Reinders Property Re-development Project "On Hold" for Now

"To build, or not to build..."

That is the question that has been the subject of much public and private discussion and debate for most of the last 12 months by Wangard Partners, who want to re-develop /re-zone the Reinders property in downtown Elm Grove into a \$47 million, 174 unit complex (townhomes, apartments, commercial space); by a Village Ad Hoc committee which met for months before recently issuing a statement of its recommendations; by Elm Grove and area residents and businesses, whose often strong opinions have ranged from 'Build accept or reject a plan would be taken).

it, now' to 'Build it, never' and a number of variations in between.

In the days prior to the January 23 Board of Trustees meeting, Wangard Properties issued an official re-development proposal to the Village, causing the item to be placed on the agenda with the possibility that the Board could vote to pass the proposal on to the Plan Commission. This would be just one of many steps in the multi-committee process that, according to Village president Neil Palmer, "would take one year to get to the final plan" (when a Board vote to

Following a presentation of the Reinders plan by Wangard Property representatives and time allowed for public comment, Trustee Tom Michalski made a motion to deny forwarding the proposal to the Plan Commission, stating his disappointment Wangard did not address (enough) certain Ad Hoc Committee recommendations (notably building height and density issues). Trustee George Haas discussed tabling it. President Palmer agreed, noting that it would allow added time for Board members to meet one-on-

While no Village offices will be on the Primary Election ballot this month, residents of Elm Grove will vote for candidates for the State Superintendent of Public Instruction and those vying for the School District of Elmbrook - Area III seat: Jimmy Schulgit, Jian Sun, and Leanne Wied.

The top two Primary vote getters for each position will be listed on the April 4 Spring Election ballot. Also included will be candidates (Jon J. Dzurak and Allison Malnar) for the currently vacant Area I (3-year term) School Board seat, and the At-Large Seat (incumbent Kathryn Wilson), the State Supreme Court, Waukesha County Circuit Court Judge, and the office of Elm Grove Village President (Neil Palmer, incumbent).

Four candidates are hoping to secure one of the three available seats (2year terms) on our Village Board of Trustees. These include incumbents Patty Kujawa, Thomas Michalski, and Katy Cornell, (who was appointed just months ago to fill the seat of Jack Nelson, following his resignation), and challenger Jim Koleski.



one with Wangard in the coming weeks to "come up with more concrete ideas about what would be acceptable... (and) iron out specifics." The Board voted 5 in favor; 1 abstention; 1 member, not present.

Village Manager Dave De Angelis interjected that future discussion should center on "what's economically viable" regarding profit/return on investment for the developer and "overall value to the Public /Village."

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Past Times: I REMEMBER...

Painesville

Southeastern Wisconsin contains the remnants of many crossroad settlements, reminders of embryonic towns of the mid-nineteenth century. Some of these communities briefly flourished and thrived, while others remained crossroads hamlets. Ultimately, however, most were absorbed into larger surrounding villages and towns. Examples in our immediate area would include Prospect Hill and Calhoun Farms in New Berlin, Fussville in Menomonee Falls, Dheinsville in Germantown and Goerke's Corners in the Town of Brookfield. At one time, Elm Grove could easily have suffered the same fate, absorbed into the city of Brookfield, but incorporation as a village in 1955 stayed that fate.

In my Past Times column of June, 2016 I offered a patriotic salute to Thomas Paine, the American pamphleteer whose booklets Common Sense and The Crisis shaped the philosophical arguments in support of the American Revolution of 1776. In this context, I briefly noted my interest in Painesville, a nineteenth century settlement of German immigrants at the intersection of Ryan Road and old Highway 41 (now S. 27th Street) in the present-day city of Franklin. In the ensuing months, several readers expressed an interest in knowing more. Accordingly, with their curiosity in mind, I decided to devote this month's column to sharing that community's unique and interesting history. Its founding owed much to political discord in Europe.

