rotary Club was chartered in 1983 and is a part of Rotary International, founded in 1905. 

Defibrillators, Funds for Park Events, Fire Training, and Goats to Eat Invasive **Species Among Funded Projects**

The Elm Grove Junior Guild raises money throughout the calendar year to support many projects; November was the month to donate funds towards specific requests from the Village of Elm Grove for requests totaling \$8,980.

\$2000 Grant - Automatic External Defibrillator (AED) for Public Use

In the case of a sudden unexpected cardiac arrest, automated defibrillators are used to revive an individual while waiting on further emergency medical support. The Village of Elm Grove requested a defibrillator for use either at the Village Park pool house or the Village Hall to use in such emergency situations. The Junior Guild granted \$2,000 towards the purchase of an AED unit.

\$3,400 Grant - Automatic External Defibrillator (AED) for Elm Grove **Police Supervisor Squad Car**

Elm Grove Village Manager David DeAngelis noted, "The Police Supervisor squad car needs a new automatic external defibrillator as the old one has become obsolete. Often times the Police Sergeant / Supervisor is the primary or 2nd responding police officer to EMS calls. As has been demonstrated early defibrillation is one of the most significant medical resuscitative interventions in cardiac arrest. Elm Grove has many residents who have survived cardiac arrest because of police EMT intervention with defibrillation prior to the ambulance arrival." This \$3,400 grant will go towards purchase of a top of the line AED for the police.

\$580 Grant - Fire Department Training Materials

The volunteer fire department in Elm Grove graciously donates time and resources towards outreach in Elm Grove schools, preschools, and an annual open house during October's Fire Prevention Month. While there, the firefighters distribute information about fire safety to children. These funds will purchase materials to educate our youngest citizens



about the dangers of fires.

\$1,000 Grant - "Tunes on Tuesday" **Concerts in the Park Series**

A favorite annual occurrence at the Elm Grove Village Park is the "Tunes on Tuesday" series of outdoor concerts. Sometimes it feels like all of Elm Grove is in attendance! This \$1,000 grant will go towards costs associated with putting on this beloved summer music series.

\$1,000 Grant - Movies in the Park **Summer Series**

In the summer, village residents get to enjoy free outdoor movies for all ages. Broadcast on an outdoor screen and accompanied by popcorn and the stars, this movie series in the past has included Disney movie favorites and great summer flicks. This \$1,000 grant will assist the recreation department in putting on this movie series.

\$1,000 Grant - Goats for Village Park **Invasive Species Control**

I have intentionally saved the most interesting item for last, which is \$1,000 towards renting a pack of traveling goats to help manage invasive species in the Elm Grove Village Park. Many of us learn as children that goats will eat nearly anything, and that includes invasive plant species like buckthorn, garlic mustard, and even poison ivy! The Elm Grove Beautification Committee will use these funds to fence off an area of the park, secure the goats, and put on an event where the public can see this in action. Buying Investment Real Estate – How to Protect Your Personal Assets

When you purchase a piece of real estate for investment purposes to rent, to flip, or to use as a vacation or second home, you should purchase the property using a Limited Liability Company in order to protect the other assets you own.

Yes, owning a property in the name of a Limited Liability Company has costs.

- Filing fee for the Articles of Organization in Wisconsin \$130.00
- Annual Report Filing in Wisconsin \$50.00
- Legal Fees to prepare an Operating Agreement (less than you are probably thinking)
- Filing of a separate tax return every year
- Separate insurance policy
- Increased interest rate (as rates are higher for investment property as opposed to homestead)

Yet, those costs are far less than the risk you have to your personal assets if you

don't purchase using a Limited Liability Company.

Example: If you rent the property to a third party and someone slips and falls, you will most likely have enough insurance in place to satisfy the amount due as determined by the parties involved, and/or the court if the matter were to go to trial. However, what if a horrific fire takes place and lives are lost, will you have enough insurance coverage? If not, if you own the property in your name, then all assets in your name (personal assets) are free for the taking. Whereas, if the property is owned by the Limited Liability Company, only the assets of that Limited Liability Company are available for the taking – which would be just that one single property.

Chances are low -but, depending on your risk tolerance, and your personal assets, you may want to consider owning any property, other than your homestead, in a Limited Liability Company.




