

### Profile: John Bogdal


Elm Grove Public Library Adult Services Coordinator

# Village Update

As President Jim Koleski is seeking reelection, past practice is for the Village Manager to write this month's update to avoid any election concerns. Let's jump right in.

"In like a lion, out like a lamb!" As we begin the dynamic month of March, it is important to remember that spring is just around the corner, and with that warmer weather too! There is certainly much to look forward to in the Village and I am thrilled to provide updates pertaining to on-going projects.

### **Underwood Creek Daylighting Project:**

At the direction of the Public Works Committee on February 10th, our engineers at Stantec will be redesigning and extending the stepped quarry stone wall on the westside of the new creek channel (to the northwest near Watertown Plank Road). This 70-foot extension of quarry stone wall will allow for a reduction of the "poured-in-place" reinforced concrete wall, affording the Village real savings in construction costs. Stantec engineering will be completing environmental/geotechnical boring and soil sampling early in the month. The results of this soil analysis will present a clear picture on the amount and type of soil contamination existing within the new creek channel corridor. Providing this soil analysis within the bid advertisement for construction removes uncertainty and risk for contractors leading to a more competitive bid. The Public Works Committee will be reviewing the 90% engineering plan set at the March 10<sup>th</sup> meeting.

### 2025 Village Pathway Construction Update:

KL Engineering has completed the 30% engineering plans for the pedestrian pathways being designed in 2025. These segments include: Juneau Boulevard (Village Park to Crescent Drive); Gremoor Drive (Legion Drive to Arrowhead Court); Underwood River Parkway (Hollyhock Lane to San Fernando Drive); Gremoor Drive (Arrowhead Court to Fairhaven Boulevard). A Public Information Meeting was held on February 6th, and residents provided feedback on the 30% engineering design. It is important to note, the engineer's opinion on probable construction cost has come in much higher than what the Village initially budgeted for pathway construction in 2025. The Public Works Committee will need to determine how to proceed within the budget constraints. The Public Works Committee will be discussing this item at the March 10th meeting.

### <u>Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan</u> (CORP)

On February 20th, the Board of Trustees and the Recreation Committee held a joint meeting and Open House to present the final draft of the CORP document to the public. A presentation was given by our consultants, Vandewalle & Associates, and public comment on the draft document was taken. Why should the Village spend time, energy and resources on a CORP document? As Recreational Committee Chairman and Village Trustee stated, "The CORP is the Village's strategic offensive weapon in advancing the Village park facilities and obtaining grant funding to do so." The CORP outlines the facilities in the Village and makes recommendations on future facility improvements. One of the main drivers behind Drafting the CORP is a prerequisite for many State and Federal grant opportunities and associated funding. Staff will pursue competitive grant funding opportunities as they become available. Next steps? The final CORP document will be reviewed at the March Recreation Committee meeting and forward to the Board of Trustees. A big shoutout to Recreation Manager, Logan Kein, and the Recreation Committee members for their "heavy lift" in seeing this guiding document through to completion. Well done!

### D 'oh!... A Deer!

Have you observed a higher number of deer roaming through the Village than "normal"? Recently staff has received multiple phone calls, emails and photo evidence of deer in the Village. How does the Village address our deer population and what steps can be taken to ensure a healthy population is maintained? Safety first. Annually, the Police department reviews the total number of Car vs. Deer accidents in the Village which began in 1992. In 2024 the Village had 3 Car Vs. Deer accidents of the 96 vehicle accidents in 2024, representing 3.1% of the total. Currently, the Village does not intend to take action to cull the deer population. However, a deer population census is planned. If the population is determined to be too high, the Village will then need to consider obtaining a Wildlife Management Permit and cull the herd in 2026. From a best practice standpoint, culling operations in Wisconsin typically occur from late fall through winter.

# **News Briefs**

### Calling 911 from a Cell Phone vs. a Land-line

Elm Grove Emergency Services Recommendations

When you call 911 from your cell phone, the call is sent to a centralized dispatch center in either Waukesha County or Milwaukee County, depending on what cell tower picks up your call. Before the call taker can transfer your call, they need to determine your location for transfer to the proper dispatch center.

In most cases, the county dispatcher will not be familiar with landmarks and business locations by name, and they will need an exact address before they can transfer the call to our Elm Grove Dispatch Center.

