# Village Update

Many residents and village employees are mourning the loss of Elm Grove Police Department Sergeant Joe Ipavec, who took his own life at the Elm Grove Police Department on November 25. Sergeant Joe was a 19-year veteran of EGPD and was a leader in the department and well known and liked in the community. Counseling and support are being provided to all Village staff. Community organizations are planning fundraising efforts to memorialize Sgt. Joe and to support his family. (See IN MEMORIAM)

Design plans for the new gymnasium / multipurpose addition to Tonawanda Elementary School were approved by the Village Building Board in December. Initial building plans were met with criticism as too plain and lacking architectural features by residents and neighbors. Copies of the approved plans will be available in Village Hall soon. The Tonawanda site improvements also include a new bus loading and unloading area on the southeast corner of the school with access off Legion Drive.

# **Become a Member of the Elm Grove Volunteer Emergency Services**

This article highlights the Fire Department's Membership, Demographics and Operating Budget Cost for our Volunteer Fire and EMS services.

#### **Demographics**

The department is staffed by 10 daytime Department of Public Works/ Village employees and 30 nighttime/weekend volunteer members. The average member age is 47 with an average of 16 years of service to the community. Over the years, the Village resident membership has dropped from 100% in 1955 to 48% today. This drop can be attributed to a number of factors from family and work commitments to reduced interest in firefighting or providing emergency care.

There is more to our organizations than just providing service. Within, there is a deep sense of pride, accomplishment and community to and for each other. The camaraderie and sharing of our lives is an important part of the fire service family.

Volunteering is important for many reasons, but new studies make it clear that volunteerism saves resources for the community, meeting critical, local needs, and translates into better physical and mental health for those who give their time.

As we look to the future, we would like to keep the volunteer spirit alive by recruiting more Village residents.

"The fact that being a member is voluntary is an important factor for

me. It's not a 'job'. People are members because they want to be, not because they have to. To me, it's like having another family comprised of people who I want to help and who will help me if needed," said Deputy Chief **William Hand**.

# Tax payer cost for Fire and EMS services

Both the Fire and EMS service members are compensated for trainings, meetings, serving on a Duty Company and receive a stipend for calls-for service. The average firefighter pay is approximately \$3,400; driver \$3,700; Officer \$4,450; Chief Officer \$5,120 per year for making 50% of the average of 120 calls. The paid-on-call program is one way of recognizing the contributions of time and labor given in the spirit of volunteerism.

# **Operating Cost of the Fire and EMS services**

The proposed 2020 Operating Budget for the Fire Department is \$305,410 and for the EMS \$336,100, for a combined Budget of \$641,510, costing approximately \$260 per residential property.




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# Village **Update**

The Tonawanda school site is much smaller than other Elmbrook school properties which has greeted traffic problems and concerns about continued use of the school. Elm Grove residents have strongly supported efforts to keep Tonawanda School open and we should all be glad for the building improvements. The Village will be discussing possible use of the Village Park for Tonawanda recess and sports activities.

The Friends of Elm Grove Library (FOEGL) annual "Lights of Love" celebration was well attended and a big success, though I would have preferred for us to have had snow. FOEGL is a big part of why we have one of the best libraries around. Your donations to FOEGL are always appreciated.

A lot of work was accomplished on the new swimming pool splash pad before the project was closed-up for the winter. If we have reasonable Spring weather, we should have the new facility operating when the pool opens for the 2020 season.

The Watertown Plank Road pathway improvement and extension project was finally completed in December after many delays. The patience of adjoining landowners was appreciated.

Residents have been asking what is being constructed on the west side of Underwood Creek, north of Watertown Plank Road in the Reinders complex. The building remodeling is to accommodate a new business: a children's playcenter planning to open in Spring.

The Village has received what we hope is the final edition of the Downtown Master Plan document. Village Board Trustees and staff are reviewing the document to make sure the last round of public and Board comments are properly reflected. Once review is complete a Public Open House will be scheduled.

