Prior to Tonawanda, Gray served as a classroom teacher at Dixon Elementary for four years, and before that taught for five years in neighboring districts.

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

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Governor Evers congratulates U.S. Presidential Scholar Ananya Bhatt.

Governor Tony Evers Speaks to Government Students at Brookfield Central

(BROOKFIELD)- **Wisconsin Governor Tony Evers** visited Brookfield Central High School on May 15, to speak with 100 students and teachers from various Government classes about his career pathway to becoming Governor and his primary roles and responsibilities. Governor Evers highlighted his deep connection to K-12 education, first as a student, then science teacher, elementary and high school Principal, and then State Superintendent, which was his first publicly elected office that he held for eleven years.

The Governor described his current position both in terms of daily tasks and briefings, and strategic work with the state legislative bodies and the many departments and agencies across Wisconsin. However, Governor Evers noted that he gains the most energy and insight by listening to people across the state, fulfilling his promise to visit all 72 Wisconsin counties, every year.

Following his brief presentation, Governor Evers responded to several questions students had prepared, ranging from the policies he was most proud of to how he spends his free time. The Governor's responses gave further insight into his work and the key responsibilities of his position.

Advanced Placement U.S. Government and Politics teacher **Nina Gevelinger**, who helped arrange the visit and introduced the Governor to the students, said "While we spend a lot of time in our class learning about the Federal Government, we cannot forget the power and impact of state and local governments on our everyday lives. Governor Evers reinforced the importance of listening to all voices in Wisconsin, choosing to focus on our shared values and what we have in common. It was a great honor to have the Governor address his role in government and answer student questions!"

Governor Evers closed the presentation by offering his personal congratulations to Brookfield Central Senior Ananya Bhatt, who has been named one of three U.S. Presidential Scholars in the State of Wisconsin.




Opportunity to receive e-mail updates. Included in the Spring Recreational Bulletin was an e-mail response form. The Village is collecting e-mails so updates on Village activities and major projects can be forwarded to interested residents. With the many major projects ongoing in the Village, the Board and Staff want to be able to provide short updates sharing progress throughout the year. Please take the time to share your e-mail with the Village to receive these valuable updates by emailing kgehl@elmgrovewi.org.

Speaking of Projects, let's review several updates including:

*Gebhardt Road reconstruction.

The project and the approach to financing the reconstruction approach was approved after thoughtful discussion. The approach will provide some additional funds to continue to update our roads. After the final contract is negotiated, a timeline will be published. The Project includes a pathway on the south side of Gebhardt from Pilgrim Road to Highland.

*Caroline Heights (Mandel) Construction. Final site engineering design work, acquisition of third-party financing and completion of the water design are major ongoing activities. Once these are completed, Mandel will acquire the land and begin construction, forecast for the 3rd quarter of 2023. Additionally, Mandel approached the Building Board to approve changes to the approved plan set. After thoughtful discussions with Mandel, including changes to

the original revisions submitted, the amended plans were approved unanimously by the Building Board. The changes ranged from landscape updates, balcony modifications and window material improvements suitable for apartment environments.

*Daylighting of the Underwood Creek. Design work continues on the rerouting of the Creek as required by the DNR. Appraisals are underway on railroad land and easements required to implement this design. The Board unanimously approved an amendment to extend the TID #2 expiration date by 3 years as permitted by state law and expanded the Project cost to include budget estimates for the daylighting. Amenities like bike paths and other landscaping outside the required creek area have not been finalized. Once successfully approved by residents via a referendum in April, 2024, the project is expected to begin.

Regular Board Meeting. One final update is a change in the Village's monthly Board meeting. At the staff's request to provide more time to answer any questions from Trustees, the meeting will be moved to the fourth Tuesday of every month starting at 7:00 p.m.

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Our History: Remembrances of Things Past

WHATZZIT?

While few Village residents are likely to remember the A & P Super Market at 13425 Watertown Plank Road, it is certain that many of them have gone shopping at that grocery store. I will explain the seeming contradiction inherent in the above sentence later on in this article, but first a bit of history will serve to place the tale in context.