We strongly suggest that you program our direct emergency line, 262-786-4141, into your cell phone to avoid delays in service for emergencies happening in Elm Grove.

Our dispatchers have intimate knowledge of our geography and are capable of discerning your location quickly, with limited information. When it is your emergency, you will want to be speaking to the person who is talking directly to the responding fire, ambulance, or police unit that is coming to your aid.

There are no changes to your current land-line 911 service.
All land-line 911 calls continue to be answered
by Elm Grove dispatch personnel.





(3 Trustee seats up for Election; 2-year terms)



### #1. Discuss your background, education, occupation, years in Elm Grove, family.

### • Tom CASTILE -

Resident of Elm Grove for 17 years. Married with daughter and two grandchildren also in EG. BS in Accounting degree. Majority of my career in Polymer compounding and emerging technologies. Retired in 2024 after the sale of our compounding business.

### • Jim OLSON -

My wife, Betsy, and I have lived in Elm Grove since 2005, raising our children, Nick and Katy, who attended St. Mary's Visitation School. I'm a Wisconsin Registered Architect with degrees from UW Milwaukee School of Architecture and Urban Planning.

### • Eric PETER -

My parents and grandparents were Elm Grove residents, so I spent years growing up in and exploring the village. For over four decades we have lived and raised our family here. Our family runs a manufacturing business in Menomonee Falls.

### • Kristina SAYAS -

My husband James and I moved to Elm Grove and purchased his family home 11 years ago. 2022 we welcomed our son Thomas. Bachelors from DePaul, masters from Northwestern. President/Founder of KEO Consulting Group (business development consultant) and full-time mom.

### #2. What has motivated you to seek election / re-election?

### • Tom CASTILE -

As a newer trustee, my efforts to provide residents with increased transparency/insight into critical issues facing the Village (see below) remain nascent. We need to develop sound long-term solutions that protect the character of our Village and not band aids.

### • Jim OLSON -

I'm seeking election due to my experience on local and professional boards, which taught me the value of collaboration, leadership, and service. I'm motivated to give back to the community by using my skills to strengthen and enhance it.

### • Eric PETER -

Having lived in surrounding communities, this tiny village in eastern Waukesha County is unique. Today's Elm Grove experience is quite similar to past generations, and to most residents that's good. Preserving that unique substance for successive generations is a goal.

### • Kristina SAYAS -

I ran for trustee 4 years ago to ensure residents' voices shape Elm Grove's future. Seeking re-election, I remain committed to transparency, community input, and initiatives that enhance our village's vibrancy and quality of life, ensuring comprehensive and informed decision-making.

### #3. How have you contributed to / served our community within the past 5 years?

### • Tom CASTILE -

My efforts have been focused on key citizendriven demands – enhanced public safety, controlling Village expenses, and supporting critical public initiatives including increased pathways, enhancements to our Village Park, and garnering support for the creek daylighting referendum. I'm focused on new legislation to preserve and protect resident approval on critical issues.

### • Jim OLSON -

Since 2006, I've been a dedicated and engaged member of the Elm Grove Building Board, collaborating with the community and fellow board members to maintain neighborhood integrity. In 2008, I became chair, motivated by a desire to assist residents in enhancing their properties and the overall character of Elm Grove.

### • Frie PETER \_

Personally, I serve on the Elm Grove Board of Appeals. Recently I have been attending select Village Board and Committee meetings. I am a director at the Milwaukee Rescue Mission and support many local charitable organizations. In reality all village property taxpayers contribute to bettering our greater Elm Grove community.

### • Kristina SAYAS -

Currently serve as Village Trustee, Vice-President of Community Foundation, member of Woman's Club, EGJG and Mrs. Claus for Lights-of-Love. Been an active member of the community since the year we moved here. President along with other leadership positions of the EGJG and Board of Directors of EG Citizens Police Academy.

### Jim KOLESKI -

# #1. Discuss your background, education, occupation, years in Elm Grove, family.

Margo and I moved to Elm Grove in 2011 as empty nesters. After attending Whitewater, I have worked for Manufacturing Businesses after 12 years with KPMG, an accounting Firm. I am a Certified Public Accountant and consult with Businesses on Strategy.

