Elm Grove Police Department Announces 2 Retirements, 5 Promotions

In the wake of the retirements of Elm Grove Police Chief Jim Gage, and Assistant Police Chief Jason Hennen, four newly promoted members of the EGPD's command staff were sworn in on the morning of January 7 at Village Hall. The Elm Grove Police and Fire Commission appointed Jason Kubiak to the position of Chief, Ryan Unger to Assistant Chief, Natalie Riley to Lieutenant, and Robert Gilbreath to Sergeant. Christopher Douglas was sworn in as a Sergeant on January 25.

Primary Election February 15th

The Primary will determine which two of the three candidates for Elmbrook School Board's Area II seat will progress to the April 5 - General Election. Glen R. Allgaier (Area II incumbent) and challengers Kathy Lim and Daniel Medeiros will participate (along with the At-Large candidates) in a Candidates' Forum on Monday, February 7, beginning at 6 p.m. at the District Office, 3555 N. Calhoun Rd., Brookfield. The forum, hosted by the Elmbrook Parent Network and Leadership Council, will also be broadcast via live-stream at www.elmbrookschools.org/live.

The April 5 - General Election ballot will include the names of the top two Area II vote-getters from the Primary along with two candidates for the At-Large Seat: Linda A. Boucher (incumbent) and Katie Rasoul. Each Board member represents the entire school district; thus, residents should select one candidate for each seat.

General Election April 5th

In Elm Grove, 5 residents are seeking to fill 3 available seats on the Board of Trustees. They include: Patrick Kressin (incumbent), John Schindler, Jennifer Stuckert, Jim Koleski, and Jim Gage. (Trustees George Haas and John Domaszek filed non-candidacy paperwork and will conclude their terms of service in April 2022.)

An Elm Grove Board of Trustees Candidates' Forum is being planned. Look for details in our March 2022 edition.

Residents Safe Following Fire at Elm Grove Condo

Elm Grove Police, Fire, and Emergency Medical Services arrived at the scene of an active fire at a 4-unit condominium at 13320 Bluemound Rd., Elm Grove at approximately 10:34 a.m. on Tuesday, January 11, just minutes after a second-floor resident called to report that their porch had caught on fire. Heavy smoke and flames were seen emitting from that area of the building and the fire rapidly spread to the attic, causing significant damage to the second floor.

Three of the units were each occupied by one resident; the fourth unit was at the time unoccupied. All of the occupants were able to exit their residences on their own through the front door and no injuries to residents or emergency personnel were reported.

Due to cold weather conditions, Waukesha Metro Transit provided a bus to shelter the displaced residents and provide a safe and warm rehab location for onscene emergency personnel.

The fire necessitated a 2nd level box alarm, consisting of the Village of Elm Grove, plus 13 other area fire agencies. The City of Brookfield Police Department also assisted

The fire remains under investigation and the estimated structural loss is unknown. The Village's 2021 assessment valued the 4-units, including land, at \$536,800.

The Friends of Elm Grove Library (FOEGL) annual "Lights of Love" event

In January I had the honor and pleasure raised \$22,000 for our library in December. Thank you FOEGL for all you do for our library. I will continue to hope for the return of "Bookie Cookies" during the Memorial Day parade.

> The Public Works and Utilities Committee again reviewed and discussed plans to reconstruct Gebhardt Road and install a pathway. It was noted that the community open house found support for the project and prompted more work to consider the proposed intersection re-alignment at Highland Drive. In addition to design considerations, the committee also discussed options for how the project could seek bids in light of the April election referendum question on public works projects.

> The referendum asks whether residents want to adopt an ordinance, that mandates a referendum be held before any public works project with a projected cost greater than \$1 million proceeds.

> The Village consulting engineer outlined the timing difficulties and cost increases to be expected if these projects are required go through a referendum process.

> The Recreation Committee discussed plans to expand facilities for "Pickleball" in the Village Park, including lessons for new players. Final details will be finalized in the near future and new facilities and opportunities will be in place this summer.

