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Waukesha County Sheriff's Citizen Academy **Seeks Participants for Spring Program**

After graduating from the Elm Grove Citizens Police Academy (EGCPA) in the Spring of 1999, I went on to attend the Waukesha County Sheriff's Citizens Academy (Fall 1999 class) which was established in 1995 to provide opportunities for citizens to have a better understanding about the operations and duties of the Waukesha County Sheriff's Department.

As an Elm Grove / Waukesha County resident and a long-time journalist, I found the Sheriff's Academy experience of tremendous personal interest and value and would highly recommend it.

The Sheriff's Citizens Academy is a 12week course. The next series of classes will be held every Tuesday night from March 14 through May 30, 2023, from 6 to 9 p.m.

Much like the EGCPA, the Waukesha County program consists of a series of lectures, field trips, ride-alongs, and activities that provide insight about the day-to-day functions of the department. The class agenda includes numerous law enforcement-related topics and functions, such as Waukesha County Jail, Patrol Division - OWLS, Mock OWI Trial and Court Services, Detective Bureau, Drone Unit, Communications Center, Use of Force, Identification Bureau, Polygraphs, Tactical Enforcement Unit, Canine Unit,



Metro Drug Unit, Search and Recovery Unit, Firearms, Traffic Stops, and the Medical Examiner's Office.

"This program also fosters a growing pool of well-informed graduates who share their knowledge and insights with others and become active participants in preventing crime," said a spokesperson.

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Village Update

As I write this column a few days before Christmas 2022, it seems weird to be typing the year 2023. Time does go by fast. I truly hope everyone had a joyous Christmas holiday.

Elm Grove property tax bills arrived late again in 2022 due to problems at the Waukesha County office issuing the bills. Property taxes (full payment or first installment) are due by January 31, 2023. The Elm Grove property tax rate declined this year by 10.34% thanks to the increasing value of property in the Village. The approved tax levy is \$7,497,240 which is an increase of \$52,805 or 0.71% above 2022. The approved budget also includes sewer, stormwater and solid waste fees totaling \$1,127.35 per single family residence.


Winter and the time changes mean that it gets dark earlier now and we all need to use extra caution when driving in the Village. Children travelling to and from our schools, dog walkers, and health walkers can be hard to see.

Elm Grove Police Officer Steven Weber will begin duty as the first School Resource Officer (SRO) at Pilgrim Park Middle School in January. Both Elmbrook School District high schools already have a SRO assigned from the Brookfield Police Department.

The Village Board met recently as a Committee of the Whole to discuss the status of the Underwood Creek Daylighting project in the Village center. The Village has acquired the former One Hour Martinizing building on Watertown Plank Road just west of the railroad tracks. Demolition of the empty building will begin in the 1st quarter of 2023. Conceptual plans for amenities along the open creek and pathway will be developed and offered for public input. A public



referendum on the Daylighting project cost will also need to be scheduled. The daylighting of the creek is the last piece of the stormwater project begun in 2005. Not only is the daylighting an important step in fulfilling the requirements of the project permit from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, but I believe it will provide a very attractive amenity to the Village center. Think about how much the naturalization changes and pathways improved our Village Park, as an example.

The Board also discussed the scope and timing for the extension of water from Lake Michigan by the City of Wauwatosa into Elm Grove for the Caroline Heights development by Mandel Development. The Village intends to connect to the system and extend it to the railroad tracks in the Village Center. The Public Works Committee and the Board will begin work to define the process and timing of extending water to neighborhoods. This long-term effort offers important fire protection, water quality and property value benefits for the entire Village.

Hopefully, Village Board candidates are busy gathering support for their campaigns for the April 4, 2023, election. As the incumbent Village President, I filed a form declaring that I will not be a candidate this spring. I will discuss my service as a Trustee and Village President in a future update column.



Our History: *Remembrances of Things Past*

WHATZZIT? By Stephen K. Hauser

Many readers will recall the old American Legion Post 449 clubhouse at 1195 Legion Drive in Elm Grove, but few will remember it looking like this! At the time this photo was taken in early 1948, the building was nearing completion in preparation for its dedication ceremony on June 6th, the fourth anniversary of D-Day.

The Stenz-Griesell-Smith Post held its organizational meeting at Lee's Tavern (subsequently known as the Elms, the Cove, and the London House) at 13395 Watertown Plank Road on December 13, 1945. The fourteen World War I and II veterans in attendance elected a slate of officers, including **Marvin Race** as the post's first commander. The veterans present believed that the unincorporated Elm Grove area needed a Legion Post. (The Town of Brookfield already had a Post of its own, The Behling-Kutchera Post 296, which served the Brookfield Junction area to the west.)


