## Past Times: I REMEMBER...

## **Tying Up the Loose Ends**

It is always a source of satisfaction to be able to go back to earlier writings and add new information to areas that were previously left unclear, or to be able to answer questions raised by the earlier work. This is called "tying up the loose ends", and, as we get older, more and more loose ends remain forever untied. Therefore, I am happy to use this month's column to at least tie up a couple of them for you.

#### The Partly On-going Mystery of Dunwoody Records...

I have received some interesting feedback from readers of my March column on the unusual 1956 recording of a "D" Jaguar race car traversing the curves and straightaways of the track at Elkhart Lake. As some may recall, I was initially contacted by my friend Ken Freck of Musical Memories record shop in Milwaukee regarding a 45 rpm record on the Dunwoody label from Elm Grove. It contained nothing but the sounds of race cars on both sides of the disc. The mystery of why it was recorded has been solved, but its connection to Elm Grove or 1950s residents of Dunwoody Drive remains unknown.

In April, I was contacted by Tom **Schultz** of Wauwatosa, the official track historian for Elkhart Lake. He is the author of Road America: Five Decades of Racing at Elkhart Lake, published in 1999, as well as of Road America's official 50th Anniversary commemorative book. He has followed racing since he was a boy, and can remember well buying a copy of this record from the saleslady at Weiss' Rhythm & Rhyme shop at 7129 W. North Avenue in Wauwatosa for 89 cents. They were sold from a box separate from the racks where the "Top 40" hits of the day were displayed. He still has his copy.

Ken Freck, who also recalls shopping at that same store, added to the story by explaining that recordings of race cars on the track were popular with some segments of the record buying public in the 1950s and early 1960s, notably teenage

boys who loved cars. Around the same time, Riverside Records, a jazz-oriented record label based in New York City, began pressing a series of long play albums recorded at the endurance track at Sebring, Florida. Their popular LPs, The Sounds of Sebring, chronicled the endurance trials there in 1956, 1957, 1958, 1959, 1960, 1961 and 1962. Ken recalls stocking some of these long-out-of-print albums at Musical Memories over the years. Today, they are prized collectors' items and sell for more than their original list price.

The only information I had of the recording's origin when I wrote my March column was that the 'A' side was recorded on Friday, June 22, 1956 at Elkhart Lake and the 'B' side of Sounds Along the Track was taped the following Sunday. Tom Schultz has been able to supply all of the background to that rather meager set of facts, and probably only Tom, as track historian, would have been able to sew up this portion of the mystery so completely.

The files of Tom Schultz have confirmed that the "D" Jaguar recording on side 'A' was driven by the famous Briggs Cunningham, captain of the Cunningham Race Team. Cunningham had raced all over the world and had been featured on the cover of the April 26, 1954 issue of Time magazine. (The same issue featured color photographs of a recent H-bomb detonation test.)

Born in 1907, Briggs Cunningham would have been 49-years-old at the time of the Dunwoody Records recording. Tom Schultz believes that, from the sounds he hears on the disc, a reel-to-reel tape recorder with attached mike was held on the lap of a passenger in Cunningham's car during a practice run prior to the June Sprints weekend. The sounds of the Jaguar shifting down and up prove that it was indeed an in-car tape recording.

Ampex Electronics of Hayward, California, a company founded in 1944, made their first reel-to-reel tape recorder in 1948. By 1956, they had a smaller model that

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was battery-powered and could be held in the lap. It is likely that one of their recorders was used to make the original tape. Ampex products were favored by professionals of the era, and even N.A.S.A. used them in the days of the unmanned satellite launches.

Tom Schultz also informed me that noted French racing photographer Pierre Perrin was also present at Elkhart Lake that weekend, snapping photos which may well have included Briggs Cunningham's practice run that Friday, so there could be pictures of the time of the recording itself. Pierre Perrin was the recipient of high praise from Carl Goodwin in an article he wrote for Vintage Racecar magazine's October 2012 issue. He included his name among those famous race photographers who "captured some great images... images that will last for all time... images of the Golden Age of Sports Car Racing".

Certainly Perrin would have been interested in Cunningham's presence at Elkhart Lake that weekend, for Briggs was more than a great driver and team leader. He was also a race car manufacturer, an historian of his sport and a tireless advocate on its behalf. The Cunningham Race Team still competes today.

In just three months, we have learned that the obscure little 45 rpm record found at a garage sale in Brookfield has ties to celebrities, prominent corporations and significant events. The only mystery still remaining is what its relationship was to Elm Grove and a 1950s-era resident on Dunwoody Drive.

