Our local bird enthusiasts are organizing a team to compete in the upcoming Great Wisconsin Birdathon on Sunday, June 6! This program is intended to raise support and awareness for birds in Wisconsin. Participation/donations can be made at www.wisconservation.org/birdathon. Just click "Get Involved" to register and join our team (team name is Elm Grove High Flyers). To make an optional contribution, click "Donate" to send in your chosen dollar amount by credit card or check.

Team participants will meet on Sunday, June 6th at Elm Grove Village Park by the bird feeders outside the library entrance at 1 p.m. to take a leisurely walk around the park path, see how many different bird species we can identify and then submit our findings on the "eBird "app sponsored by the Cornell Lab of Ornithology. We have a 24-hour period to report bird sightings, so even those who cannot participate in the walk from 1-3 p.m. can submit their input. The best part is that half of the money raised in donations for our team will come back to Elm Grove to support our own community bird conservation efforts. The other half of donations supports the Bird Protection Fund priority projects in Wisconsin.

## Village Update



May was a busy month for Village Board members with three special meetings needed to address specific issues in addition to the regular monthly meeting

The Board has approved an agreement with **Third Space Brewing to operate a Beer Garden** beginning on Friday, June 4 until the end of October. The Beer Garden can operate on Fridays from 4:00 until 9:00 p.m. and Saturdays from 3:00 until 9:00 p.m. The Beer Garden can also operate on evenings when Tunes on Tuesday music events are held.

Two Special Village Board meetings were held to address developments in the "Mandamus" litigation brought by residents Michael Rohr, Marc McSorley and Jan Termuehlen seeking to have a court order the Village to either adopt an ordinance requiring a referendum election prior to the letting of a public works contract costing a capital expenditure of \$1 million or more or to hold a referendum asking residents if they want such an ordinance.

The Rohr, McSorley and Termuehlen litigation follows a 2020 petition effort under the Wisconsin "Direct Legislation" law which created a process where residents can petition to have a local government adopt an ordinance described in the petition or to hold a referendum on the proposed ordinance. Village Board members described the proposed ordinance of the petition circulated as unworkable and likely illegal under tests established by the Wisconsin Supreme Court for a valid petition created ordinance. As written the petition language could require multiple referendums for a single "project" or make projects more expensive by requiring fixed costs before final engineering is available. Also, since project costs can and do change after a project starts, what happens



if a project estimated to cost less than \$1 million is found to exceed \$1 million? Do you stop work and wait until the next election to hold a referendum? Typically, project work or material bids have time line limits; could project be forced to begin the entire process from square one?

I hope that the legal dispute can be ended soon

At a Special Board meeting held on May 26<sup>th</sup> the Village Board voted unanimously to neither hold a referendum on the petition language nor to adopt the proposed ordinance. Board members detailed specific problems the petition proposed language would create and specific legal conflicts of the petition proposed ordinance and existing state law.

As Village President I agree with all the technical, practical and legal reasons to oppose the petition ordinance. Direct legislation may be legal when conducted properly, but this effort is an insult to all the volunteers who sit on Village Committee and Boards. Elm Grove has a reputation

for transparent government which has never spent money frivolously. This effort was undertaken to try to frustrate and block possible redevelopment of the School Sisters of Notre Dame campus, as admitted by some of the candidates in our recent Board election, not because of Village financial management. Would the petition creators or the litigants continue the lawsuits if there was no SSND redevelopment proposal? The Village Splash Pad project ended costing more than \$1 million. A number of the pathways currently under consideration have estimates over \$1 million. Should referendums be held all such efforts? Fire trucks can cost more than \$1 million.

A good sign that summer will soon arrive is the Village Board Recreation Committee discussions of plans and schedules to open the swimming pool and for the **grand opening of the new Splash Pad** on June 8<sup>th</sup>.

Plans for the Village July 4<sup>th</sup>
Independence Day celebration are
moving forward. There will be a Fun Run,
Children's Bike Decorating contest, games
in the park, food and fireworks. Thank you
in advance to Junior Guild members who
help make all this happen.

The Village Board has ended Village Hall and Park Covid restrictions. Masks are not required in Village buildings but are encouraged for those who have not been vaccinated or have other special medical concerns.

Finally, at the regular Village Board meeting this month the **Board agreed** to begin digitally recording all Village meetings for later viewing. Access to recorded meetings will soon be available on the Village website.



# Our History: Remembrances of Things Past

## Care for Sick and Aging Sisters

Sisters of Notre Dame's Milwaukee Motherhouse needed major renovations. The oldest sections of the building were over a hundred years old, there was evidence of structural deterioration and it was considered a fire hazard. The sheer size of the building meant that needed repairs would be costly, so the Sisters decided to build a new motherhouse in Mequon. The plans for the new facility did not include an infirmary in order to comply with local zoning laws that prohibited institutional dwellings, such as hospitals. The Sisters still needed a place to care for sick and infirm Sisters and once again, the property at Elm Grove provided the solution.

In 1957, construction started on Notre Dame Infirmary (NDI), a medical wing added to the existing psychiatric building (built 1955). The new facility included rooms for 100 patients as well as space for occupational and physical therapy departments. At the same time, the chapel was enlarged and reconfigured in a way that allowed sisters to enter from either wing.

In October 1958, preparations began for the opening of the new infirmary. Beds were purchased from Army surplus and an auto body painter was hired to bring his compressor to NDI to paint all the bed frames. Sisters made drapes for every room in the building and members of the Dad's Club, made up of men who had daughters in the congregation, assisted by moving furniture and equipment from the Milwaukee Motherhouse to NDI.

