The 2018 Village Budget was approved at the November 2017 Board meeting. The new budget projects expenditures of \$6,244,730, an increase of 1.75% over the 2017 budget. Village staff continues to do a great job of providing quality services economically.

We have many big items to address in the near term which will prompt the Board to schedule Committee of the Whole meetings where we can discuss items, but no actions are taken. The discussion meetings will consider desirability, scheduling and costs of potential future projects and methods to finance such projects. If you are interested in any of the projects listed below watch the Village website for information and scheduling of discussions.

• The Recreation Committee and the Village Board have selected a Splash **Pad** system to replace the inoperative children's pool. I think it is important for Village families with small children to have this facility running soon. We have been without a facility for small children for too long.

"Cops like this, they don't come around every day," noted Sue Opper, Waukesha County District Attorney, during a special event held at Village Hall on December 1 to mark the retirement of a well-respected police officer who served our Village for more than two decades. The "cop" in question, **Officer Phil Doney**, celebrated the occasion with members of his family, friends, fellow police officers and other Village employees.

Village President **Neil Palmer** told those attending the ceremony, "'Do the right thing, be the right kind of person.' That's what Phil Doney taught through his actions."

Elm Grove Chief of Police **Jim Gage** said, in a later written statement, "Congratulations to Officer Phil Doney on 25 years of distinguished service as a Police Officer with the Elm Grove Police Department. Phil started with the department on January 4, 1993, after working at the State Fair Police

Department, the Waukesha County Jail, and serving 4 years in the Air Force as a Military Police K9 Officer. He specialized in explosive detection and was special detail with the Secret Service for Presidential Support. Phil also deployed for Operation Just Cause during the invasion of Panama in 1989 and 1990. Thank you, Phil, for the impact and sacrifices that you made in the Elm Grove Community, the police department, and the lives of your co-workers. We wish you the very best in whatever adventures await you!"

Apparently one of those 'adventures' will include a new job located not too far from here, as Doney says he has been hired by the City of Brookfield Post Office and will train to drive a different type of vehicle (without siren and flashing lights), this time with the steering wheel on the right side. - The Public Works Committee received a status report on the design work and environmental review for the Underwood Creek daylighting project. Public meetings to solicit resident input of design concepts, project costs and community benefits will be scheduled in early 2018.
- The Village continues have request from property owners for municipal water service.
- Residents of the Village in the area north of Tonawanda Elementary

School have submitted a petition urging a new pathway be created along Hollyhock Lane from North Avenue to Legion Drive.

All the items listed above are important projects to maintain a good quality of life in Elm Grove.

The Elm Grove Fire Department has received delivery of a new "Rapid Response Vehicle" which is designed to allow the department to fight building fires more quickly, with less water damage and more safely for fire personnel. Look for more information in early 2018 after the truck is put into service.

Elm Grove Police Officer Phillip **Doney** retired after more than 25 years of service to the Village. Phil's smile, dedication and skilled work will be missed. Many of the younger department members benefitted from training Phil provided. We wish Phil and family many happy new adventures.

Wild turkey and Whitetail deer **control** efforts have begun in the Village with hopes of improving safety and reducing significant nuisance.

Even though Elm Grove continues to be one of the safest communities in the state we all must use common sense to

reduce crime. Lock your car even in your driveway, lock your home, when you see something that just doesn't seem right call the Elm Grove Police Department.

2017 was a successful year for the Village and I am certain 2018 will present many new challenges.



Past Times: I REMEMBER...

Millard Fillmore, Our Forgotten 13th President

Now that the Christmas Season is behind us, we can eagerly join the Marylanders in looking toward to the next major holiday of the new year: Millard Fillmore Day. In 1970, then-Governor Marvin Mandel signed a proclamation commemorating January 7 as "Millard Fillmore Day" in Maryland. This was the culmination of five years of effort by the Millard Fillmore Society and others to gain recognition of the accomplishments of our 13th President.

