### 'Underwood Creek Daylighting Project' Public Meeting – February 15

'Daylighting' is the process of opening a waterway that has been artificially channeled underground in a pipe.

(A portion of the Underwood Creek in the Village of Elm Grove's downtown area, near the Park & Shop was, in fact, daylighted for a period of time decades ago, as noted in a Past Times column: September 2017 - News-Independent).

Now, after years of discussion about waterway, Village officials have scheduled a Public Information Meeting this month to give details about the current project

and encourage feedback from community residents and business owners.


The meeting will be held on Thursday, February 15, in the Community Room, lower level of Elm Grove Village Hall, 13600 Juneau Blvd., starting with a presentation at 5:30 p.m., and followed by an open house format with time for questions and answers through 7:30 p.m.

According to an official Village meeting the possibility of again 'daylighting' the notice, the planned project includes "relocating and naturalizing a section of Underwood Creek from its current location beneath the Sendik's building and

parking lot. Topics to be discussed include project background, design, grant funding opportunities and possible future amenities."

Winter 2017 – 18 has been a great reminder of the vagaries of weather. We have a week of 40 degrees followed by snow and single digits. Wisconsin weather is never boring.

I hope you have an opportunity to stop in the Underwood Creek Open House meeting described on this page. The meeting is Thursday February 15th from 5:30 until 7:30 p.m. in the Community Room in the basement of Village Hall.

Underwood Creek runs through a large pipe under the Park and Shop parking lots and under the Sendik's grocery store. We have been working to facilitate the daylighting of the creek since 2003 when work on the downtown flood control project began. The underground pipe has been a maintenance and safety challenge for many, many years. The current route of this pipe blocks any efforts to renovate and improve the shopping area and is a major impediment to improving the environmental health of the creek channel.

### **Citizen Police Academy Seeks Participants**

John J. Ahern, "Jack" — a former Elm Grove resident — died early Thursday, January 4, 2018, in Martinez, California. He began his life on May 11, 1940 in Chicago, Illinois and was raised as one of four children of John and Helen Ahern, eldest sibling to Tom, Janet and Mary. He earned a Bachelors of Liberal Arts degree at Marquette University in Milwaukee, WI, where he met several lifelong friends. He met his wife, Barbara Miller, on Waikiki Beach on Hawaii in 1967 while in the U.S. Navy Reserves. Married on July 12, 1969 in Sacramento, CA, they lived first in Chicago and then settled in Oconomowoc, WI to raise three children, Patrick, Jeannine and Carrie.

Jack founded an industrial sales business, The Ahern Company, which he started in Wisconsin and continued to develop to consistent success to the present. To be closer to family he and Barbara moved back to her home state of California in 1998.

Jack was vibrant socially and politically engaged, loved sports of any kind and refereed soccer, football and basketball for years both as a passion, good exercise and a way to make some extra money. He was a wonderful storyteller in the Irish tradition, charming, quick-witted and sharp — if sometimes long-winded. He loved people and social situations of all stripes, loved to travel and was blessed with a stubborn and independent spirit. He was an active member of the Catholic Church his entire life and felt John J. Ahern ("Jack")

Through continuous efforts, the Village has successfully secured grant funding for final stream channel design and engineering from the Fund for Lake Michigan, the Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewage District (MMSD) and local property owners. We hope to secure grant money for all or most of the construction costs of the proposed work. Creating a new surface level creek channel will solve a recurring engineering and safety issue, solve a state regulatory problem, help secure continuation of a healthy shopping area in the Village and create an attractive natural feature in the Village center. Many residents will remember how much the flood control naturalization efforts improved the Village Park.

**Emerald Ash Borer** infestation continues to claim trees in the Village. Staff and contractors will continue to remove diseased trees on Village property throughout the year. If you have questions about the health The Spring Primary Election is scheduled of trees on your property contact, Ron Hill, the Village Forester, at Village Hall, (262) 782-6700. A positive aspect to the

multiyear removal program we have been pursuing is the wide variety of trees we have planted. Not only does diversification guard against severe impact from new infestations like ash borers or Dutch Elm disease, but it beautifies the Village. Even if you don't have ash tree problems on your property it is important to think about the life span of your trees. Don't wait for their needed removal to plant new trees.

