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
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A map of Elm Grove properties certified as Community Wildlife Habitats: red dots are homes; blue dots are common areas; yellow dots are schools.

### Elm Grove **first Wisconsin community** to earn National Wildlife Federation's Community Wildlife Habitat certification

Village Becomes 150th Certified Community Wildlife Habitat in the Nation

(ELM GROVE, WI) - The National Wildlife Federation's Community Wildlife Habitat™ program has announced that the village of Elm Grove has officially been certified as the first community in the state of Wisconsin to achieve this designation. Through the program, Elm Grove aims to become healthier, sustainable, and more wildlife-friendly by committing to create wildlife habitat throughout its community while also educating and engaging residents through events, educational workshops, and hands-on service projects.

"The Elm Grove Beautification Committee led the Community Wildlife Habitat certification effort," according to Wisconsin Wildlife Federation Executive Director Mark LaBarbera, who said he hopes other communities in the state will follow Elm Grove's lead.

The volunteer committee hosts several activities each year to help educate and engage residents in creating a beautiful community for homeowners and wildlife alike. The activities include native plant, shrub and tree sales, weekly invasive species removal in the village, establishing and registering monarch butterfly habitat throughout the community, engaging residents in No Mow May, hosting an Earth & Arbor Day celebration, establishing a rain garden in the village park, and sponsoring a Winter Lecture Series and a Book Club.

"Earning this certification by engaging residents to take action to make our community healthier, more sustainable, and more wildlife friendly makes perfect sense given our community's previous attainment of Tree City USA, Bird City Wisconsin High Flyer status, and Bee City USA" said Village President Neil Palmer.

Healthy habitats and healthy communities go hand-in-hand. Looking beyond the more visible wildlife, the program seeks to encourage participants to understand the important interconnectedness of plants, insects, and the whole breadth of the ecosystem. Protection of species such as the federally endangered rusty-patched bumblebee are at the heart of this community's motivation.

"By becoming certified with the National Wildlife Federation's Community Wildlife Habitat program, Elm Grove is sending a clear and powerful message to communities all over America that people working together can create healthy habitats and healthy communities, and make a difference in their



own community and beyond," said **Patrick Fitzgerald**, Senior Director of Community Wildlife.

The well organized and supported National Wildlife Federation Community Habitat program has been in existence since 1997. Elm Grove is proud of becoming the first certified community in the state of Wisconsin and looks forward to partnering with other Wisconsin communities to help them achieve their goals of certification.

WWF's LaBarbera added, "This program is vital in helping implement wildlife conservation strategies equitably across communities by creating corridors for wildlife, increasing the use of native plants, removing invasive species, and reducing the use of chemicals."

Attaining this certification requires each community to earn 150 points in four supporting categories (community outreach, education, registration, and administrative) along with habitat points that are based on each community's population.

# #2. What has motivated you to run for election / re-election at this time?

#### \*Jim KOLESKI -

"As Village President, I will be dedicated to actively listen to and communicate with the community, including open discussion of issues and explanations supporting decisions.

#### \*Tom CASTILE -

"Elm Grove's success depends on engaged citizens forming the backbone of the community. My desire is to serve the citizens by representing their needs / interests only."

#### \*Robert PRANGE -

"Experience, insights, skills learned throughout career prepares me to be a good addition to board. Ready to give back to my community; understand the hard work that is required."

#### \*Kristina SAYAS -

"I'm running for re-election to keep Elm Grove a great community to live in for future generations and to ensure residents voices are heard."

#### \*Tom SHEPHERD -

"I am not a single-issue candidate. I serve the Village on the Finance Committee. That experience has exposed me to all departments and challenges within Village government."

# #4. What are the 3 most significant issues / challenges facing Elm Grove within the next 5 years? What solutions / improvements would you suggest?

#### \*Jim KOLESKI –

"Challenges include approving the downtown master plan supporting the measured development of open spaces including the Reinders parcel and downtown and exploring options, recognizing the impact of on-line and home delivery trends. Also, creating housing options for residents no longer desiring single family homes, possibly side by side townhomes built to support aging in place. Other priorities include, finding long-term solutions for the EMS and Fire Department manning coverage, Underwood Creek Daylighting, defining the future of water in the Village and monitoring the construction of the Charlton Heights (Mandel) project. Finally, technology investments required to enhance public safety and security cost-effectively."