Millard Fillmore was born on January 7, 1800, the first U.S. President born in the 19th century. His "rags to riches" tale is one of the most remarkable examples of fulfillment of the American Dream that I know of. His life gives testimony to the old adage that in America, "anybody can grow up to be president".

Born in a log cabin on his family's meager forty-acre farm in Locke township of rural Cayuga County, New York, Millard was one of six children. He was raised with few luxuries, and his father was not a man who favored "frivolities" such as "booklearning". The family cabin contained only two books: a Bible and a hymnal. Young Millard read both, cover-to-cover. Since he could not read music, he read the hymns as poems. What he knew of reading, he learned at his mother's knee. A stocky lad, big for his age, he was deprived of regular schooling because his father needed him for chores on the farm. He did manage to attend a one-room "academy" near the settlement of New Hope where classes were taught by **Abigail Powers**, the teenaged daughter of a local minister. His attendance was sketchy at best, although he did attempt to attend more regularly during winter months when he was not needed on the farm.

His sporadic schooling created a desire on Millard's part to buy another book. When his father refused to purchase one, he did odd chores for neighbors, eventually saving enough to visit the general store in Locke to pick out a good read for himself. Flustered by the dusty shelf of choices available to him, he finally settled on a dictionary, which he doggedly read from 'aardvark' to 'zymurgy'. Later associates would often comment on Fillmore's vast vocabulary, no doubt the result of this tedious exercise.

While still a teenager, Millard was sold into seven years of indentured servitude by his father, a practice not uncommon among cash-strapped poor families at that time. His new master was a wool carder by trade and was to teach him his skills as his apprentice. This he failed to do. Rather, he abused his young charge with overwork and obnoxious tasks. Eventually, Millard ran away, finding refuge in Montville, New York as servant to a local justice of the peace, Judge Walter **Wood**. At night, he would study the judge's law books by candlelight, and in 1823 he journeyed to Albany where he took the state bar exam, passing on the first try and gaining his license to practice law. He set up his own small law office in Buffalo, and soon journeyed back to New Hope to ask Miss Powers, his former schoolteacher, to marry him. She accepted his proposal and they were married in 1826.

Lawyer Fillmore gained a local reputation for honesty and integrity and was elected to the state assembly in 1828. As a state representative he sponsored a bill to abolish imprisonment for debt in New York. The bill gained passage and was signed into law, becoming the inspiration for a national

bill along the same lines signed into law by President Martin Van Buren (a New Yorker himself) in 1837. This ended the era of the debtor's prison in America.

Eventually, Fillmore's political skills won him election to four terms in the U.S. Congress. He became chairman of the powerful House Ways and Means Committee, and in this role was able to secure \$30,000 in federal funding for inventor Samuel Morse's newfangled telegraph system, a "scheme" viewed with suspicion by many who considered it scientifically impossible. The telegraph, of course, would revolutionize communications and change the world forever. Fillmore himself helped to arrange a demonstration of the new device to skeptics in 1838.

After serving a term as state comptroller of New York, Fillmore was nominated for Vice-President of the United States by the Whig Party national convention in 1848. The ticket was headed by Gen. Zachary Taylor, a hero of the Mexican War. The Whig nominees prevailed in November, but President Taylor died suddenly on July 9, 1850 and Fillmore ascended to the presidency. He was the second Vice-President to be elevated to the White House upon the death of the prior occupant, the first having been John Tyler in 1841.

As president, Fillmore was responsible for installing the first White House library. Given a tour of the presidential residence, the new President asked where the library was. On being told there was none, the astounded Fillmore then asked, "How can the President make weighty decisions without first consulting with the great minds of antiquity?" In hindsight, it is indeed difficult to believe that none of the previous residents had seen fit to begin a collection of reference materials and classics of literature, but this was a condition Fillmore would soon correct. His love of books was also in evidence when he left the White House on Christmas Eve in 1851 to join the bucket brigade to fight a late-night fire at the Library of Congress. Thirty-five thousand volumes were destroyed in the blaze.