In 1954, the Elm Grove Park & Shop complex on Watertown Plank Road opened to the public. Its original tenants included Phillips' Elm Grove Pharmacy, River Park Dry Cleaners, Hettiger's Record and Card Shop, Silverstone's Men's Wear, Richard J. Egerer Interior Designs, Frederick's Beauty Salon, and Dr. Jerry E. Klicka, **D.S.S.** At the south end of the Park & Shop property sat an open space that presented a fine retail business opportunity in a rapidly developing commercial district.

The Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea **Company**, founded in 1859, was in the midst of a post-war state of expansion. Their A & P grocery stores had become the largest and best-known purveyors of food and household items in the United States. In 1950, they operated over 4,500 supermarkets and neighborhood grocery shops. With an eye toward the future, A & P was now busily locating more and more of their stores in the burgeoning suburbs that were growing around most major cities. The Elm Grove Park & Shop was a perfect location for their marketing strategy of reaching young middleclass families of the 1950s. Douglas Mahr was hired as the new store manager.

A & P stores specialized in competitive prices and "store label" products such as 8 O'Clock Coffee, one of the tea company's original offerings. (The 8 O'Clock brand still survives today, now available at most major grocers.) When the new Elm Grove

location hosted its grand opening weekend, free coffee and low sale prices welcomed curious Elmbrook customers who were anxious to see the new "Super Market" for themselves. Interestingly, A & P's early advertising boasted that the new store offered "free parking"! This was not a novelty in Elm Grove or Brookfield to be sure, but to many recently relocated ex-urbanites, free parking was still often a pleasant surprise. All shoppers were given a "map" to the new store's layout.

Though well received at first, the new Elm Grove A & P faced very stiff competition from Food Fair at 13510 Watertown Plank Road, owned by village resident Wally Piechura and his partner Orville O'Neil, a former Marquette University track star. Along with their grocery manager Johnny Reinders, they spent nearly every work day at their store, reminding village residents that they were "the local boys". (Wally and Orville sold the Food Fair store to Kohl's in

After struggling with poor performance in the early 1960s, A & P decided to close their Elm Grove location in 1964. Following a year of extensive remodeling, the store reopened in the spring of 1965 as a Sentry Store, operated by the Godfrey Company. Its look was significantly upgraded, and now featured the streamlined look and bright, clean colors of the mid-1960s. For decades, it remained a popular place for area residents to shop, and their Saturday afternoon brat fry gatherings in the summer gradually evolved into a weekly village get-together. Once a dominant grocery chain in southeastern Wisconsin, the number of Sentry stores began to decline in the 2000s, and the Elm Grove location announced its closing, and the retirement of manager Darrell Doll, in 2006. Nowadays, there are only a very few Sentry stores remaining in the Milwaukee area.

Of course, by now, readers have guessed

that the old A & P store under discussion in this article is better known today as the local Sendik's Market. After the closing of the Sentry store, Sendik's began yet another extensive remodeling of the property, bringing it into the 21st century as it reopened in 2007. For the past 16 years, it has continued the nearly 80-year-long tradition of good service and fine food at the same location at the Elm Grove Park & Shop. Its signature red bags have become a familiar sight throughout the village, and the Saturday brat fry tradition continues. Meanwhile, A & P closed its last remaining stores in 2015, ending a legacy of over a century-and-a-half of serving their

Specifically, as an academic advisor at a college or university near or far. I was not able to land a job in higher education so I had to pivot. My mother suggested USPS so I applied in the summer of 2017."

• How long have you worked for the **USPS?** Which job titles?

KLOTH: "I officially started with the USPS in Oak Creek as a rural carrier in July of 2017. I became a city carrier about a year later, still in Oak Creek. In 2018, I was also given the opportunity to be an acting supervisor. My Postmaster gave me lots of opportunities. I had a chance to be an acting supervisor in South Milwaukee, Germantown, Mukwonago, and Oak Creek. All this experience was extremely valuable. When I finally became a career employee in 2021, I was finally able to apply for official supervisor positions. I quickly

secured a position as the Supervisor of the Cedarburg Post Office. I then became supervisor of the Oak Creek Post Office in 2022. Finally, I was given the opportunity to act as Postmaster of the Elm Grove Post Office in February of this year."