> Representatives of Third Space Brewing presented a report on the 2021 season Recreation Committee members and discussed ideas for improving and expanding opportunities in the coming summer. Beer garden attendees expressed very high satisfaction in a survey conducted last summer and proposed ideas to improve the experience. Third Space will be providing a proposal 2022 operation. The Recreation Committee members unanimously agreed that the beer garden operations last year were a success, and they supported a beer garden in 2022.

> Remember, Winterfest is scheduled to be held in the Village Park on Sunday, February 6th from 2:00 to 8:00pm. A variety of family activities are planned, and details are available on the Village



Our History: Remembrances of Things Past



View of the village of Elm Grove (Circa 1900) looking west from the east end of the village. Left side—horse shed to hitch up horses in inclement weather—Frank Ramstack's Tavern—Charles Reusch's Elm Grove Hotel—The Watertown Plank Road—remains dirt—it was not paved until about 1923 when Ford came out with his Model T at a price that area farmers could afford. On the right side of the road is **Charles** Sanders' blacksmith shop and wagon shop—he is growing corn, raising chickens, along with other garden stuff in the adjoining lot. Telephone poles run along the west side of the road. In the distance, ladies dressed formally, carrying umbrellas, are strolling up the grade. It may be a church Sunday. The railroad tracks run north and south at the bottom of the distance grade.




35th Used Book Sale to be Held - March 4-6, 2022 By Janet Wintersberger





Youth ages 5-18 were encouraged to write an original poem or spoken word piece based on the MLK Jr. quotation: "Our goal is to create a beloved community, and this will require a qualitative change in our souls as well as a quantitative change in our lives." Among the prizes she received were an iPad, Bucks tickets, and Brewers tickets. She was also invited to appear on Fox 6 in the AM on MLK Day, January 17, on a local radio show, and at the 25th annual MLK Jr. celebration hosted by the YMCA of Metropolitan Milwaukee, where winners were recognized for their writing. Her winning essay appears below.

Change Within the Community Starts Within Us By Darby Koehne, 7th Grade - St. Mary's Visitation

"He who passively accepts evil is as much involved in it as he who helps perpetuate it. He who accepts evil without protesting against it is cooperating with it."

Martin Luther King Jr.

Have you tried to reach out to others in need? This is a question people have a hard time truly answering because we always want to convince ourselves that we are doing more than we are and we try as hard as we can to reach out to jeopardized communities. Let me ask you a question, have you looked at yourself and said what am I doing wrong or what can I do to help marginalized communities? Have you ever had an injustice happen to you that hurt you, but people didn't seem to care about it? Think about this today.

People are so quick to sign petitions and talk about injustices, but never really look at themselves and say, what am I doing that could hurt someone or what am I standing up for? Everyone wants to do what is comfortable and is not unpopular. MLK made his voice heard and he didn't care if he was unpopular, or wasn't liked. I know I sometimes don't speak up if I think something is wrong because it's comfortable and I want people to like me. I hide behind a mask and blame everyone else around me for things. I rarely take the time to look at myself. I know it's easy to judge and it's easy to blame everyone else for the world's problems. You can't change people, but you can change your actions and words. We must first start within ourselves for change. As MLK stated "I must confess that I am not afraid of the word 'tension'... there is a type of constructive, nonviolent tension which is necessary for growth.

I have dyslexia, ADD, and sensory processing disorder. One in five students is dyslexic and more than 70% go undetected. They say it doesn't matter what neighborhood vou're from or vour ethnicity the percentages for dyslexia are the same. 21% of Americans are illiterate. As MLK once stated, "The sad truth is that American schools, by and large, do not know how to teach - nor frequently what to teach. The ineffectiveness in teaching reading skills to many young people, whether white or black, poor or rich, strongly indicts foundations and government for not spending funds effectively...'

My family and I serve food at a food bank, St. Ben's of Milwaukee, and not as many people are coming in due to Covid, but the homelessness rate is increasing. This means there are more unfed people. In MLK's words, "There is nothing new about poverty. What is new is that we now have new techniques and resources to get rid of poverty. The real question is whether we'll have the will.". This quote still stands

Healthcare is very expensive and it's essential, but many jobs don't offer it or what they do offer is not good and it's expensive. I'm not very educated in this area, but the Equality and Human Rights Commission found that 1 in 9 women lose their jobs due to pregnancy and 1 in 4 women only get 2 weeks maternity leave when at least 6 to 12 is recommended. It is as if as women we are being punished for having children.