Fillmore's policies as chief executive forward-looking, including Matthew Commodore **Perry's** expedition to the Far East in 1852, which resulted in America's first trade treaty with Imperial Japan, signed by representatives of the Emperor in 1853. President Fillmore also signed a measure

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
(262) 784-4241 **Evening Appointments Available** abolishing flogging as punishment of sailors in the U.S. Navy in 1850.

Fillmore is best remembered, however, as the President who made a "devil's bargain" by signing the Compromise of 1850, which included the hated Fugitive Slave Act. That portion of the overall package is rightly considered today as a great injustice. Fillmore, however, signed it because the Compromise also abolished the slave trade in Washington D.C., brought California into the Union as a free state (thus keeping slavery from ever spreading to the Pacific coast) and separated the western lands of New Mexico, Arizona, and Utah from Texas (which blocked western expansion of Texas slave plantations).

Partly as a result of signing the Compromise, Fillmore was not nominated by the Whigs for a second term in 1852. The party turned instead to **Gen. Winfield Scott**, another hero of the Mexican War, who was defeated that November.

Fillmore returned to New York where he served for a time as Chancellor of the University of Buffalo. He also helped to organize the New York Zoological Society and the New York chapter of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. He also led early efforts to prevent extinction of the American buffalo. He helped to found the Buffalo Historical Society, serving as its first president, and was a founding board member of Buffalo General Hospital, a pioneering medical institution in New York state.

In 1856, the Whigs belatedly gave Fillmore their presidential nomination. He would be the party's last standard-bearer, carrying only one state: Maryland. He snagged only their eight electoral votes, but polled 874,539 popular votes nationwide, about 22% of the total vote. Within four years, the Whig Party itself would cease to exist, replaced by the rising Republican Party formed in Ripon, Wisconsin on February 28, 1854.

Millard Fillmore died on March 8, 1874 in his native New York. Often dismissed or even vilified by folks who don't know their history (such as **H.L. Mencken**, whose story about Fillmore having installed the first White House bath tub was a canard), he is unfortunately overlooked as an example of character, intelligence and the drive to succeed. One incident from Fillmore's life serves well in summing him up: While in England to address the House of Commons, Fillmore was offered an honorary doctorate by Oxford University. The only one I know of to decline such an honor from Oxford, Fillmore explained that he had never learned to read Latin, and had learned that Oxford's degrees were written in Latin. "I had not the advantage of a classical education," he wrote, "and no man should, in my judgment, accept a degree that he cannot read."

Ever humble, Fillmore, in looking back on his many accomplishments, assessed them minimally, saying: "A man can only help in what God has wrought."

Brookfield Academy Middle School Students Cultivate a Love for Latin

Brookfield Academy students recently visited Yale University to compete in Certamen, a quiz-bowl style competition among Latin students. Middle School Latin Teacher Terry Laabs helped coach Level 8 teams for their first Certamen, an effort which was revived in recent years.

"One of our coaches and Brookfield Academy parent, Dr. Ronald Roessler, assisted with the development of our Middle School Certamen about two years ago," Laabs said. "Latin students in our Upper School have taken part for several decades, but it had been more than ten years since we had a middle school team." Middle School student interest in Levels 8-12 competed successfully Certamen has grown ever since.

Certamen (which means "competition" in Latin) fosters students' love for Latin and their desire to compete. Played by three teams of up to four players, students answer individual questions and collaborate on bonus questions. "The opportunity for individual effort plus excellent team work gives Certamen a dimension that many students find exhilarating," Mr. Laabs said. His Level 8 students, competing for the first time on a national level, agreed.

"It's an opportunity to get a full understanding of everything and a fun way to compete too," said Level 8 student Patrick Walsh.

Team member Sam Simic, of Elm Grove, wasn't sure he would have time to add another activity to his busy schedule, but after observing a session, he was hooked. "I'm pretty competitive, it's fun and I also like learning," he said.

