

Village of Elm Grove to Offer Free Covid-19 Vaccines to Eligible Residents

In reaction to the reality of both nationwide and statewide COVID-19 shortages, plans are underway by the Village of Elm Grove to provide a limited amount of COVID-19 vaccinations to community residents who meet current eligibility criteria, especially those who may be having the most difficulty in securing appointments at other locations.

Dr. Jon Robinson, Director of the Village's Emergency Medical Services (EMS) applied for and received authorization to give the vaccinations and will be assisted by a group of qualified medical individuals from the EMS Service at the Village Hall in the Community Room. Volunteers will be assisting with registration and administrative duties.

Pre-Registration via Email is required. All coordination will be done via email so please do not call Village Hall or Police Dispatch.

For commonly asked questions regarding COVID-19 please refer to the CDC's website: https://www.cdc.gov/vaccines/covid-19

You must also commit for the second dose 21 to 28 days after your vaccination (depending on which vaccine is provided). You must not have had or plan to have any other vaccines within 2 weeks of either vaccination.

Elm Grove residents who meet the following State of Wisconsin criteria may sign up for the vaccinations:

- * Adults, age 65 and older
- * Healthcare workers

Please provide the following information with your request:

- * Name / Age / Eligibility criteria (65+, healthcare worker)
- * Address / E-mail Address
- * Phone Number(s)

Residents for whom we obtain vaccine will be contacted by e-mail the weekend prior to the vaccination. The exact date, time, and location will be provided at that time.

Village Manager **David DeAngelis** noted during a discussion at the January 25th Board of Trustees meeting that, by providing this COVID-19 vaccination opportunity, "We're doing the best that we can for our residents during the pandemic."

Village Update


The new Elm Grove Village Park skating rink has been a big hit since opening in January. The weather has generally cooperated to keep the surface frozen and skaters have cooperated by following rules on rink use. The rink is a great addition to winter outdoor recreation opportunities in our Park for children and adults.

The Village Board recently took another step to evaluate the possible creation of a "Transportation Utility" to fund road and pathway construction and maintenance. An advisory consulting team including Ehlers Public Finance Advisors and raSmith Engineers were selected to help the Board evaluate options. Current state law restricts the methods and the amount of money any municipality can use to pay for local roads. A decade of declining state funding and increasing costs have made it impossible to maintain a quality transportation system without borrowing a large amount of money annually. The Village Board believes that borrowing to pay normal annual expenses is an imprudent budget policy which degrades Village financial rating and options over time.

Expansion of the Village pathway system has been an ongoing desire of many Village residents for years. The Village Board established a priority ranking of which new path should be built next. The addition of new pathways has been terribly slow due to funding difficulties. Most of the projects desired will likely exceed \$1 million each. Village Board members and residents agree that we need to reevaluate the location of and priority list of new pathways along with investigating possible new funding options. At its January meeting, the Board agreed to form an Ad Hoc Pathway Committee. The new Committee will include existing members of the Public Safety, Public Works and Finance committees and members of the public. The Pathway Committee will be tasked with preparing recommendations in time for 2022 budget development this summer.

For 16 years the Village has been working on ways to fund the daylighting of **Underwood Creek** through the downtown area. This would address the deteriorating condition of the box culvert that goes through the Park and Shop parking lot and under the Sendik's building to fulfill our obligations to our Memorandum of Understanding with the DNR. The MOU was part of the state permitting process for the Elm Grove flood control project. While many years have passed, we have made progress. We completed project engineering with grant money and have now received two additional grant awards. The Fund for Lake Michigan has granted the Village \$200,000 for general use on the project and the Sustain our Great Lakes (SOGL) program has awarded us \$300,000 for construction related expenses. Receipt of these grants is a major milestone. Years of work by staff and Board members seeking grants, in competition against hundreds of other projects, is being rewarded. The Village will continue to seek additional grant funding for construction and is beginning some land acquisition as well as continuing to work with site area landowners. While many more steps are needed to get this project done it is possible to see "the end of the tunnel" and a new pathway along a flowing Underwood Creek. (See the above graphic of the conceptual cross section facing south.)

The Village Board's January 25th meeting lasted until midnight with much of the time devoted to a presentation by

Mandel Development of the revised proposals to redevelop the School Sisters of Notre Dame campus and also to public comments. Mandel described the proposal changes prompted by continued engagement with site neighbors and community members. Some neighbors and residents spoke in support and applauded the proposal changes. Some neighbors and residents continued to oppose the project as presented and cited various concerns such as density, high value rental versus condos, traffic and impact on schools.