Painesville was an 1852 settlement established by Achtundvierzigers, or "Forty-Eighters", German reformers who had tried unsuccessfully to overthrow the petty aristocracy that ruled the German states. The reader may wish to know that Germany would not be united as one country until 1871. Prior to that time, "Germany" was really a region of 39 separate German states, all united by a common language and culture, but divided by longstanding geographical and religious rivalries. Hereditary 'royal families' ruled in each of these states. Some were benign while others were more repressive.

A spirit of democratic revolution swept through Europe in 1848. In Hungary, freedom fighter Lajos Kossuth led a revolt against the ruling Austrian Habsburg monarchy. Ultimately unsuccessful, Kossuth came to the United States to raise money for arms to make a second attempt. President Millard Fillmore placed a U.S. Navy gunboat at his disposal in 1852 and Kossuth toured the Midwest on inland rivers, giving prodemocracy speeches and lectures while taking contributions from his audiences who viewed him as a hero.

In the German states, meanwhile, other aborted revolutions were slapped down, and attempts in Frankfort to write a constitution for a German republic failed. Seeking refuge from kingly absolution (and remembering that it is never wise to remain if one is on the losing side of a power struggle), many of these failed revolutionaries emigrated to the United States, and large numbers of them found their way to Milwaukee, where earlier waves of German immigrants had already been well received, forming the basis of a thriving Teutonic subculture. My maternal great-great grandfather, Heinrich Bloedel, a blacksmith from Oppenheim in Hessen, was one such '48er, arriving in 1854.

Wisconsin's Achtundvierzigers became active in a wide variety of cultural and political organizations. On July 18, 1853, **August Willich** and other '48ers founded

the Milwaukee Turnverein, or the Turners, a German gymnastic and intellectual society dedicated to improvement of mind and body. (Turner Hall at 1032 N. 4th Street, now a local landmark, was not built until 1882, but still serves as their headquarters today, in addition to being a destination for concerts and fish frys.) The Turners became active in local politics. Challenging a municipal ban on Sunday dances in 1870 and demanding that immigrants be allowed to vote in city elections, whether naturalized citizens or not. Turnvereins had been forbidden in Prussia by orders of the king.

To the south of Milwaukee, a small group of Germans moved to the area near Ryan Road, along the old highway that led toward Chicago. There they founded Painesville, named in honor of Thomas Paine, whom they regarded highly as the intellectual hero of the American Revolution. Originally Lutherans, they broke away from St. John's Lutheran congregation one mile further south and formed the Freiegemeinde (or "Free Society"), freethinkers who would worship separately. In 1852, at a cost of \$370, they built a 24 by 36 foot wooden chapel in which to hold their services. Although critical of the organized church, they were not atheists or agnostics, but embraced the Deism of American Founding Fathers like Paine, Benjamin Franklin and Thomas Jefferson. Portraits of Paine and Franklin graced the front of their sanctuary, as did a framed copy of the Declaration of Independence, which they viewed as the highest order of political polemics and a stolid defense of the freedom of the individual. Members sat on hardback wooden pews to hear Sunday lectures.

Painesville grew as a crossroads settlement, but never became an incorporated village, remaining as only a tiny segment of Franklin Township. To the west of the chapel a cemetery was founded, with the earliest burials dating to 1852. Some of the family names on the headstones can still be found in Franklin and Oak Creek today. An inn featuring an upstairs ballroom was built facing the highway. It survives today as the Buckhorn tavern and is the only building besides the chapel remaining from the days of historic Painesville.

The theology of Painesville's Freethinkers echoed Thomas Paine's simple affirmation in his 1794 Age of Reason: "I believe in one God, and no more; and I hope for happiness beyond this life. I believe in the equality of man; and I believe that religious duties consist in doing justice, loving mercy and endeavoring to make our fellow creatures happy."

Rev. Carl Gustave Reusch, who had resigned his pastorate at St. John's Lutheran Church, was named as the small congregation's first "Speaker" (as their pastors were called.) Guest lecturers were often invited, including Carl Schurz, a Forty-Eighter who would eventually become a Union Army general in the Civil War, a United States Senator and gain appointment as Secretary of the Interior by President Rutherford B. Hayes in 1877. (Schurz' wife founded America's first kindergarten in Watertown.) Another guest lecturer was Milwaukee craftsman and alderman Emil Seidel who would become the city's mayor in 1910 and would later run for governor and U.S. Vice-President.