# **#2.** What has motivated you to seek election / re-election?

Elected Trustee in 2022 and Village President in 2023. As Village President, working with the Board, we have advanced pathways, Underwood Creek Daylighting, road repaving, recreation improvements and hiring/retaining Village Staff. Would welcome the opportunity to lead further meaningful improvements.

# #3. How have you contributed to / served our community within the past 5 years?

As Village President I serve on the Public Works, Planning Commission (Chairman) and Finance (Chairman) Committees. Through active participation and leadership, we have been able to balance the budget within the constraints of the State's levy limits which have averaged 2% over the last 3 years and built 2 pathways.

# #4. What are the 2 most significant issues / challenges facing Elm Grove within the next 3 years? What solutions / improvements would you suggest?

Balancing the fiscal budget will be challenging without levy relief from the State. Mandel/Caroline Heights will require increased services from the Village without any increase in Village revenue for over 15 years. Incremental revenue from the Project will payback borrowings used to fund incentives provided the Developer. The Village is exploring other tax revenue actions taken by other communities, if necessary.

Developing a long-term strategy to maintain the excellent volunteer EMS and Fire services provided. As current volunteers are no longer able or willing to volunteer, the Village must attract additional volunteers. Recent compensation scale improvements have provided breathing room.



#4. What are the 2 most significant issues / challenges facing Elm Grove within the next 3 years? What solutions / improvements would you suggest?

### Tom CASTILE -

We need to find creative, cost-effective, long-term solutions to ensure the long-term sustainability of the current level of fire and EMS services our residents deserve and expect. Our volunteer-driven model lacks sufficient new volunteers. The short-term solution will be to utilize the higher taxes residents will soon pay as a result of the Caroline Heights development.

The longer-term solution to fund Village services will be to develop a comprehensive master plan that favors single family home development. This approach will help ensure that future development is consistent with the current resident wishes without compromising to large developers.

### Jim OLSON -

The opening of the Caroline Heights Development represents a pivotal moment for our village, bringing both opportunities and challenges. This evolving landscape will require thoughtful future planning to preserve the qualities that make our village special.

Daylighting Underwood Creek and expanding pathways are exciting and transformative village projects. Ensuring safe, accessible design elements for residents is key to their success.

The common denominator of both initiatives highlights the need to revisit a master plan, making sure it reflects our community's evolving needs and provides clear, fiscally responsible guidance for future development while embracing forward progress.

### • Eric PETER -

We will soon face the assimilation of the Caroline Heights development into our Village. Retaining the special essence of Elm Grove will require monitoring and addressing traffic, safety, noise and other items which may arise from high density housing. Greater services for any of these may create additional financial burdens.

We need to continue our pedestrian path project and execute the creek daylighting project in a beautiful, functional and economically viable fashion, update our Village Master Plan and finalize and execute as much of the CORP plan as is reasonable.

I believe these responsibilities should fall under local decision making.

### · Kristina SAYAS -

- 1. Prioritizing a balanced operating budget that covers rising maintenance costs while funding essential services and infrastructure improvements residents seek. Strategic financial planning ensures we sustain existing services, invest in the community's future, and responsibly manage increasing costs without overburdening taxpayers.
- 2. The full impact of the Caroline Heights development on Elm Grove is still uncertain. Once fully occupied, we can assess traffic and public safety needs. With no added tax revenue from the TIF, we must ensure taxpayers are not burdened with increased costs from this development.





# Report from Madison

### **State Budget Process: Will The Will of the People** Be the Law of the Land?

Governor Evers and I often quote what is written on the ceiling in the Governor's conference room, "The Will of the People is the Law of the Land." Long ago those words were inscribed on that ceiling as a reminder that what we do in Madison should reflect the values of the people we represent, and the will of Wisconsinites. Governor Evers and I take that energy into the state budget process.

Every two years the Wisconsin legislature passes a biennial (2-year) state budgetthis occurs in the odd year of the 2-year legislative session. Fun fact: in Wisconsin we must balance the budget.

The budget process begins about a year earlier, in the "even year," with the governor gathering input from state agencies and stakeholders. Lawmakers (that's me!) also spend the "even year" gathering input from constituents and stakeholders, and then present funding proposals to the governor. I met with Governor Evers in December to present my ideas and concerns on behalf of my constituents and my district, and we will include a link below to more details of that meeting.