The Village Board Recreation Committee continues to make progress on plans for a children's "splash pad" area at the Village Park swimming pool. Funding for this important improvement has not yet been secured. Village organizations leading volunteer fund raising efforts are important and need your support. ## **Past Times: I REMEMBER...**

### David Rice Atchison, the 11<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> President of the United States

February 19, the third Monday of the month, is Presidents' Day. For most of America's history, George Washington's birthday on February 22 was a legal federal holiday. Washington had been born on February 11, 1732, according to the old calendar then in use, but when the calendar was revised in 1752, the date altered to February 22.

Congress decided in the 1990s to combine the celebration of Washington's birthday with the commemoration of Abraham Lincoln's birthday on February 12, creating the hybrid holiday of Presidents' Day on the third Monday of February, providing an annual three-day weekend for federal employees. (Contrary to popular belief, Lincoln's birthday had never been a legal federal holiday, but was a state holiday in 33 states.)

As an historian, I must confess that I rather miss the setting aside of a day to especially honor our nation's first president under the Constitution. One new advantage to Presidents' Day, however, is that its more generic nature allows Americans a day to celebrate the presidents of their choice, whoever they might be.

Some years ago, I complied a list of my ten favorite presidents. The list is arbitrary, of course, and is only based on my own opinions. It was still a worthwhile exercise, and I would suggest that all readers thoughtfully attempt to do the same. Their lists might be very different from mine, but that is part of the fun of the process. It can tell you a lot about yourself as well.


One man who is unlikely to appear on anyone's list is David Rice Atchison, the Senator that trivia buffs (and some Missourians) insist served as President of the United States for one day. The story behind their claim is an interesting one. In November of 1848, Gen. Zachary Taylor, a hero of the Mexican War, was elected president over his Democratic rival Lewis Cass, former territorial governor of Michigan. Inauguration Day was to be on March 4, which happened to fall on a Sunday. (Inauguration Day was not moved to January until 1937.) Gen. Taylor was a devoutly religious man and so refused to take the oath of office on a Sunday, a day he believed was to be set aside to honor the Lord and not a day on which to confer from Kansas. He died there on January earthly honors on a man. He informed his aides that he would be attending services at Washington D.C.'s Episcopal Church that day, and would be unavailable to take the presidential oath until Monday.

Vice-President was George M. Dallas of Pennsylvania, who believed that his term of office had actually expired on March 3, prior to the adjournment of the Senate. Next in line, therefore, was the President Pro Tempore of the U.S. Senate, and that position was held by Sen. David Rice Atchison of Missouri. (The order of succession is slightly different today, with the Speaker of the House now being third in line.)

David Rice Atchison was born in the tiny hamlet of Frogtown, Kentucky on August 11, 1807. After studying at Transylvania University near Lexington, he moved to Liberty, Missouri and took up the practice of law in 1829 after passing the state bar exam. He served two terms in the Missouri House of Representatives in the 1830s and was appointed as Platte County circuit judge in 1841. Two years later, he was appointed to the U.S. Senate seat previously held by the late Sen. Lewis Linn, who had died in office. Atchison was subsequently elected to serve a full term in his own right. His tenure as a U.S. Senator lasted from October 14, 1843 to March 3, 1855. During that time, he served on the Indian Affairs and State Militia committees and became a co-author, with Sen. Stephen A. Douglas of Illinois, of the Compromise of 1850. He was chosen thirteen times by his fellow senators as President Pro Tempore of the Senate.

On March 4, 1849, Atchison's senate colleagues jokingly reminded him that, under the Constitution, he was now President of the United States due to Taylor's refusal to assume the position until Monday and Polk and Dallas' refusal to accept that their terms could extend another day. Realizing that this constitutional crisis was merely a tempest in a teapot, Atchison took his brief tenure about as seriously as one might expect. He ordered up a steak dinner, retired early and slept peacefully through most of his term. All good presidential decisions!