The Village has not received any new information from the School Sisters of **Notre Dame (SSND)** regarding the status and timing of their plans. Area news media reported in December that SSND had reached agreement with Mount Mary College to jointly develop housing. (See NEWS BRIEFS story, this page.)

Ultimately, the Elm Grove convent and housing complex is expected to be sold by SSND. The Village Board has expressed a strong desire to see the historic convent building remain and be repurposed.

The Village also has not received any new information from the Reinders family regarding possible redevelopment plans for the property east of Elm Grove Road and north of Watertown Plank Road.

# Housing Complex for Retired SSND, Seniors & Students to be Built on Mount Mary Univ. Campus

A news conference was held at noon on December 4 at Mount Mary University in Milwaukee to announce that Mount Mary will be the site of an intergenerational housing community for retired School Sisters of Notre Dame (SSND) and seniors, with an educational and supportive housing option for single mothers who are students at Mount Mary.

Groundbreaking for the \$45 million project is expected in mid-2020, following and contingent upon, City of Milwaukee review and approval as a three-way venture between the School Sisters of Notre Dame Central Pacific Province, Mount Mary University and the Milwaukee Catholic Home. It is expected to be completed by the end of November 2021.

The intent of this community is twofold: To provide a vibrant, intergenerational living environment for School Sisters of Notre Dame and seniors, and to provide an educational and supportive housing option for single mothers who are students at Mount Mary.

We look forward to partnering with our sponsored ministry Mount Mary University and the Milwaukee Catholic Home to provide a unique space that offers us the ability to live out our SSND mission and charism, with a focus on education, spirituality and interculturality.

The proposed site will be located on the north side of campus. It will accommodate the spectrum of care needs for the School Sisters of Notre Dame, who will be moving to campus from their longtime home in Elm Grove. The housing community will include the following living spaces:

- 52 assisted living units for the School Sisters of Notre Dame
- 24 dormitory units for single mothers enrolled as students at Mount Mary University and their young children
- 90 independent living apartments for individuals over age 62

Other features for this development include an early childhood education center for children from the campus and families in the surrounding area and a town center with amenities for the sisters and other residents, including a bistro, health clinic, salon and community room.

Milwaukee Catholic Home currently manages care provided to sisters at Notre Dame of Elm Grove. This formal partnership at Mount Mary University will expand and honor the legacy and charism of the School Sisters of Notre Dame.

While many details have yet to be determined, a key design theme is to create spaces that inspire intentional and serendipitous interactions between the various groups in the living space.

Please join us in prayer for the success of this project and a smooth transition for our sisters in the coming months.



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# Past Times: I REMEMBER...

# Passings, Then and Now

November brought news of the death of my old friend John Utzat of Bay View. John was, in the opinion of many, the foremost historian of Milwaukee's south side. I was sorry to learn that he had passed away on the 6<sup>th</sup> of the month at age 82. A lifelong resident of Bay View, he was an active member of the Bay View Historical Society and was known throughout the area for his walking tours, guest lectures and local history columns. In 1982, he coauthored the book Southside in the Sun, a collection of stories and remembrances of the people and places that made Milwaukee's old south side communities so special. An avocational interest of John's was the history of the old Milwaukee street car lines and the regional interurban rail system. His presentation of over 200 slides of "A Milwaukee Transit Era" was quite popular when presented at a meeting of the Elmbrook Historical Society, at my request. I was proud that John's program was so well-received at the meeting.

As I made my way to St. Adalbert cemetery on S. 13th Street to say a final goodbye to John Utzat, I couldn't help but reflect upon the fact that although this popular local history lecturer and longtime Milwaukee County parks employee had never strayed far from his birthplace, he had left behind a priceless legacy of historical research that will no doubt be referenced by future generations. His book on the history of Bay View remained unpublished at his death, but hopefully that will be corrected by a posthumous publication.