On Tuesday, February 18th, Governor Evers delivered his "Budget Address" in the State Assembly. The governor's budget proposal is presented in the form of a bill. Both the executive and the legislative branches are part of the budget crafting process—and so are the people of Wisconsin.

After the governor's address, the proposed budget bill, along with related documents, lands on our desks at the Capitol, and the process is off and running across the state!

Wisconsinites will have the opportunity to participate in various types of listening sessions between now and the final budget vote, which is likely in June. You can also call and email your representatives anytime with your input.

The final version of the budget bill comes from the legislature's Joint Finance Committee (JFC), a committee composed of 12 Republicans and 4 Democrats from both the Assembly and the Senate. JFC spends months deliberating the final version of the bill, and then sends their proposed budget to the floors of the Assembly and Senate for (possible) amendments, and a final vote in each house. The two houses can each amend the bill, but must agree on the same version before sending it to Governor Evers for his response.

If the Senate and Assembly pass a budget bill (it must be the same in both houses), the bill is sent to Governor Evers' desk where he can sign the budget as-is, veto the budget in its entirety, or utilize his partial veto power and then sign the budget. If a budget is not passed by July 1st, the state continues to operate under the biennial budget from the previous session. Once a budget is signed by the governor, the final state budget goes into effect starting the 1st of July.

And...that's how it usually happens. Time will tell what will happen this year, and I encourage you to engage in the process and share your feedback with me, and your state

At the end of this process, will the will of the people be the law of the land? I always move forward with hope.

Did you know that over 60% of Americans reported buying secondhand items, primarily clothing, in 2023? The trend is growing! However, fast fashion—inexpensive, mass produced, lower quality clothing, is also on the rise. People spent \$150 billion (with a B) on fast fashion worldwide in 2024, and the industry is only growing.

People typically wear an item only 7 to 10 times before disposing of it. Is this because the quality is lower? Likely. The environmental impact of fast fashion cannot be overstated. The industry contributes annually to more carbon emissions than international air travel and shipping combined, uses a staggering amount of water (141 billion cubic meters annually) and oil, and is a significant microplastics polluter.

Fast fashion also contributes to humanitarian crises, both in underpaying workers, and with high volumes of textilesover 11 megatons annually! -- ending up in landfills, which are more likely to be located in areas with higher populations of people of



# Elmbrook High School Key Clubs: Leadership and Service to Our Communities By Bill Keefer

Key Club International, affiliated with Kiwanis International, is a worldwide service club dedicated to helping children around the world. The Elmbrook School District is blessed with two very strong and successful Key Clubs at Brookfield East and Brookfield Central high schools, sponsored and supported by the Elm Grove Golden K Kiwanis Club.

Key Club International, established in 1925, is the oldest and largest student-led service organization for high school students. Its mission is to promote leadership and its core values through serving others, fostering character development, and encouraging inclusiveness.

The first Key Club was formed in May 1925 at Sacramento High School in California. The initiative was spearheaded by **Albert C. Olney and Frank C. Vincent**, both members of the local Kiwanis Club and high school administrators. They envisioned a junior service club within the high school that mirrored the Kiwanis model, aiming to provide vocational guidance and promote community service among students. The inaugural club began with 11 charter members and held regular luncheon meetings, featuring guest speakers from the Kiwanis community.

Over the subsequent decades, Key Club experienced significant growth. By 1939, the organization had expanded to approximately 50 clubs, leading to the formation of the first Key Club district in Florida. In 1943, the movement achieved international status, officially becoming Key Club International. A notable milestone in the organization's history was in 1977 when female students were first admitted, reflecting a commitment to inclusivity.

Today, Key Club International has several thousand Key Clubs in high schools and their equivalent institutions in 45 countries around the world. Cumulative membership numbers exceed 200,000 high school age students.

### **Brookfield Central High School (BCHS)**

Begun in 1957, the Brookfield Central High School (BCHS) in Brookfield, Wisconsin, boasts one of the most active Key Clubs in the nation. Its Key Club is recognized as the largest club in the world, offering students numerous opportunities to engage in service, character building, and the development of leadership skills.