The Village Board members supported the ongoing cooperative efforts of Mandel and community residents to address community concerns. The Board agreed that the project proposal is sufficiently developed to begin the detailed formal review proscribed in the Village code. The Village Planning Commission, Building Board and Public Works Committee will play key roles in evaluating various aspects. The Village will be hiring independent traffic engineering experts, financial consultants, engaging our Village engineers at Reukert & Mielke and hiring other consultants as needed. The project developer will be required to reimburse the Village for costs of project review.

The School Sisters will be vacating their facilities this summer. Redevelopment of the School Sister campus will have an impact on both the heritage and the future of the Village. Residents want great care to be applied to the project review, and the Board has pledged a detailed and comprehensive analysis before consideration of project approvals.

The Village Board and committee members will be investigating and evaluating dozens of specific issues. The public is invited to follow and provide comments and questions throughout the process. There will be numerous public meetings and public hearings to be held prior to any votes on the proposal. During the "Conceptual Review" process over the past year the Village Board has compiled a great deal of information and questions to inform investigations. The Village has also renewed efforts to bring municipal water, preferably from Lake Michigan, to the Village as part of the School Sisters campus redevelopment. Having the development pay for a significant portion of a new water extension would bring significant savings for residents.

Redevelopment of the School Sister Elm Grove campus will be the biggest project in Elm Grove Village history. **Consideration** of redevelopment includes many big

questions like:

- Can the two historic buildings be restored and preserved as desired by the Sisters?
- How is that effort paid for?
- How is demolition of the other site buildings accomplished and paid for?
- What is the best use of the site after the Sisters leave? Keep it zoned "Institutional" which permits hospitals and schools and like uses without seeking rezoning. Or, should we support a rezoning to residential use? What kind and how much of residential?
- What are the different possible impacts and benefits of each possible land use?
- How do we balance impacts versus benefits?

Each of the broad topics above produce numerous specific issues and challenges requiring detailed study.

The April Village election will feature six candidates for three Trustee spots and two candidates for Village President.

The Founding of Notre Dame of Elm Grove

In the fall of 2021, the School Sisters of Notre Dame (SSND) will start moving to their new home at Trinity Woods on the Mount Mary University campus, ending 162 years of continual residence in Elm Grove. The complex known today as Notre Dame of Elm Grove (NDEG), started with one building and over the years it grew to meet the ever-changing needs of the congregation. This article, the first of a six-part series, will look at how the SSND lived and ministered in Elm Grove.

Legend has it that in 1855, Mother Caroline Friess, superior of the SSND in North America, traveled on the Watertown Plank Road on her way to Watertown. When she was about nine miles west of Milwaukee, the horse pulling her carriage abruptly stopped and refused to go any further. Mother Caroline took this as a sign from God that this was the location where she would build a convent and orphanage.

While this is a good story, it is more likely that Mother Caroline learned about the area that is now Elm Grove from George Betzolt, a generous benefactor who had three daughters in the congregation (a fourth entered in 1861). In 1856, Mother Caroline bought 40 acres of land at the present-day site of NDEG from George.

She built a two-story brick building that served as a convent, female orphanage and small country school. The new mission opened on January 6, 1859 under the title "Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary." In July 1860, the convent chapel and cemetery were blessed.

In an undated letter, written about 1860, Mother Caroline described life at Elm Grove. The property had a small farm that raised mostly vegetables. According to Mother Caroline, the Sisters were unable to raise grains, because they could not afford to pay workers and they did not have the necessary buildings and tools.

The Sisters had a small cow barn located on their neighbor's property, which included three cows, six pigs and chickens. The farm produced butter, cheese, eggs and vegetables, which were used to feed the residents of the convent and orphanage. Any extras were sent to the Milwaukee Motherhouse in exchange for things like meat, flour and sugar.

The orphan girls were kept busy in a variety of ways. In the winter they attended school and in the summer they helped the house Sister in the vegetable garden. They also helped with the animals, including leading the cows to the pasture in the nearby woods each day. The girls were also responsible for heating the building, by gathering branches in the woods, which were abundant, especially after a storm.

The Motherhouse in Milwaukee would send clothes that had belonged to the Sisters before they took vows. These were taken apart and remade into dresses and other

children, who were taught in German and English. Sisters gladly accepted cash or firewood for tuition. Catholics in the area did not have a church, so the sisters opened their chapel to their neighbors and earned money by charging pew rent for those who attended Mass there.