By 1902 the Free Society had dwindled to only a few members and the congregation ceased to meet. The chapel fell into disrepair and local citizens considered tearing it down. Undertaking a nationwide survey of historic buildings for the federal government in 1934, architect **Alexander Carl Gurth** stumbled

upon the Painesville Chapel and proclaimed it as "one of the most outstanding buildings I found in twenty years of studying such structures", adding that it would be "almost a sacrilege" to level it. Congress would later place the building on the National Register of Historic Places, a designation it still enjoys. Its German language hymnals were found to be quite rare.

Subsequently, the Painesville Memorial Association was founded in 1937 and undertook a renovation of the deteriorating structure over the next five years at a cost of \$1,200, with much labor donated or contracted at reduced "charitable" rates. Today the group is led by **Judy** and **Steve Gyuro** of Franklin. They have donated countless hours of hard work in carrying on that unselfish tradition. For them, it has been a labor of love.

In 1960, noted architect **Richard W. E. Perrin**, under the auspices of the Wisconsin chapter of the American Institute of Architects, published a guide to historic buildings in Wisconsin. He remarked that the Painesville Chapel was of a "Colonial type... with gable roof and pedimented doors and windows", apparently deeming it worthy of inclusion with other historic structures such as Cedarburg's covered bridge and Watertown's Octagon House.

For the past decade, it has been my privilege to be a member of the Painesville Memorial Association. It is still dedicated to preserving the memory of Painesville and

maintaining the little white chapel that once served the settlers for their religious services, public meetings and community gatherings. It is worth reflecting that the call to liberty contained in the writings of Thomas Paine was so far-reaching that it not only gave resolve to **Gen. George Washington** and his troops at Valley Forge in 1777 but even 75 years later gave inspiration to a group of German immigrants in the young state of Wisconsin, causing them to singularly honor his name.

In 2003, my good friend Frank P. Zeidler, mayor of Milwaukee from 1948 to 1960, was asked to translate flowery German script found on the back of a portrait of Robert Glatz, the second Speaker at the Painesville Chapel. He arrived at this English paraphrase: "Wisdom strives when it is combined with pure knowledge and youthful, striving courage to teach us that the times guide us. Complete satisfaction in life is found where earnest thought and powerful feelings are combined to courageously break through any constraints."

Frank appended this notation to his translation: "The Forty-Eighters in Milwaukee County and in the United States are credited by thoughtful historians with greatly strengthening United States democracy."



American Legion Post 449 in Brookfield has become the largest American Legion Post in the state of Wisconsin! The merger of Milwaukee east side Post 23 and local Post 449 was formally approved on September 12, 2016 by the American Legion National Executive Committee. The move utilizes the excellent facilities of Post 449 located at 3245 N. 124th St in Brookfield.

"Now we have a responsibility as a joint family and the largest Post in the state of Wisconsin to set the example for others to follow," cited **Mike Daigle**, Post 449 Commander. He emphasized the importance of upholding the commitment of this Post to our Veterans.

The formal name – Cudworth, Stenz, Griesell, and Smith Post 449, finds it significance in honoring fallen Service Members. **Alonzo Cudworth**, a World War I Veteran, died August 29, 1918 near Juvingy France, while advancing on enemy lines. **Lt. Paul Stenz**, killed October 15, 1942 and **Lt. Robert Griesell**, killed June 21, 1943, both died in flight training crashes. **Sgt. Arthur Smith** was killed in action during World War II on May 5, 1944 in Italy.