Plant Sale to Feature 70 Native Varieties

If you're looking forward to enhancing or establishing your garden this year, be sure to check out the Elm Grove Beautification Committee Annual Plant Sale on Saturday, June 3, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the Village Park & Shop parking lot.

You can choose from 70 varieties of native plants, grasses and herbs. There will be plants for sun, shade, wet and dry conditions. All plants are grown free of neonicotinoids, which are a group of insecticides that are toxic to bees and other insects. Four-inch potted plants will sell for \$6 each.

To help populate our Village's Monarch Map, you will get a free Milkweed plant with a \$10 purchase, while supplies last. Milkweed is a key food source for Monarch butterflies, which have been declining in population so much that it's currently on the candidate waiting list for Endangered Species Act protection. Monarchs are threatened, in part, due to pesticides — including toxic neonicotinoids and herbicides, which are killing off the Milkweed plants they need to survive.

Mosquito dunk tablets also will be for sale for \$3; instructions included. This simple, safe and effective alternative approach targets mosquitos at the larval stage. With this approach, you control mosquitos – and only mosquitos – without the use of harmful insecticides.





Estate Planning: Vacation Properties

Whether it is a lake home, a cottage in the woods or hunting land, vacation properties can be the source of your family's best memories. However, if you are lucky enough to own such a property, you need to decide what will happen to it after you die, otherwise it could drive a wedge between your family members.

Begin by determining what your goal is for the property. Do you want it to remain in the family or are you okay with it being sold? If it is to remain in the family, are you willing to transfer full or part ownership of the property during your lifetime, or only after your death? Consult an attorney as to not only what legal steps need to be taken for either option, but also what the tax consequences would be to both you and your children. Lastly, discuss what form of ownership, such as a trust or LLC, would be the best manner for multiple family members to own the property together.

Once you have made some decisions and have the necessary information, have a meaningful discussion with your children. Find out who actually wants the property. What they have to say might surprise you. One or more of your children might enjoy visiting the property now, but may not have interest in it after you are gone. Another may simply live too far away, or may not be in a financial position to take on the taxes, insurance and maintenance of the property.

Lastly, once you decide who will receive the property, you must also decide whether your other children will receive something else from your estate instead. everything has been addressed and decided, follow through with any necessary legal work. Working through these matters with your family will require effort. However, a successful transition of your vacation property to the next generation will be well worth it.



What's in <u>Your</u> Trash?

Elm Grove's First Official Audit Tells the Story **By Molly Salinas**

Every week you roll your garbage and recycling outside and magically the bins are emptied, right? Not quite. Garbage collection in Elm Grove is performed by Johns Disposal, with a special "up the drive" contract. Each full truck is driven to a larger "compactor" rear-load truck that sits at the Public Works site in Elm Grove. At the end of the day, the larger trash truck takes the trash to the Orchard Ridge landfill in Menomonee Falls. The recycling goes to the Materials Recovery Facility "the MRF" in Milwaukee. Through March of this year, Elm Grove sent 168.47 tons of material to the MRF, and 388.99 tons of garbage to the landfill. These numbers equate to roughly 59 pounds of recycling and 131 pounds of trash per capita for the first three months of the year. Residents pay \$357 per year in annual taxes for garbage and recycling services, which is partly calculated based on the weight of waste brought to the landfill. A group of intrepid Elm Grove residents decided to find out just what makes up all that poundage. Read on for more information about what's in your trash, and to celebrate our friendly Elm Grove garbage collectors!

A trash audit is a formal process of quantifying the various material types placed in the trash being created by a local area. The first annual Elm Grove trash audit took place on April 10th, 2023. The Wisconsin DNR performed a state audit in 2009 and 2020, however Elm Grove is the first municipality to complete their own. By determining the makeup of the trash, the Elm Grove Sustainability Committee hopes to identify actionable ways to decrease trash produced by the village.