All of this called to mind for me the death of my longtime friend and one-time co-author, Jean Stackpole on February 6, 2016. Back in 1998, Jean and I collaborated on Following the Trail, a book of photographs and stories about the history of Blue Mound Road and the communities of the Elmbrook area. Jean Roughen was born in 1925. She met Charles Stackpole at a USO dance during World War II, and they were married in 1946. They settled briefly on Wrayburn Road in Elm Grove while building a home for themselves on Tulane Street in Brookfield. Charlie worked for the Wisconsin Telephone Company for the next 37 years. Along the way, he managed to become a founding father of both Elm Grove and the city of Brookfield. (My column on Charles Stackpole appeared in the June, 2015 edition of the Elm Grove *News-Independent*. www.elmgrove.news.)

As a young wife and mother Jean Stackpole became involved in her community, working as a substitute teacher in the Elmbrook school system, taking on a job as a reporter for the Brookfield News and serving as an active member of St. Luke Catholic Church on W. Greenfield Avenue. She even found time to organize annual Fourth of July parades for the children in her neighborhood. She also put her toe in the waters of local politics, running for Waukesha County Supervisor against a longtime incumbent. Her campaign sprang from her involvement in Preserve Bishop's Woods, a community group founded by her neighbors which opposed attempts by Archdiocese of Milwaukee to sell the wooded tract of land south of Blue Mound Road which had been intended by its donor as a nature preserve. This put her at odds with some members of her own parish, as well as the incumbent supervisor, Earl Simon. Ultimately, Jean came out on the losing end of both her campaign for supervisor and her attempts to save Bishop's Woods.

A more satisfying experience for her would entail her years of service to the Elmbrook Historical Society, of which she was an early and enthusiastic member. Jean volunteered as a docent at the Dousman Stagecoach Inn (then the Dousman-Dunkel-Behling House) and portrayed the school teacher in the one-room school house for children's field trips. She loved being back in the classroom with young students, even if it was just for an hour or so.

Jean had always loved history, but discovered a special passion for the lore of the Milwaukee area while attending Marquette University. She sharpened her skills as an historian by writing a number of heritage-themed feature stories for the *Brookfield News*, collecting stories and artifacts along the way. **Pat Basting** of the Elmbrook Historical Society remembered Jean's generosity with such material. "She would always share what she had, even giving away photos and clippings if they were needed by someone else," Pat recalled recently.

It was in 1996 that Jean and I were first approached by officers of the Elmbrook Historical Society and asked to put together a book of photos and reminiscences detailing Elmbrook history in time for the 1998 Wisconsin State Sesquicentennial Celebration. For the next two years, we cooperated in creating what became Following the Trail. While I was more interested in rural architecture, old buildings and defunct railroad lines, Jean cornered descendants of early settlers and founding families, getting them to trust her with pictures of long-ago forebears. Between the two of us, I thought the book finished as a perfect blend of our respective interests and strengths. The hard cover edition was published in October, 1998 and the softcover version was issued in July of 1999.

I remembered this when I was asked to speak at the dinner meeting of the Elmbrook Historical Society last November 11. SI deviated at the outset from my planned talk on Blue Mound Road to speak a bit about Jean Stackpole. I noted that it had been twenty years since the publication of the softcover edition of Following the Trail. Between the two printings of the book, about 1,300 copies were sold. That's not bad for a local history book, or so they tell me. But since that is now over two decades ago, it has become history as well. I wanted those folks assembled at the dinner that night to know a little bit about Jean Stackpole, her love of history and her love of her community. I told them of her death in 2016, only eleven months after the death of her beloved husband, Charlie. Most of all, however, I wanted them to know of her own generosity of spirit and willingness to serve. I told them that night what I will state again now: Jean Stackpole knew well the meaning of the words: historian, citizen, neighbor and friend. She knew them because she lived them. She lived them all.