In 1863, Mother Caroline bought a farm, which consisted of 90 acres, a frame house, barns and sheds. She bought more land in 1864 and 1865, which increased the size of the property from the original 40 acres to approximately 200 acres. The extra land allowed the Sisters to expand the farm, which will be the focus of next month's article.


A Reflection By Sister Barbara Pfarr, SSND

Sisters from all over Wisconsin, as well as those serving in other parts of the U.S., Guam and our missions in Africa and Latin America, gathered to celebrate and honor this important milestone. After prayer in the chapel, we processed with colorful banners and joyful music to the cemetery and the gravesites of our beloved Sisters.

When it became clear that NDEG was too big for our current needs, it broke our hearts, but knowing that the sale would mean more funds for our ministries, the decision was made to sell and move. Today, we celebrate the many sisters and ministries that went before us and prepare for our exciting future.


During the forum each candidate will present opening and closing comments, answers to predetermined questions from a moderator, and answers to questions presubmitted from the public as time permits.

Elmbrook Rotary Club Receives Rotary Foundation Global Grant

(ELM GROVE) The Elmbrook Rotary Club (ERC) has received approval for a Global Grant of nearly \$98,000 from The Rotary Foundation.

The grant will purchase one neonatal and two pediatric ventilators in Santo Domingo, Ecuador, for Andean Health & Development's (AHD's) locally-staffed teaching hospital. A woman from the area expressed her joy after hearing of the ventilators' arrival. Previously, she experienced the tragedy of losing a child due to a lack of ventilator availability.

AHD is a Madison-based non-profit with Milwaukee roots. Elmbrook Rotary has supported their physician residency program for several years. Now the ventilators from the Global Grant will be utilized in AHD's hospital's Neonatal ICU, which is one of the only such units in the country of Ecuador. Although the equipment purchase will generate immediate impact for the community, it is actually part of a greater investment in a healthcare model for Ecuador and beyond.

The objective of purchasing the ventilators is primarily to provide high quality care right now to some of the country's poorest people, those living on less than \$4/day. The direct beneficiaries are the newborns and their very low-income families who cannot afford services. Children and adults with COVID-19 will also benefit, as Ecuador was one of the hardest hit countries by the pandemic in Latin America.

The Rotary Area of Focus for the Global Grant is "Maternal and Child Health." Elmbrook Rotary provided \$51,820 for the project, which included direct support from the club and its foundation along with donations from both Rotarians and non-Rotarians alike. The Rotary Foundation (TRF) paid out \$47,300 in matching funds from its World Fund in support of the Global Grant (which includes \$11,000 of District Designated Funds—DDF—from local Rotary District 6270).

A TRF Global Grant entails partnership with a Rotary Club in another country. Through champion **Daniel Leon** and club members, the Rotary Club of Tsachila de



Santo Domingo, Ecuador, served as the Host Club, provided much support for the local details, and continues to coordinate the implementation of the grant.

In addition, the project was spearheaded by ERC Rotarian Jim Dunn, who also serves on the Advisory Board of Andean Health & Development. Mr. Dunn reports the following about the Global Grant: "Against all odds, and despite my coleadership, we have succeeded. Daniel, his club in Santo Domingo, and I enjoyed working together. We will even more when we raise a glass the next time I visit Ecuador."

Dunn continued: "I extend special gratitude to The Rotary Foundation, to Rotary International District 6270, to the great generosity of the members of the Elmbrook Rotary Club, and to many others for their fantastic support. Special thanks go also to the Rotary Club of Tsachila de Santo Domingo for its tremendous support and leadership. I had the pleasure of meeting their members in person when I traveled to Ecuador to see the grand opening of this hospital. This Global Grant demonstrates one of the many ways in which Rotarians are making a difference throughout the world. It also is a clear example of Rotary's exemplary teamwork. It's a combination of efforts by Elmbrook Rotary, Rotary District 6270, the Santo Domingo Rotarians, TRF, and AHD. I have no doubt that the new ventilators will go a long way toward providing quality, sustainable services to one of Latin America's lowest resource settings. Thanks to all who made this happen!"