I feel like I'm seen as less than my male peers and this honestly really upsets me. When I say something I'm being "emotional", "looking for attention" or "stop trying to be different". I'm sick of being belittled because of my gender. Even girls say mean things just because they want to fit in and be liked. I'm also sick of dress codes. There are barely any rules against boys. I'm so sorry my legs are so distracting. It's alarming to me to realize how early in life this all begins. I'm going to be talking about sexual assault so a trigger warning. 1 in 10 girls gets catcalled before their 11th birthday and 71% of women have experienced harassment by men. Statistics on sexual harassment from the Department of Justice suggest that over 1.5 million women are raped and/ or physically assaulted annually and that is only the reported case. According to the NSERC, 1 in 5 women has experienced sexual assault. This information is appalling and sickening.

The reason I'm not talking much about racism is that I've never experienced it firsthand, but I do stand in solidarity with people that do. It's not my issue to speak on, but it is a privilege for me to say that and agree with MLK's words, "We must see now that the evils of racism, economic exploitation and militarism are all tied together. And you can't get rid of one without getting rid of the other."

We can't just do what's comfortable anymore if we want change. Most of the time, I watch from afar and think "that sucks" but never do anything about it. Each summer I attend YMCA Camp Minikani. It has played a big role in me learning how to express myself and stand up for what's right. I wish we all had a place like Minikani. By writing this I hope I can reach someone such as myself because everyone needs a wake-up call. In MLK's words "A social movement that only moves people is merely a revolt. A movement that changes both people and institutions is a revolution." Let's make our voices heard and stand up for what we believe in.

Let's do one little thing every day that challenges us. So, today my challenge to you is if we feel something is unjust, say it and see how the world around us has changed. Your words matter even if it is one little thing, it makes a difference. "Our lives begin to end the day we become silent about things that matter," said Martin Luther King Jr. Our biggest enemy is ourselves, so who is holding us back from changing the world?

Estate Planning: Common Mistakes

Most estate planning mistakes fall into one of several categories regardless of the size of the estate or the type of estate plan. These are some of the most common:

· Outdated beneficiary designations.

Assets such as retirement accounts, annuities and life insurance have separate beneficiary designations which determine who will receive those funds. These beneficiary designations take precedence over your Last Will and Testament or Revocable Trust. It is, therefore, imperative that you know exactly who those beneficiaries are and that those designations are coordinated with your overall estate plan. Your beneficiary designations should be reviewed every few years, or after any major life event, and you should keep a copy of each one with your financial records.

• Not updating asset titles.

Do you know exactly how each and every one of your assets is titled? Are some assets titled in only one spouse's name, while others are jointly titled? Who actually owns your business? Incorrectly titled assets will absolutely reduce the effectiveness of your estate plan. As with beneficiary designations, asset titles need to be coordinated with your estate plan and periodically reviewed.

• Not updating the estate plan.

Your life is a work in progress, and you should think of your estate plan the same way. It is unusual for your documents to require updates because of changes in the law. Rather, changes to your life or the lives of your family members will be what necessitates changes to the estate plan. You should review your plan after major life events, or in the absence of any of those, roughly every five years, while also reviewing the beneficiary designations and asset titles at the same time.

• Not fully understanding the plan.

The language used in your estate planning documents will be difficult to understand. While you do not need to understand all of the "legalese," you should have a fundamental understanding of what your estate plan is and how it works to implement your wishes. Without this basic understanding, you will not be able to properly maintain your plan. Take the opportunity to refresh your understanding of your overall plan whenever you review the beneficiary designations, asset titles and your estate planning documents.