The end of 2019 brought news of other passings which touched my heart and may also be of interest to Elmbrook area readers

# **Following The Trail**

In 1998, the Elmbrook Historical Society published this book: Following the Trail for the Wisconsin Sesquicentennial Celebration.

Korean War, Harkey was a graduateof Moler Barber College in Chicago. He took over the operation of the Elm Grove Barber Shop in 1962. (My Dad and I were among his first customers.) Making his home in Wauwatosa with his wife and three children, he became active in business and social activities in Elm Grove. He served in a variety of capacities at American Legion Post #449, then located only a block from his barber shop. He was elected as President of the Elm Grove Business Men's Association in 1966 and was a deacon of the Elm Grove Lutheran Church. He remained active in the Legion and in his church until his death. Elm Grove Lutheran's pastor, Rev. Eric Skovgaard, remembered that Harkey would often bake cookies and brownies to bring to Sunday services for coffee hour. I recall Harkey as a man who radiated kindness and decency. He remained my barber for 44 years, retiring at the end of 2006. (My profile of Harkey Bartsch appeared in the January, 2013 edition of this newspaper.)

**Richard 'Dick' Tarbox** of Waukesha, former social studies instructor at Pilgrim Park Junior High School in the 1960s,

passed away on November 28 at age 85. He had taught in Eau Claire and Chetek before taking a job with the Elmbrook school system. In my column on Pilgrim Park in the February, 2019 issue of the News-Independent, I recalled my memories of Mr. Tarbox as a study hall teacher: "I will always remember, he made sure that we actually studied in his study hall!" As I drove to his funeral at Atonement Lutheran Church in Muskego, I remembered Dick Tarbox as a no-nonsense teacher who demanded students live up to his expectations. I also recall that he quit his post in the Elmbrook district to move to Sokoto, Nigeria where he and his wife, JudyLee, taught at the Nigerian Teachers' College for two years. (JudyLee preceded Richard in death in 2018.) I have great respect for their generation of educators, and I believe that those of us who knew such teachers as students were fortunate.

It is important, I think, that we note the passing of those who have made contributions to our community. They are not forgotten.

# St. Mary's Teacher Named 'Educator of the Year'

(ELM GROVE) St. Mary's Visitation junior high science teacher Kathy Biernat is the recipient of the Alumni Educator of the Year Award from the Army Education Outreach Program (AEOP). AEOP is a program of the U.S. Army dedicated to the promotion of engaging STEM (science, technology, engineering, mathematics) programs that inspire the next generation of STEM talent. Specifically, AEOP offers a host of programs for teachers and students to help students understand and appreciate the many opportunities available to students who pursue science, engineering, and mathematics.

During the past few years, Mrs. Biernat has completed two of these programs. The first was the Research Experience for Stem Educators (RESET) which is a six-month, professional development program in which she was able to work with defense scientists and educators to better understand how to guide students'

research as an element of learning. The second was the Next Generation Science Teachers Program designed to help teachers better implement science and engineering standards in the classroom.

In discussing what attracted her to these programs, Mrs. Biernat underscored the need to be constantly improving as a teacher. "I believe if you stop learning, you should stop teaching," she said.





# Young Students Share Insights about Freedom in Published Book

Brookfield Academy's Primary School students say the "Pledge of Allegiance" every day, but teacher Debbie York wondered if her first-grade students fully grasped the importance of this daily recitation. The students, already in the midst of mastering the building blocks of reading, history, math, and languages, are also learning about broader concepts such as freedom and liberty.

Reading about the Pledge is a part of the Level 1 curriculum, but Mrs. York wanted to further the discussion. "As a teacher, I am always looking for different ways to motivate my students to learn," she said. "I thought having the students write a book about the Pledge would be an excellent way for them to build upon their knowledge."

Students were tasked with discussing their insights, writing down their thoughts, and then expressing them through illustrations. "The process prompted many great teacher-student discussions about this topic," she added. The result of their efforts became the self-published book When I Say the Pledge of Allegiance....