The club's 300+ members are deeply involved in community service projects and programs amassing over 9,000 hours of service time each year. Projects range from school initiatives like serving as guides for Open House or running concessions for various events, to community efforts like working the city's parades or holiday tree lighting events, various library events as well as community-wide, such as serving meals at Kathy's House or the Gathering, to larger efforts like raising money for the Red Cross for disaster relief.

The club organizes large-scale events as well. In February 2019, the BCHS Key Club held its third annual Dance Marathon, successfully raising over \$9,000 for Children's Hospital. The event featured students standing and dancing for extended periods to garner sponsorships, with additional support from local businesses and school administration through raffle prizes.

Each year the club works at the "I Can Shine Bike Camp" where volunteers teach kids with special needs how to ride a bike. The club hosted the event at BCHS in 2022 to start off the summer and successfully worked with 60 kids for a full week. Kids, volunteers, and parents all gain something special through participation in this event.

One of BCHS Key Club's most anticipated annual events is the Gold Out Football Game, a charitable initiative dedicated to raising awareness and funds for childhood cancer research. Each year, in conjunction with cross-town "rival" Brookfield East, students, staff, and community members come together for this special game, donning gold attire to show their support. The event includes t-shirt sales, raffles, and donation drives, with all proceeds benefiting organizations such as the MACC Fund (Midwest Athletes Against Childhood Cancer). The Gold Out Game not only unites the school in a shared cause but also unites the community to make a difference in the lives of children battling

The BCHS Key Club is also active in Key Club International and the Wisconsin-Upper Michigan District. Club members have served as Lieutenant Governor for various districts around the state, as well as board members for the district and as the District Governor.

### **Brookfield East High School (BEHS)**

Since its formation, the BEHS Key Club has been passionately serving its local community through service activities. Chartered on June 1, 1965, the Club began with sponsorship from the Brookfield Kiwanis Club. In 1986, the Elm Grove Golden K Kiwanis Club assumed sponsorship.

Founded on the pillars of purposeful service, citizenship, and leadership, the Key Club has been both an impactful and popular organization over the years among students at BEHS primarily because of its core values, opportunities to develop leadership skills and its dedication as a service organization. Over the years the Key Club has initiated and supported many projects including selling American flags in support of patriotism measures for local veterans, care packages for active-duty service men and women, toy drives for the Salvation Army, created Thanksgiving baskets for low-income families in Milwaukee, organized holiday clothing drives, and school-wide park cleanups.

Throughout the years, BEHS Key Club has continued to flourish, averaging around 200 members, supporting more than 30 events each year and providing hundreds of hours of annual community service. Not only has the Club increased its membership numbers, but it has also expanded the impact it has had in the support of its many service projects. The Club has also entered partnerships with several local organizations including the Brookfield Library, the Elm Grove Woman's Club, the Elmbrook School District, and the Red Cross. Key Club outreaches to the community include activities such as Candy Cane Lane, an event that the club

has supported for several years. One in particular is working with their counterpart at BCHS, supporting the annual Gold Out Football Game against Brookfield Central that raises over five thousand dollars annually for childhood cancer awareness.

The BEHS club continued to have a close relationship with the Kiwanis organization and Key Club International. Several East alumni served in leadership positions as District Governors and were pivotal in planning statewide projects.

The Elm Grove Golden K Kiwanis Club is proud of its association with our two local Key Clubs. Both clubs have for many years provided the foundation for young men and women to build character, develop leadership skills and learn the importance of giving back

to their community through service to their community.

Dr Mark Hansen, Superintendent of Elmbrook Schools has this to say about the Key Clubs: «The Elm Grove Golden K Kiwanis Club has been an invaluable partner in helping establish and support our Key Clubs at Brookfield East High School and Brookfield Central High School which also happens to be the largest Key Club in the world. The students who are Key Club members contribute thousands of hours of service to our region each year. These young men and women are changing the world, and we are so grateful for the Elm Grove Golden K Kiwanis Club's participation in helping them make the world a better place."

You won't find tall buildings here Or anywhere nearby. Which means that we Can clearly see A lot more of the sky.







### Accomplishments



- ✓ Develop and implement a new Comprehensive Master Plan to guide responsible Village growth, prioritizing low-density development and single-family homes.