You may remember the original location of Post 449 on Legion Drive in Elm Grove. The original charter was received there in early 1946. **George Reinders**, a highly successful local businessman, donated eight lots for the emerging Post. Through the hard work and dedication of its members and Auxiliary Units, the Post found its way into existence. The first meeting was held on the 4th anniversary of D-day, June 6, 1948. It grew through the years, going through various forms of remodeling and major additions. Due to severe flood damage sustained on August 6, 1998, the Post needed major remodeling to continue. The stay at that location continued until the new Post was opened in Brookfield in mid-2003.

The American Legion mission is strong at Post 449 through Veteran members, the Women's Auxiliary, and the Sons of the American Legion. Through its activities and support/outreach programs, Post 449 upholds the founding principles of the four pillars: Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation, National Security, Americanism, and Children and Youth.

The Post is thriving and encourages all to stop by for a visit. With excellent kitchen and bar facilities, as well as a rentable banquet hall that can seat 20 -200, the Post can accommodate many functions. 

Kartik, a 4th grader, correctly spelled "voltmeter" to secure the title. Top District spellers will now move on to compete at the Regional Spelling Bee.



For Whom the Bell Tolls

Many of us recall the famous quote from John Donne: "Any man's death diminishes me because I am involved in mankind; and therefore send to know for whom the bell tolls, it tolls for thee."

Perhaps many of you have wondered about the tolling of the bells at Notre Dame of Elm Grove at 2:30 p.m. on a given afternoon. It all started several years ago when Sister Louise Van Straten together with Tim Dewane, the SSND Shalom Director, initiated the FOR WHOM THE BELL TOLLS ritual. It was part of a campaign to end the death penalty as well as a call to respect all human life.

On the day preceding an execution Sisters and staff at Notre Dame of Elm Grove are invited to gather at the Bell Tower at 2:30. During the 2-minute bell toll all pray in silence. When the tolling stops the leader announces the name of the

person to be executed and asks the group to pray for the person facing execution, his/her victim, the victim's family, the executioners, for forgiveness for all involved in the execution, for an end to the death penalty and that all life is respected from conception to natural death. The ceremony concludes with the assembled group praying aloud the Lord's Prayer.

Thus the bell toll serves as a reminder of the dignity of all life. If you hear the bells at your home, we invite you to stop for 2 minutes and pray with us, remembering that all life is sacred. Pray with us for an end to the death penalty and that all life will be respected from conception to natural death.

Estate Planning: If You Do Nothing Else...

Everyone 18 years of age and older should have both a General Durable Power of Attorney, also referred to as a financial power of attorney and a Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care. Once you are legally an adult, there are only two means by which someone else could obtain the authority to handle your finances and make medical decisions for you. The first is through the two powers of attorney. With these documents, you yourself appoint "agents," one for your finances and one for your health care. Having both of these documents is just as important if you are married as it is if you are single. In the State of Wisconsin, your spouse does not legally have the right to make financial and medical decisions for you, regardless how long you have been married.

Your financial agent and your health care agent have completely separate roles. You can however, appoint the same person for both. You can also name an alternate agent who would serve if your primary agent is unable. Moreover, the health care power of attorney has a section in which you can detail your specific wishes regarding health care; for example, any religious preferences you may have, or your willingness to be an organ donor. Overall, the powers of attorney allow you to address the possibility of incapacity in a highly personalized but inexpensive manner.

The only other means by which someone else has the authority to act on your behalf if you are incapacitated would be through a guardianship. Under a guardianship proceeding, a Court declares you to be incompetent and removes your rights to handle your own health care and financial decisions and assigns those rights over to another person, known as the guardian, to exercise on your behalf. The person who handles your finances is known as the "guardian of the estate," and the one who handles your personal and health care decisions is known as the "guardian of the person." These are again separate roles which may be filled by the same individual. Once appointed, the guardian of the person will have to file an annual report regarding your personal welfare and the guardian of the estate will have to file a detailed annual account of how your assets have been spent throughout the year. Once a guardianship has been put into place, it is almost always permanent. The only way to reverse a guardianship would be to prove to the Court's satisfaction that your mental competence has been restored. A guardianship is a stressful and expensive legal proceeding which can generally be avoided if the proper powers of attorney are in place.