#### \*Tom CASTILE -

"Police, Fire and EMS service: Increased demand for services together with recruiting issues. Multiple challenges, especially with staffing volunteer EMS and Fire. We must find creative way to fund these critical community services.

Pedestrian safety: Increased density within Elm Grove and in neighboring areas will result in increased traffic. Additional pathways will be required, traffic speed laws enforced plus when possible, enforcing no thru traffic to reduce non-local citizen traffic at key traffic times.

Proper Development: Development is needed to ensure community growth, however future development must fit within what makes Elm Grove a safe, tranquil community for our families."

#### \*Robert PRANGE –

"Increasing costs of public services and how they are provided by the village.

EMS and Fire department services are under pressure as volunteerism wains and costs are increasing related to delivering services.

Tough questions about development projects and how to provide pressurized water to development areas to support code requirements of fire suppression on all construction.

Moving forward on redevelopment efforts to help increase tax revenues and avoid future taxes of service fee increases to the citizens of Elm Grove Village."

#### \*Kristina SAYAS –

"Budget: pressure on operating budget from levy limits and inflation, combined with capital projects that have been neglected, we need to go after more federal grants, cut costs and find creative ways to fund programs/

Development: Daylighting the creek, potential rezoning, bringing water to residents and downtown. With current TIF projects not to be paid off for 20 plus years, challenges to find additional funding for village projects while balancing downtown character.

Emergency Services: We already implemented overnight accommodations and increased pay. Still, we need to consider additional contracting to cover potential shortfalls if recruitment efforts cannot cover needs."

#### \*Tom SHEPHERD -

- "1. Long term strategic planning for our Village Center I am running on a platform of 'common sense planning and development' which I believe unifies the current divide.
- 2. Fire/EMS Our history of volunteerism is exceptional and unique, however, most likely not sustainable. I will work cooperatively with the Fire/EMS department heads, Village board and staff to evaluate all options and determine the best long-term Fire/EMS solution for our citizens.
- 3. Public safety crimes of opportunity, auto thefts, and fraud are on the rise in the west suburbs. I am unapologetically pro family, pro safe neighborhoods, and pro police."

# #3. What can you offer our Village that is unique from the other candidates? What do you most hope to accomplish if elected?

#### \*Jim KOLESKI –

"Serving as Chair of the Finance Committee educated me on the budget and funding challenges facing the Village. As a CPA, I will work with the Village team to help prioritize spending priorities and maintain the current strong financial position. Work with State representatives to increase State support of Municipalities."

#### \*Tom CASTILE -

"My business experiences in Open Innovation processes will assist in building frameworks for improved communication and developing creative solutions to the challenges we face. My goal is to ensure open, transparent, two-way communication and that proposed solutions represents the will of the majority and not just the few or developers."

#### \*Robert PRANGE -

"Working in a variety of positions while paying for college. I gained experience in construction, remodeling, building maintenance, HVAC, electrical, plumbing, and physical operations of multibuilding campuses. I look forward to working on committees to manage and develop the Village for the future."

#### \*Kristina SAYAS -

"I'm fortunate to hold leadership positions with multiple village organizations which provides me a unique prospective of our current challenges and opportunities. Foster constructive, civil and respectful dialogue among Village residents, the Board and the business community; continue to listen, respond and act in the best interests of EG residents."


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# Village Update

The Village Board met as a Committee of the Whole on February 23<sup>rd</sup> to discuss a number of issues and planned projects (a Committee of the Whole is for discussion only; no action can be taken.)

Possible extension of municipal water from the City of Wauwatosa to the Village of Elm Grove. There have been a number of discussions regarding obtaining access to Lake Michigan water over the last 30 years. The planned Mandel project to redevelop the School Sisters of Notre Dame campus will be connecting to the City of Wauwatosa system at 118th Street and Watertown Plank Road and installing a new water main along Watertown Plank Road to a point near the SSND cemetery. The Village proposes to extend to new main to serve other Village properties. The initial Village constructed new main will proceed west to the railroad tracks.