Elementary Students Create Science Classroom Cell Model

(ELM GROVE) Sixth-graders at St. Mary's Visitation molecules to later be exported from the cell. The Golgi School recently constructed a giant cell model in their science classroom. Each student was tasked with creating a proportional model of a cell organelle and writing a paper describing its function. This is what the students learned:

"The vacuole is sac-shaped like a bean within the cytoplasm of the cell. The vacuole stores fluid for the cell to live. It is formed when multiple vesicles are fused together. All organelles rely on the vacuole. Vacuoles typically comprise about 30 percent of the cell's volume. I created a replica of the vacuole out of a big garbage bag with water and food in it." --- Thomas

"The mitochondria are the powerhouse of the cell. It performs ATP synthesis which is vital for the cell. The mitochondria have a small amount of DNA inside them. This tells it what to do. I made it out of wood."--- Jim

"The ribosomes are little balls that float around in the cytoplasm. The ribosomes make the proteins needed for the cell to live. The ribosomes can also stick onto the Endoplasmic reticulum and then it can make proteins for use outside of the cell. I used red plastic balls for the ribosomes." ----Micah

"The Golgi body looks like a wavy structure. The Golgi body packages proteins for later use. It also packages lipid

body is located near the nucleus. I created the replica with bubble wrap and red duct tape." ----Nate

"The nucleus stores genetic information for the cell. It stores DNA in the form of chromosomes. Inside, it also has a nucleolus, which produces ribosomes. The nucleus is in the center of the cell. I created the replica with a wire ball." ---Felicity

"The cytoplasm is the cell filter. Did you know that the cytoplasm takes up 80% of the cell! The cytoplasm is clear and contains all the other organelles. The cytoplasm is made up of 2 parts: the ectoplasm, and the endoplasm. I created the replica with plastic wrap." --- Jacob

"The Endoplasmic Reticulum is a membrane-enclosed passageway for transporting materials such as the proteins synthesized by ribosomes. There are two types: rough and smooth. Rough endoplasmic reticulum has ribosomes attached to it and the smooth endoplasmic reticulum does not have ribosomes attached to it. The Endoplasmic Reticulum's function is to make lipids, break down chemicals, and move materials around. For the design of the Endoplasmic Reticulum, I used pipe insulation to form the curvy part, blue spray paint for the color, and red and pink cotton balls to represent the ribosomes that connect to the Endoplasmic Reticulum." --- Owen

"The nucleolus is located in the nucleus and makes ribosomes. After creating ribosomes, they are released into the nucleoplasm. The nucleolus is in both animal and plant cells, it is usually shaped spherically, and is colored black. I used a foam ball and painted it black." --- Grace

"DNA is the genetic material in humans and almost all other organisms. It carries the instructions for any living thing to develop, reproduce, and survive. DNA is made up of four chemicals: guanine, thymine, adenine, and cytosine. I made a DNA molecule model from wire, foam balls, and a foam base." --- Cal

"The chromosomes are located inside the nucleus. The chromosome stores six feet of DNA inside of them. It looks like a squashed X. Every human has 23 pairs of chromosomes or 46 chromosomes. I created my chromosomes out of pipe cleaners." --- Mariel

"The lysosome is a part of a cell. The job of the lysosomes is to dispose of any broken-down proteins, molecules, or DNA. Along with that the lysosome also kills any bad bacteria or virus that comes into the cell. Overall I think that a cell without lysosomes would be completely DOOMED... I created my replica out of a plastic bowl, pom-poms, and some plastic wrap. Then I put the pompoms in the bowl to represent broken down proteins, molecules, and DNA. Then I taped plastic wrap to the top so the pom-poms wouldn't fall out." --- Adam

"The cell membrane is the gatekeeper of the cell. It is located on the outermost portion of an animal cell and acts as a border that separates the cell from other substances in the environment. The cell membrane is also known as the plasma membrane and is made up of a lipid bilayer. The cell membrane is only one part of the cell, but as one can see it is a very important part of it. It is the gatekeeper of the cell and keeps everything flowing in and out of the cell. I created my replica with pipe cleaners, two flat sheets of plastic, pom poms, blue paper, beads, and a whole lot of hot glue."--- Jake

"Proteins and vesicles are key components of a cell. Some things they do is transport proteins or other materials to parts of the cell that need it to keep thriving. Also, proteins are required for the structure, function, and regulation of the body's tissues and organs. For my replica I had a clear ball representing the vesicle and pipe cleaners with beads on them representing the proteins." --- Joe

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