In 1946, the new Post received its charter and set about the business of finding a place to build a clubhouse. Local businessman **George Reinders** donated property on the southwest corner of Brookside Drive and Juneau Blvd. where they could build. (Brookside Drive was the original name of what became Legion Drive, and some old-time residents used to insist that the street name had never actually been legally changed!)

painstaking puzzle of reassembly into something approximating a clubhouse.

The vets, skilled and unskilled, did most of the work themselves. Some material was donated by local businesses and an area lending institution offered a \$2,500 construction loan. The Brookfield town board granted a building permit, not too concerned about what the Legionnaires would erect with it. (The Village of Elm Grove was not yet incorporated, and the permit would have been less likely to have been issued had Elm Grove existed as a legal entity at this point.)

When open in June of 1948, the Post consisted of a meeting room and a bar area. In 1951, a furnace room and a small "convenience kitchen" were added. The new Post soon proved to be a boon to the larger community as well. The Elmbrook Masonic Lodge used the building for their meetings and a ballet school leased space for their classes, installing ballet rails along the north wall of the meeting room. **Mrs. George Snider** opened a nursery school (nowadays known as "K-4") in the Post in 1956, and I might add that I spent my first year in school there under her guidance.

Many area residents also fondly recall the conclusion of the Village's annual Memorial Day parade in the Post's parking lot, with free ice cream handed out by the veterans. Sadly, the Post moved from Elm Grove to its present location at 3245 N. 124th Street in Brookfield in 2003. Its members continue to serve fellow veterans and the community. A Blue Star Memorial marker now stands at the site of the old Post.

New Year's Eve at the Phoenix Hotel By Tom Ramstack

On December 31st, 1879 (144 years ago), New Year's Eve was being celebrated in a big way at Brookfield's "Phoenix Inn" on the Watertown Plank Road. The house was full up. One traveler, **Willis S. Spaulding**, an Oconomowoc farmer, maintained a journal in which he recorded the events of that evening. Gas lighting had been installed in the inn illuminating the aura of the twenty-five-plus boarders sitting around tightly placed wooden tables. Willis wrote, "A band plaid outside on the street until 12 o'clock that night."

Waukesha historian Libbie Nolan observed, "Elizabeth Hoffman stood in front of her big black cook stove which steamed, brewed, and baked the old Swiss and German dishes she served the travelers. Light snow flickered down on the inn that evening, but it wasn't particularly cold. **John Hoffman**, the host, visited with the diners and made certain their mugs were full. One might imagine a very pleasant evening was had by all in attendance.

Before long all were in slumber. Willis, recorded, "splendid night sleeping." Arising before 6:00 a.m. Willis paid for "supper, breakfast, stock, feed & lodging--\$2.25, paid for Plank Road Toll Gate fee-- cost 20 cts."—1-mile down the road while still in Brookfield, he was bound for Milwaukee on this bright, fresh, New Year's Day.

For the modest price of \$485, a Menomonee Falls farmer was persuaded to sell an Army surplus barracks that he had recently purchased for use on his farm as a chicken coop. The price included delivery of the small building, which Post members expected to arrive in neat sections. Instead, the structure had been crudely pulled apart, delivered on a flatbed truck, and dumped in a heap near the underwood creek. The veterans assembled work parties to root through the debris and sort out what could be salvaged before beginning the

Diwali, the Festival of Lights

What does good over evil mean to you? What does good over evil truly mean to mankind? How does it apply to our lives today? As a practicing Hindu by birth, we celebrate several festivals to celebrate the victory of good spirits over evil spirits. 

Legal Issues

Estate Planning: Choosing Your Representatives By Attorney Isabell M. Mueller

Choosing someone to be your financial power of attorney, personal representative, or the successor trustee for your trust is one of the most difficult aspects of estate planning. Often you end up choosing the

same person for each role.

Other times there might not be a good choice and a trust company is most appropriate. These are highly personal decisions and there is no right or wrong way to go about it. There are, however, some qualities that you should keep in mind:

- Integrity: These should be people in whom you have complete trust and confidence as they will have access to your finances, and control over your assets after your death.
- Experience: While they do not have to be experts themselves, some solid financial experience is necessary. Your agents will be making significant financial decisions for you or your beneficiaries. Also, they have to have the experience to know when and how

to hire the right professionals, such as accountants, attorneys or realtors.

- Impartiality: If possible, choose someone who will be viewed by family or beneficiaries as impartial and fair. This will help if disagreements arise and the person you name has to step in to settle the matter. Depending on family dynamics, your best choice may be a trusted friend, or an outside person or entity, to act in this role to maintain impartiality.
- Patience: The agents you name will have to act during some of the most stressful times in your family's life. Because they are in a position of authority, your agent may become the most obvious target when emotions run high. Consider naming someone who understands this and can remain calm.

After choosing someone for each role, you should also try to designate a successor to serve in the place of your first choice if your first choice is unavailable for one reason or another.