Caroline Bell Moved from Notre Dame of Elm Grove

On December 11, 2020, the School Sisters of Notre Dame (SSND) held a prayer service to mark the removal of the Caroline Bell, which will be taken down from the tower at Notre Dame of Elm Grove, Wisconsin, for its journey to Trinity Woods, the future home of the sisters in the fall of 2021.

The Caroline Bell (also known as the Mother Caroline Memorial Bell, Carolus and the Adoration Chapel Bell) has been on many journeys since the first time it rang on the morning of July 22, 1892, to announce the death of Mother Caroline Friess, foundress of the SSND in North America. In memory of that occasion, the bell bears the words, "The mother I mourn, the daughters I call."

The bell rang out over the east side

the original site. For 13 years, the bell was silenced as it rested in storage at the Marshall Street location. In June 1996, the bell was restored on the grounds of Notre Dame of Elm Grove, where it served the sisters until today. Mother Caroline is buried at Notre

Elmbrook to Offer Universal 4K Program in Fall

(BROOKFIELD) The School District of Elmbrook's Board of Education on January 12 approved adding 4-Year-Old Kindergarten (4K) for the 2021-2022 school year by a vote of 5-2. The 4K offering will be tuition-free and hosted at each District elementary school. Prior to the approval, Elmbrook was one of only five Districts across the state to not offer this half-day, educational program to our community.

"There are many reasons to support this program," said Superintendent Mark Hansen. "It responds to data that demonstrates a 4-year-old school experience has a statistically significant impact on student achievement, it may help qualify the District for additional state aid, and it stabilizes enrollment growth and our operating budget as we exit the pandemic."

School Board President Scott Wheeler voiced his support by noting, "4-Year-Old Kindergarten will help us achieve our early literacy goals and provide equitable access to an early childhood learning experience for all students and families in

our community."

While the District currently offers a private, tuition-based, 4-year-old preschool program, that program will be replaced this Fall (Sept 2021) by a universal 4K program available to all 4-year-old community residents. This half-day program will include transportation to and



from school, and will offer a private, feebased wraparound childcare service at each elementary school. 4K programs have been in place in most Districts across the state for many years, recognized as an opportunity to teach students early literacy and math skills, as well as social and emotional skills needed to be successful in school.

In 2006-2007, Elmbrook Schools participated in a 4K pilot with 50 students attending. That pilot expanded in 2007-08 to 200 students, but the program ended in 2008 after the Board of Education voted to end the pilot rather than pursue a full implementation in 2008-09. 4K has been discussed by several Boards of Education over the years, without a Board discussion and action sequence. In addition to discussing 4K at two Teaching and Learning Board Committee Meetings, the entire Board of Education participated in two work sessions in November and January, as well as the traditional Discussion (December 8) and Action (January 12) sequence that led to the decision.



Estate Planning: Common Mistakes

Most estate planning mistakes fall into one of several categories regardless of the size of the estate or the type of estate plan. These are some of the most common:

Outdated beneficiary designations.

Assets such as retirement accounts, annuities and life insurance have separate beneficiary designations which determine who will receive those funds. These beneficiary designations take precedence over your Last Will and Testament or Revocable Trust. It is, therefore, imperative that you know exactly who those beneficiaries are and that those designations are coordinated with your overall estate plan. Your beneficiary designations should be reviewed every few years, or after any major life event, and you should keep a copy of each one with your financial records.

• Not updating asset titles.

Do you know exactly how each and every one of your assets is titled? Are some assets titled in only one spouse's name, while others are jointly titled? Who actually owns your business? Incorrectly titled assets will absolutely reduce the effectiveness of your estate plan. As with beneficiary designations, asset titles need

to be coordinated with your estate plan and periodically reviewed.

• Not updating the estate plan.

Your life is a work in progress, and you should think of your estate plan the same way. It is unusual for your documents to require updates because of changes in the law. Rather, changes to your life or the lives of your family members will be what necessitates changes to the estate plan. You should review your plan after major life events, or in the absence of any of those, roughly every five years, while also reviewing the beneficiary designations and asset titles at the same time.

• Not fully understanding the plan.

The language used in your estate planning documents will be difficult to understand. While you do not need to understand all of the "legalese," you should have a fundamental understanding of what your estate plan is and how it works to implement your wishes. Without this basic understanding, you will not be able to properly maintain your plan. Take the opportunity to refresh your understanding of your overall plan whenever you review the beneficiary designations, asset titles and your estate planning documents.

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


The top five spellers from the CESA #1 region will advance to the Badger State Spelling Bee, which will be held virtually in March 2021.