In February 1959, the first group of sisters prepared to leave the Motherhouse infirmary for their new home at NDI. The Junior Sisters and Postulants gave them a "hearty send-off in song" and the nurses were sent ahead to serve as a welcoming committee. Four Red Cross ambulances were used to move the bed-bound patients and members of the Dad's Club transported the wheelchair and ambulatory patients.

When NDI opened, it was staffed exclusively by Sisters, who were well educated in their respected fields. Sister

By 1950, it was clear that the School Theophone Mandragos was already a licensed physical therapist when she entered the congregation. She started a "traveling therapy" department at the old Motherhouse, which consisted of home-made equipment that she carried from room to room. She opened the NDI physical therapy department with secondhand and hand-made equipment. The Dad's Club took up the project and set out to raise the \$50,000 needed to purchase all new equipment.

> In 1963, Sister Lucille Heidenreich opened the music therapy department, where she developed an exercise program using hula hoops that was later used in lav nursing homes. In 1964, Sister Sara Jean Donegan and Sister Immacula List graduated from the Marquette School of Dentistry and opened the dental clinic. Two years later, Sister Catherine Patrice Droszcz became a board-certified pharmacist and the campus pharmacy was established.

> In 1970, the facility's name was changed to the Notre Dame Health Care Center (NDHCC). Throughout the 1970s, the number of Sisters on staff gradually decreased and were replaced by lay nurses and aides. In the early 1990s, many of the buildings needed repairs and leadership created plans for a major renovation project. At that time, the decision was made to transfer Sisters in need of skilled nursing care to licensed facilities and convert the skilled nursing area to space for an assisted living facility.

> In 1996, the three-year, \$14 million renovation was completed. A new dining facility was added onto Theresa Hall, St. Joseph's chapel was converted into the Heritage Room and bedrooms were enlarged and rearranged in groups around a community room and kitchenette.

> Notre Dame of Elm Grove (NDEG) has long served as a place of rest and care for sisters living with medical and psychological issues. The history of NDEG shows that the SSND made caring for sick and elderly sisters a priority.

also includes: Assistant Principal and Principal in elementary schools; Assistant Principal and Principal in high schools; Child Care and Pre-School Director; Auditor and Advocate in a Marriage Tribunal; Provincial Councilor, Resource Development Sister Representative; and, giving service in retirement.

In answering God's way, I have lived in community in Wisconsin, Illinois, Arizona and Texas. God's way has involved me being called and being sent to minister in places I never dreamed of as a farm girl.



# **Legal Issues**

## **Estate Planning and Remarriage**

By Attorney Isabell Mueller

Marriage is a time for celebration. However, in the event of a remarriage, it is imperative that you and your future spouse also focus on the less romantic process of redrafting your estate plans. Wisconsin is a Marital Property state, which means your marriage will affect the ownership of all of your assets, regardless of how the asset is titled. This change in ownership will affect not only the division of your assets in the event of a divorce, but also the distribution of your assets upon your death. In many instances it will result in a distribution that is substantially different from what you intended.

You and your future spouse's respective financial situations and family situations are most likely more complex than when you first married. You probably have more assets and one or both of you may have children from previous relationships. It may, therefore, be in both parties' interest to execute a prenuptial agreement. In deciding whether or not a prenuptial agreement is appropriate, you and your future spouse should address the following issues:

1. How do the two of you plan to share, or not share, your income and expenses? Do either of you have any significant liabilities for which the other should not be held liable? Health care costs and the cost of long-term care should be a significant part of this discussion.

- 2. In the event of a divorce, how do you want your assets divided? Do either of you have strong feelings about keeping any assets as your "individual" property in the event of a divorce?
- 3. In the event of your death, how do you want your property to be divided between your surviving spouse and your children? Do you want the majority, if not all, of the assets going to your surviving spouse? Or do you want your children or other family members receiving a significant share? These are the most significant issues that must be addressed and are also the factors which will determine whether or not a prenuptial agreement is needed. Once these issues have been addressed and, if necessary, a prenuptial agreement has been signed, the rest of your estate planning documents, (Wills, Revocable Trusts, Powers of Attorney, etc.) should be updated to reflect both your decisions and your new marriage.

## Move the Petition Forward

Last October, Elm Grove citizens submitted a valid and legal direct legislation petition to the Village. The petition proposes that public works projects of \$1 million or more be voted on by referendum before proceeding. The intention is to ensure significant public works projects have broad resident support.

A certified direct legislation petition has only two paths forward: Trustees can vote it into law OR place it on a ballot to be voted on by electors. If a majority approve, it becomes law. There's no third option.

From the moment the petition was submitted, village leadership has gone to extraordinary lengths to disregard residents' rights in favor of their own authority. They rushed counter legislation hoping to invalidate the petition's certification. They disqualified signatures based on handwriting discrepancies. They argued semantic concerns. After trying Elm Grove

to decertify the petition, village officials fought to have the matter dismissed in court when residents petitioned to ensure the legal rights of citizens were upheld.

In May, Waukesha County Circuit Court Judge Michael Bohren ruled the citizen's petition was lawful and should proceed. A Mandamus Order an extraordinary writ issued to compel compliance with a plain duty - was granted to ensure that the Village complies with the

At the time of this writing, the Village Board is meeting with legal counsel to determine their strategy going forward. Hopefully, they will decide not to expend any more taxpayer-funded resources and advance the petition in the proper legal manner.

"Elmbrook commits to creating a comprehensive plan to hire ... staff that identify as Black, Indigenous, or People of Color...(and) adjust curricula... to ensure...anti-racist history ..." What happened to merit-based hiring? There you have it. Equity is a euphemism for Critical Race Theory.