Dan Jongetjes, a third-generation owner of Johns Disposal, welcomed 11 volunteers to dig through 1,340 pounds of trash from the Elm Grove collection at the Johns facility located in the Town of Norway in Racine County. Joining the group was State Assemblyman Tom Michalski, Village Manager, Dave DeAngelis, and area TV crews. Led by Elm Grove resident Nicci Sternitzky, each trash bag was opened, and the contents sorted into the following categories: food, clothing, plastic bags, recyclables, yard waste, Styrofoam, batteries, packaging materials, and true trash.

Once all the bags were opened and sorted, each category was weighed. Your trash is 51.2% actual trash. The rest is:

- 20.1% recyclables (paper, plastics #2 and #5, cardboard containers, etc.)
- 18% food waste
- 3.9% plastic bags
- 3.4% clothing (even new with tags!)
- 2.4% yard waste (it has been illegal to throw away yard waste in Wisconsin since
- 0.9% packaging (think Amazon bubble
- 0.3% Styrofoam (mostly from groceries such as a package of ground round)

What now? The newly formed Elm Grove Sustainability committee is looking into targeted ways to decrease the divertible trash. Here are some ways you can help:

- (1) Join the local composting efforts. We have services that will pick up your compost from your home weekly for a small fee.
- Recycle! Recycling with Johns is included in our residential trash pickup. All recyclables can be put together in a blue bin for pickup. Refer to the Elm Grove Recycling Guide for more information
- Donate unwanted clothing. Consider mending or upcycling clothing that is not accepted for donation.
- Businesses in the area including Sendik's and Pick & Save recycle plastic bags. Drop them off when it's convenient.
- Consider the packaging included in purchases. Can you buy the item you want with cardboard packaging instead of Styrofoam? Items such as paper egg crates can even be composted!
- (6) Stay alert for yard waste collection dates for all Elm Grove residents! Between pick-up dates, bring your yard waste to the Village Recycle Center at 900 Wall Street.

Many small actions can make a big difference! Commit to making one change a month to decrease your weekly trash. And while you're at it, thank your local garbage collector for the top-notch service they provide.

New Elm Grove Resident Attends Citizen Police Academy, Serves on Community Foundation Board By Bill Perrone


I am relatively new to Elm Grove. I wanted to get involved in my new community and was lucky enough to obtain a place in the 2023 Class of the Citizen Police Academy (CPA). I thought it might be interesting. Coming from a larger municipality (with a lot more "problems"), what did I expect? Mayberry RFD, maybe? What I encountered, however, is a very sophisticated police department and a friendly, dedicated, and professional staff.

The CPA is a community relations program designed for citizens to meet the people that serve them and to be educated about the how's and why's of law enforcement.

Through my participation in CPA, I have learned a lot about the community and the men and women who serve it. I rode along in a police squad car on 2 occasions. I sat in the dispatch center. I role-played a police officer in our class on "use of force". I participated in both real and staged traffic stops. I learned how the roads and neighborhoods are protected and policed. And, no, you are not going to be ticketed for going 3-over on Watertown Plank Road – but, please try not to anyway!.

I learned that there is a bit more crime in Elm Grove than I would have thought, but there are not the generalized safety issues that exist in other communities. I learned about defense and arrest tactics and evidence gathering. I toured the evidence room and learned how suspected drugs are tested and how the "chain of evidence" is preserved for future court proceedings.

Crime prevention, including home safety tips and ways to avoid identity theft, is also taught and emphasized.



Classes in the CPA are small (16-18 participants), which provides an excellent opportunity to meet and interact with other involved residents of Elm Grove.

All-in-all, my time in the 10-week CPA class was not only interesting, but also most enlightening. I now understand why police officers do what they do when interacting with the public. I know the stress they encounter and how they seem to operate well in spite of it. And, importantly, I am now aware of the amount of paperwork (mountains of it) that they must complete, review and file with respect to each traffic stop, ticket given, arrest made, or other citizen contact.

So far, I enjoy living in Elm Grove. The CPA has provided me with a new and greater appreciation for my new home. It deserves your support – or, at least, your appreciation!