The "big picture" plan is to provide municipal water from Lake Michigan throughout the Village. Elm Grove will not form a water utility. After sections of the new water system are constructed, the system will be turned over to the City of Wauwatosa water utility, which will own and operate the system under rules and rates established by the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin. Elm Grove customers will be charged the same rates as users in Wauwatosa.


The Public Works Committee will work with the Village Engineer to establish a plan and schedule to extend the system through out the Village. Numerous questions about the extension to new areas will need to be decided in the coming couple of years. These issues include whether or not to require connection by property owners, how to apportion costs for the new service to property owners and how to finance the projects.

The Board continued discussion of the plan to "daylight" the Underwood Creek that currently runs underground between Watertown Plank Road and Wall Street. The daylighting project is the final piece of the "Stormwater Management Plan" developed after the 1997 and 1998 floods. Right the creek runs inside a pipe under the Park & Shop parking lot and under the Sendek's grocery store. The plan design approved previously by the Board will create a new creek channel beginning at the south side of Watertown Plank Road at the bridge, which will turn east to then follow the railroad corridor south to rejoin the existing creek south of Wall Street near the walking trail. The plan includes naturalization of the new creek corridor and a pathway. The Village has acquired the old Martinizing Cleaners property which will be demolished in March.

The Board also discussed options for financing of the municipal water extension, the creek daylighting, and the planned Gebhardt Road repaving and pathway projects.

The Legislative Committee unanimously approved language to amend the Village Ordinance language "Standing covering Committees" to create a new "Sustainability Subcommittee of the Public Works & Utilities Committee. The new subcommittee will provide guidance on, and support for projects approved by the Public Works & Utilities Committee and the Village Board, which will assist the Village, residents and businesses in balancing the needs for economic, social and ecological needs. The new subcommittee can have up to eight public members plus a Trustee member.

I recognize that the subcommittee charter sounds a little weird or vague to some. However, the focus is easy to understand when seen as the logical extension of the successful work of the Beautification Committee over recent time. That committee has spearheaded efforts to educate and encourage property owners to consider planting native species, reducing, or eliminating insecticides and weed herbicides. Elm Grove recently became the first community in the state to receive certification from the National Wildlife Federation for Community Wildlife Habitat! Elm Grove has "Bird City" designation. Many residents plant native plants to support the Monarch butterfly and manage their property in ways which sustain wildlife. These efforts don't mean that we let our property "go wild." It means we recognize that a property which



is managed primarily in the old English garden idea of manicured turf grass and non-native flowers and bushes does not support most other species we need and want. Nationally, we are struggling to save Monarch butterflies and many species of bees. If we don't help these and other insects survive, we lose our pollinators for food crops and other plants. If we don't create and support some habitat for other insects to flourish, there is no food for raising young songbirds. Insects also eat other insects helping keep other insect populations from reaching pest levels.

The new subcommittee will help residents learn how to manage and improve their properties in a more sustainable manner and improve the natural beauty of Elm Grove.

Candidates for school board, village trustee, judgeships are set for the April 4th general election, following the February 21 Primary. If you will not be in town on April 4th, please make arrangements to vote absentee or early.

# Our History: Remembrances of Things Past

#### WHATZZIT? By Stephen K. Hauser

The above photo was taken on May 13, 1946. It was a sunny spring day. The foundation had recently been laid for the Elm Building, a new commercial and professional building to be constructed "in the heart of Elm Grove" at the 13400 block of Watertown Plank Road. As the post-war "baby boom" and the suburban "building boom" began to get underway, the unincorporated hamlet of Elm Grove was rapidly transforming into a burgeoning suburb. Newly settled families required a wider array of services and greater retail choices. In the 1950s, the Elm Grove Park & Shop complex would be built across the street, but, for now, the Elm Building would be the Grove's new retail destination.