While all the students were excited to be authors, they gained knowledge and confidence in other areas too, according to Mrs. York. "They learned about the writing process, developed a deeper understanding of what it means to be a free country, and how we honor that freedom daily," she said. "Not only have we created a meaningful memory together, but my students now understand every word of what they are saying when they say the Pledge."

Students held a book launch and read their work to parents and teachers. A few student excerpts from the book:

"When I say the Pledge of Allegiance, I think about freedom. I also think about kind people respect their ~Audrey Klein



My personal communications with Joe often had to do with his service as police liaison to the Citizens Police Academy Alumni Association (CPAAA), of which I have been a member, and his dedication and interest in inviting (via the News-*Independent*) more community members to participate in the CPA classes, held each spring.

Joe Ipavec was a kind man, who was well respected by his fellow officers and much loved and appreciated throughout our community. He mentored new officers, was a certified firearms instructor, a state licensed Emergency Medical Technician (EMT), and, as recently remembered by Elm Grove

Chief of Police Jim Gage, "most notably commended for his action that... saved many lives, during the Villager Apartments fire, in October 2000."

Sgt. Ipavec is survived by his wife Tracy, daughter Lily and son Michael, as well as many other relatives and friends. In December the CPAAA gave an immediate monetary gift of \$1,500 to his family. The Joe Ipavec Memorial Fund supporting Lily and Michael Ipavec's Education is also accepting contributions at any Associated Bank location, and local groups are said to be considering additional fund-raising events to honor Joe later this year.

# Tax Tips for the Self-Employed Age 50 and Older

If you are self-employed, you have much to think about as you enter your senior years, and that includes retirement savings and Medicare. Here a few thoughts that will help.

Keep Making Retirement Account Contributions, and Make Extra "Catchup" Contributions, too. Self-employed individuals who are age 50 and older as of the applicable year-end can make additional elective deferral catch-up contributions to certain types of tax-advantaged retirement accounts. For the 2019 tax year, you can take advantage of this opportunity if you will be 50 or older as of December 31, 2019. You can make elective deferral catch-up contributions to your self-employed 401(k) plan or to a SIMPLE IRA. You can also make catch-up contributions to a traditional or Roth IRA.

The maximum catch-up contributions for 2019 are as follows:

401(k) Plan - \$6,000 **SIMPLE IRA - \$3,000** Traditional or Roth IRA - \$1,000

Catch-up contributions are above and beyond:

- 1. The "regular" 2019 elective deferral contribution limit of \$19,000 that otherwise applies to a 401(k) plan.
- 2. The "regular" 2019 elective deferral contribution limit of \$13,000 that otherwise applies to a SIMPLE IRA.

3. The "regular" 2019 contribution limit of \$6,000 that otherwise applies to a traditional or Roth IRA.

#### **How Much Can Those Catch-up Contributions Be Worth?**

Good question. You might dismiss catch-up contributions as relatively inconsequential unless we can prove otherwise. Fair enough. Here's your proof:

401(k) catch-up contributions. Say you turned 50 during 2019 and contributed on January 1, 2019, an extra \$6,000 for this year to your self-employed 401(k) account and then did the same for the following 15 years, up to age 65. Here's how much extra you could accumulate in your 401(k) account by the end of the year you reach age 65, assuming the indicated annual rates of return below:

4% Return = \$136,185 6% Return = \$163,277 8% Return = \$196,501

#### Is There an Upper Age Limit for **Regular and Catch-up Contributions?**

Another good question. While you must begin taking annual required minimum distributions (RMDs) from a 401(k), SIMPLE IRA, or traditional IRA account after reaching age 70 1/2, you can continue to contribute to your 401(k), SIMPLE IRA, or Roth IRA account after reaching that age, as long as you have self-employment income (subject to the income limit for annual Roth contribution eligibility). But you may not contribute to a traditional IRA after reaching age 70 1/2.