After his time in the Senate came to an end. Sen. Atchison returned to his law practice and his Missouri farm. When the Civil War broke out in 1861, he enlisted as an officer in the Confederate forces and led border raids into Kansas. In his later years, he retired to his farm in rural Gower, Missouri, only 25 miles 26, 1886 and was buried at Greenlawn

The outgoing president was Democrat James Knox Polk, our 11th chief executive. He flatly rejected the idea that he should serve as president for an additional day, informing his own staff that under the Constitution his term was set to expire at noon on Sunday, and he would not be at his desk longer than that. His irritation over Taylor's religious objections may have been heightened by the fact that the General, as the Whig Party nominee, had defeated fellow Democrat Cass, whom Polk had supported. Whatever the reason, Polk and Taylor were both intransigent and the crisis was at an impasse as Polk made plans to return to his farm near Nashville.


The Constitution allows Congress to establish an order of succession to the presidency if both the president and the vice-president are unable to serve. Polk's

Plattsburg, Missouri is also the location of a statue of Sen. Atchison, erected in 1929 and dedicated by then Missouri Governor Sam Aaron Baker. Over \$15,000 in contributions were collected for the memorial, which proudly proclaims that Atchison was "President for a Day" in 1849. Atchison County, Missouri is named for him, as is the city of Atchison, Kansas. David Rice Atchison is probably not on anyone's list of favorite presidents, but perhaps we should all reconsider that omission. After all, there were no wars or natural disasters during his term of office, and all of his decisions (steak, good humor, a sound sleep) were wise ones. Maybe our 11<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> President deserves at least a tip of the hat and a hearty toast on President's Day.







## **The Medicine Mission**

Every 20 minutes, somebody dies from an overdose of drugs, whether it be intentional or accidental. This has made a big impact on the death rate in the nation, especially in the last 17 years.

We are the Medicine Mission Team, and we are striving to end medication misuse. For St. Mary's Visitation School's Science and Engineering Fair project and as a submission to eCybermission, a national science and engineering competition, we created a timed medicine dispenser. This dispenser revolves around a motor. The motor is connected to a straw, which is connected to our rotating selector, a plastic PVC pipe lid, trimmed down to fit the tube, with a slice cut out of it. The pink pill holder holds the pill in place. We designed the pill holder and printed it in our classroom's 3D printer. The motor, controlled by a Bluetooth app, turns the selector. The pill will stay in place while the empty slice in the selector turns underneath it. The pill underneath the empty space causes the pill to drop, and the chute made out of a Dixie cup catches the pill. The chute then delivers the pill to the hole, causing it to fall out into the little cup that catches it.

The Bluetooth app enables us to do many things. First of all, it uses a complicated system called Hexadecimal, taught to us by the electrician who assisted us with the electrical. With Hexadecimal, we can program the dispenser to rotate a certain number of steps (the way of telling the motor how much to rotate) at a certain time. At that time, a button on the small black box will blink blue. When you push the button, the motor turns. Second, there is a setting where you can program just the amount of steps the motor takes right away. The blue button will flash, but it will not require you to push it.



hospitalization because of accidental and purposeful overdosing. Thus, we have adjusted our machine for the elderly. We have done it especially for the elderly with Alzheimer's or memory loss. The dispenser is controlled with a Bluetooth app. That would help those with memory loss, because, when setting the machine, one must only remember to set the machine and put the medicine in the machine once. This could be done by a caregiver. We have worked hard on our machine, and after many meetings and assemblies, we finally saw it come together. It works beautifully, and we are hoping, with work, it will make an impact on the community.



### Will Social Security Be There for Me? (Part Two)

Last month, we discussed the depletion of the Social Security Trust fund and what it means (and what it doesn't mean) in terms of the future of our Social Security benefits. Now, let's take a trip down memory lane as this is not the first time our nation has faced a shortfall in the Social Security Trust fund.