By the end of 1946, the building's new tenants would include the Elm Grove branch of the Wauwatosa State Bank, Esther M. Knapp's Elm Grove Beauty Salon, Dvorak's Tastee Towne restaurant and soda fountain, John D. Piazza's shoe repair shop and Hugo A. Tagatz Plumbing, Heating & Appliances. Upstairs, Dr. G. Allan Kriz, a physician, saw his patients in a small office, not an uncommon practice for doctors of that era.

The next few years saw additional tenants settle in. Elm Grove Printing Services set up shop in the building's basement, with a separate entrance in the back. The Dvorak family sold Tastee Towne to Verne and Virginia Draka, while Dr. Kriz sold his practice to Dr. Elmer A. Schmidt who continued to see his patients in the upstairs office. Al Quartemont opened a shop selling shades, blinds, and draperies, while the Elm **Grove Flower Shop** moved in in 1950. There were also several private apartments on the upstairs level. Comer's Bakery opened a confectionery in 1951.

Of course, change is constant in commercial real estate. Comer's sold their bakery to Klein's and moved to a new location at 122<sup>nd</sup> and North Avenue in Wauwatosa. The doctor's office became an artist's studio occupied by Gil Reid, nationally acclaimed for his paintings of trains and railroad themes. (His last painting was of the old Elm Grove passenger depot.) The Klein's bakery became the offices of Hanon Realty, with former village barber "Harkey" Bartsch as agent in residence. Time and space do not permit tales of the accountants, security specialists, sales representatives and others whose occupations passed through the Elm Building over the decades since 1946.

Although it cannot be disputed that change is indeed constant, it must also be granted that there is some validity in the old saw that "the more things change, the more they stay the same". The venerable old building still plays host to a beauty salon, now known as Elm **Grove Hair Design**. The Elm Grove Flower Shop still resides at its original location, nowadays called Snapdragon Flowers (although it is interesting to note how many area residents still refer to it by its former name.) And Caroline's Café still serves lunches, following in the tradition of the proprietors of Tastee Towne. No doubt former owners and employees of these establishments would be well pleased to see their work being

carried forward into the 2020s.

Writing articles of this sort naturally stirs up memories. I recall the delicious doughnuts from Klein's bakery, and I remember my friend "Hunz" Reusch telling me (in the early 1990s!) how much he missed being able to order a meat loaf 'blue plate special' at Tastee Towne. It's all just a reminder to me that the work we do in life lives on in the appreciation and memories of those we've served, even after we've gone.





Traditionally the district had been financially frugal, but this changed over a decade ago and though the current balance sheet is passable, headwinds are coming that will require difficult decisions."

"Significant issues facing this district include:

1)Role of technology in education. I bring expertise in child development to ongoing evaluation of educational tools.





#### **What Documents Will Your Family Need?**

After you pass away, your surviving family members will need to gather many of your personal and financial records in order to settle your affairs. Keeping these documents organized and accessible is important for both you and your loved ones. Your filing system doesn't need to be elaborate, just organized. Your family will need the following documents when the time comes:

- List of Funeral Instructions and prepaid funeral contracts
- Last Will and Testament
- Revocable/Living Trust agreements
- Prenuptial/postnuptial agreements
- VA File Number, Military discharge papers
- Birth certificate and Death Certificate
- Marriage license or Divorce Decree
- Medicare Card/Health Insurance Card
- Bank statements, checkbooks, check registers, certificates of deposits
- Safe deposit rental agreement and keys

- Deeds, mortgages, leases, homeowner's insurance information
- Stock and bond certificates and account statement
- Pension, IRA, retirement statements/ current employee benefit information
- Life insurance policies or statements
- Last several years' income tax returns
- Documentation regarding any debts, such as auto loans or credit cards

It is not necessary to give copies of these documents to anyone during your lifetime, but they should be easily accessible in the event of your death. The information should also be kept reasonably current.

Lastly, if you maintain important information on your computer, or have social media accounts, leave instructions regarding username and password information. Not having this information can cost both time and money. Maintaining organized personal and financial records is one of the best gifts you can give your family.

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
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