#### **Civics Lessons About State** & Local Government...

In my April column, I answered a question from News-Independent reader Richard Groh, who wished to know about the differences between cities, villages and townships, and about Elm Grove's incorporation as a village in 1955. I hope I answered the questions to his satisfaction, however, I have since heard from readers who wished to know something further about the number of units of government in Wisconsin and in the United States, and whether the amount of local governments is increasing or decreasing with the passage of time. Those are also good questions, and perhaps some statistics will shed further light on the matters that Mr. Groh first raised this spring.

sophomores. I enjoyed those classes, and still firmly believe that a good underpinning of civics is a necessary foundation of knowledge for all American citizens who intend to participate in public affairs, even if it's only to vote or sign a petition or attend a local meeting. People who ask questions about local government are likely to be informed voters.

I have saved some old copies of instructors' editions of Politics in States and Communities by Thomas R. Dye. From Dr. Dye's tables, taken from the U.S. Census Bureau reports, I can relay this information. Local governments are divided into counties, cities and villages, townships, school districts and "special districts". (The latter would include any districts established for a specific regional or metropolitan purpose, such as the Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewage District (MMSD). Some of these districts are permanent creations, while others are only temporary, designed to address a transient problem.)

In 1952, there were 3,052 counties in the then forty-eight states. There were 16,807 cities and villages and 17,202 townships. School districts numbered 67,355, many of them rural. By 1992, (even with the addition of two new states since 1952), the number of counties had shrunk to 3,043. (Two states do not have any counties: Connecticut and Rhode Island. All other states have them, although some may use other names to define them, such as "parishes" in Louisiana, which serve the same functions.) The number of cities and villages had grown to 19,296, mostly from incorporations of townships. Township numbers declined to 16,666. Through consolidation of rural districts, school district numbers had shrunk to only 14,586, but special districts had been created for myriad purposes and by 1992 had increased to 33,131. More recent figures are available from the Census Bureau, but would show similar trends. It may be interesting to note that Illinois has the most units of local government while Hawaii has the fewest. Wisconsin ranks at 13th highest.

As for the Badger state, the Wisconsin Blue Book informs us that Wisconsin in 2014 had 72 counties, 190 cities, 407 villages and 1,255 townships. There are 424 school districts in the state and 761 special districts.

Among the many people who responded was Elm Grove librarian **Paulette Brooks**. "Paulette suggested the word 'MORE'. This was based on an essay in the book where I mention that "more" was my first to Chicago to meet Amy at a tattoo parlor and get matching MORE tattoos. Paulette got hers (her first and only tattoo) on her left wrist. Amy got hers on the underside of her left forearm, in her daughter's handwriting. It was her second tattoo; the first being a small lowercase "j" (for Jason) that had been on her ankle for 25 years.

Just ten days after her Modern Love essay was published in the New York Times, Rosenthal, who wanted "more time with Jason, more time with my children, more time sipping martinis on Thursday nights..." succumbed to cancer at the age of 51.

"The literary world has lost one of the best," Paulette says, "but Amy's words will keep impacting and touching readers with her love and wit. She autographed her book, Encyclopedia of an Ordinary Life, for me with the phrase 'Amy and Paulette meet and share an indelible moment...'. Even now... We have gone from two to forty-five members, and our mission is to create satellite organizations in the surrounding Milwaukee high

schools; our goal is to raise awareness and promote responsible recreation in the prolific Wisconsin outdoors. I have always been an outdoorsman who has had a reverence for nature, but I never would have considered my interest a cause. Nor would I have fathomed that I had the creativity to materialize such a popular and productive organization. # Legal Issues

## How Often Should Your Estate Plan Be Reviewed?

Although there is no hard-and-fast rule that dictates how frequently you should review your estate plan, there are some general guidelines. You yourself should review the documents every 3-4 years. This may be as simple as reading through the documents to make sure that you still agree with the basic provisions. For example, are the individuals you chose as your primary and alternate Power of Attorney, the Personal Representative, or Trustee the same people you would choose today? Do you still want the same people to inherit your assets? Even if the answer to these questions is yes, you should still sit down with an estate planning attorney to review your comprehensive estate plan every 4-5 years. The purpose of this meeting would be to address any changes in the laws and ensure that all of your assets are still coordinated with the overall plan.

In addition to this regularly scheduled maintenance, there are certain events in life which may significantly affect your estate plan and which should trigger a review of the entire plan. These include:

- \* A change in your marital status.
- \* A significant change in
- your financial situation.
- \* The addition of new family members, whether children or grandchildren.
- \* The illness, incapacity or death of a family member.
- \* A change in your children's ability
- to manage their inheritance.
- \* Retirement. \* The purchase of real estate
- in another state.
- \* Starting a business.

Lastly, if you move to another state you should have all of your documents reviewed by an estate planning attorney in your new state of residence. Although the states have a fairly uniform approach to estate planning, each individual state has its own unique laws which may need to be accommodated.

Your estate plan is a valuable investment and you should ensure that it remains current. Your life is a work in progress and your estate plan should be as well.