Students build upon their knowledge of Latin, Roman history and mythology, but they also discover that being a part of Certamen can give them an edge in future endeavors.

"I love Latin," said Level 8 student Alex **D'Arruda**. "I want to be a lawyer so this will help me with that."

Teammate Emma Canga had similar plans. "I intend to be a lawyer in the future and I thought it was pretty awesome to travel to an Ivy League school."

Brookfield Academy Latinists from against some of the top Latin schools in the nation while at Yale. One of Brookfield Academy's Upper School advanced teams took second place in the event and the Middle School novice teams placed 4th and 12th in their division. The novice teams are already planning for the next Certamen.

"We want to have the same amount of fun we did at Yale and approach it the same way," Patrick said. His fellow teammates agreed as Sam added, "Last year's novice level team from Brookfield Academy took second place, and we are hoping to do the same or better. We definitely want to win."

Brookfield Academy is one of the few schools in Wisconsin with a Certamen team so students often must travel to competitions, according to Mr. Laabs. "One lesson our students have learned is that they are part of a Latin program which is on par with the very best Latin-teaching schools in the country." Brookfield Academy's Certamen teams will compete again in February at Princeton University.

Will Social Security Be There for Me?

Many retirees choose to take their Social Security retirement benefits early in reaction to the assumption that Social Security may not be around in the future. In making that decision, they have elected a permanently reduced benefit for life – under assumptions that may not be well grounded in fact.

It is nearly impossible to pick up a newspaper or magazine these days and not see an article on retirement planning — and as part of that article, planning tips and suggestions for taking Social Security. There are also numerous articles on the Social Security Trust Fund and the impending depletion of that fund. These articles instill fear in many retirees, who may make the emotional decision to take their Social Security as soon as they are eligible. But what are the facts? Is there reason to be concerned?

The Social Security Act was signed into law by President Roosevelt on August 14, 1935. The Act created a social insurance program designed to pay retired workers 65 or older a continuing income after retirement.

Social Security is known as a "pay-asyou-go" system. When we earn income, a portion of that income is taxed under FICA (Federal Insurance Contributions Act) and paid into the Social Security Trust Fund. Our employers match that contribution and also contribute funds into the Trust Fund. These funds are segregated — they do not go into the general Federal tax fund. Any surplus in the Social Security Trust Fund is invested into special, nonmarketable U.S. Treasury securities, backed by the full faith and credit or the U.S. government. These special Treasuries are what is currently funding the Social Security Trust Fund.

Since 2010, as more and more baby boomers enter retirement and begin drawing their Social Security, the amount of money being collected in payroll taxes is less than the amount of money being paid out in benefits. Yet, the Trust Fund is not yet experiencing a shortfall. Why? Because the interest on those Treasuries, when combined with the payroll taxes, are still resulting in a net *increase* in the total funds in the Social Security Trust Fund. This will change in the year 2022, when there will be an annual net loss in the Trust fund, causing its eventual depletion. If nothing changes, the Social Security Trust Fund is projected to be exhausted in 2034.

But what does that mean? Does it mean no more Social Security? Of course not. What it means is that our payroll taxes will continue to flow into the Trust Fund and be sent right back out to pay current benefits — but the total revenue will only be able to sustain approximately 77% of the promised benefits. But, according to the Social Security's own actuaries, the system can sustain that 77% promise until approximately the year 2091, when it dips down to 73% of the promised benefit. If you are 40 years old today, you will be 114 years old in the year 2091. So, while there may be changes ahead, Social Security will still be there for our lifetimes.

There is a lesson here. As stated in the 2017 Annual Trustees Report "Lawmakers should address these financial challenges as soon as possible. Taking action sooner rather than later will permit consideration of a broader range of solutions and provide more time to phase in changes so that the public has adequate time to prepare."

Next month: Our nation has faced this issue before — the Social Security Trust Fund shortfalls in the 1970s and 1980s.