#### **A Brief History Lesson**

What many future retirees fail to realize is that there have been a number of changes to Social Security in the past - changes that were enacted to support and strengthen the Social Security system for future generations. Two Amendments stand out - the 1977 Amendments and the 1983 Amendment.

#### The 1977 Amendments

By the 1970s, the ratio of elderly population to workers was increasing. Additionally, during the Carter administration, the economy suffered double digit inflation, coupled with very high interest rates, an energy crises, and high unemployment. These factors created a funding shortfall for Social Security. To combat this looming shortfall, Congress passed and Carter signed the 1977 Amendments which raised the payroll tax, increased the wage base, reduced benefits slightly and fixed other mathematical errors in the cost of living adjustment calculation. While this stabilized the Social Security Trust Fund in the short term, by the early 1980's, the system faced another crisis.

#### The 1983 Amendment

Continued high unemployment in the 1980s coupled with over-optimistic assumptions in the Social Security projections, resulted in predictions in 1982 that the Social Security Trust Fund would be exhausted by 1983. President Ronald Reagan created the bipartisan National Commission on Social Security Reform (chaired by Alan Greenspan) to address this crisis. Among the changes recommended by the Commission and adopted in the 1983 Amendment was the taxation of Social Security, the first coverage of Federal employees under Social Security and an increase in the retirement age beginning in the year 2000. By the time of the enactment of the 1983 Amendment, the Trust Fund had reached the point where it would have been unable to fully meet benefit payments. Special legislation was enacted to provide temporary borrowing authority to assure continued payment of benefits by all programs while Congress developed and enacted the 1983 Amendment.

As a result of these changes (particularly the tax increases) the Social Security system began to generate a large shortterm surplus of funds, the surplus of which continued until 2010.

#### So What Does This Mean?

Because of the advance warning, Congress has 17 years to enact legislation modifying the program's scheduled revenues and benefits. This would allow changes to be phased in on a gradual basis so that there would not be drastic reductions in benefits or tax levels faced by future generations. For example, the increase in the Full Retirement Age (FRA) (enacted in the 1983 Amendment), only began to be phased in for individuals reaching age 62 in 2000. Those of us impacted by this change had decades to adjust to the new FRA as we prepared for our own retirement.

### **Brookfield Academy Students Innovate in 3D**

Middle School students at Brookfield Academy are using real world engineering skills in the classroom with the help of a new 3D printer. The school received the printer as part of a grant through the GE Additive Education Program. Students enrolled in the elective course Applied Physics recently created chairs out of newspaper designed to support the weight of a child. Science Teacher Shelly Sullivan, incorporated the 3D printing process into the curriculum, giving students the opportunity to take their chair designs to the next level

"Our students get to ask themselves, 'what would an engineer really do?' Students understand that engineers would use a CAD (computer-aided design) program and we get to use that in our classroom," said Mrs. Sullivan. "Students are seeing their creations printed in 3D which is another way for our students to apply their math and science skills with real world technology."

Students are currently being tasked with creating wind turbines. Last year, students applied their knowledge of aerodynamics to create wind turbines using paper and pencils. This year, student's designs will have a more realistic feel because their

creations will be completed digitally and printed in 3D.

Student **Mia Kandula**, of Elm Grove, enjoys what she is learning in the classroom. "It's exciting to take an idea and create it on the computer and then print a 3D model."

Keeping students engaged and excited about projects is an ongoing effort at all levels at Brookfield Academy. "Having 3D technology in our curriculum doesn't just fit with science, but with ALL our classes because of how we are asking our students to think," Mrs. Sullivan said. "We really want them to build upon the foundation of creativity and problem-solving which starts in our Primary and Lower Schools. When they get to Middle School we are really expanding upon those critical thinking skills."

Nurturing critical thinking skills in the classroom guides students into high school and beyond. "I'd love to see more kids create models from their own designs," she said. "By starting in the classroom and enhancing our current curriculum with the assistance of a 3D printer, we will give our students the tools to grow and learn inside and outside the classroom."
