Memorial Day in Elm Grove: Past & Present

Our Village's first Memorial Day Flag Ceremony was held in 1947 when members of American Legion Post 449 marched from their clubhouse (then located at the southwest corner of Juneau Blvd. and Legion Dr.) to the flag at St. Mary's Visitation church, followed by area children riding bikes. In 1948, the Legion held a ceremony at the cemetery on Highland Drive, and again children arrived there on bikes. Memorial Day 1949 was marked with a ceremony at St. Mary's and, in 1950, Post 449 organized not only a parade but additional events for families. Post 449 is now located in Brookfield, but the tradition it began here 71 years ago remains a signature community event, held to remember and honor the sacrifices


Drive, east on Elmhurst Parkway, south on Church Street, west along Watertown Plank Road, then south on Elm Grove Road, ending on Wall Street.

Another safety issue discussed by the Public Safety Committee was concerns over speed and inattentive driving on **Marquette Avenue west of the St. Mary's Church** following mass. The Marquette Avenue neighborhood is experiencing a home ownership turnover and more small children are now present.

On April 3, voters in Elm Grove re-elected Village Trustees: George Haas (1,146 votes); Patrick Kressin (1,071 votes); John Domaszek (1,060 votes). There were 45 write ins.

Waukesha County Supervisor-District 8, **Tom Michalski**, unopposed, retained his seat with 2,817 votes. (25 write-ins).

Elmbrook School District Board members Jean Lambert and Scott Wheeler, unopposed, were re-elected.

Waukesha County voters elected attorney Laura Lau Circuit Court Judge, Branch 12. Wisconsin voters chose Rebecca Dallet as Justice of Supreme Court. It was a NO to the referendum question "Elimination of state treasurer?"

Police Department Receives Funding for Village Park Security Cameras

An Inside Look at Waukesha County Government

Elections were held on April 3, and I was up for re-election to represent you in Waukesha County Board's 8th District. I'd like to thank everyone for their vote of confidence in allowing me to represent them on the county board.

I see many of you when I am out shopping or at local events, and the comments of support I receive, while gratifying, also generates a humbling reflection on how fortunate we are for living in such a wonderful area. It bolsters my commitment to keep our community safe, beautiful, and economically thriving. I welcome the opportunity for these interactions. The conversations often require me to do a little extra research to verify my understanding is current and complete. Speaking as someone with a background in education, I find the constant learning opportunities satisfying.

Unlike some other representative structures, The county board is built new every other year. For example, a U.S. Senator has a six-year term with one third of our senators up for re-election every other year. Wisconsin State Senators have a fouryear term, half of our state senators are up for re-election every two years. Elm Grove Trustees and Brookfield Aldermen have two-year terms, with half of their board elected every year. The Waukesha County

Elections were held on April 3, and I Board has a two-year term and every other year, all the county supervisors are elected.

April 10 was the last session of the Waukesha County Board's 2016–2018 term. One week later, on April 17, the 2018-2020 session began by swearing in all the elected supervisors. Newspaper publication deadlines force me to write this article in that one-week gap, which makes writing this article a little interesting. Last term I was on the Finance and Human Resources Committees, but at this moment I am not on any committees. I won't know which committees I will serve on until sometime after the 17th when the session is underway.

After the members of the board of supervisors are sworn in on April 17, the first meeting of the session becomes an organizational session. Supervisors will nominate and elect a county board chairman, and four supervisors will be elected to the executive committee. With the completion of these five elections, the first session of the new term is complete.

After the meeting, the board chairman will appoint an additional two supervisors to be members of the executive committee. These six supervisors will be appointed to chair the six standing committees: Finance, Health & Human Services, Human Resources, Land Use, Parks & Environment, Judiciary & Law Enforcement, and Public Works. With the executive committee and committee chairs selected, the board chairman will then appoint each of the remaining supervisors to serve on two standing committees. This is when I will learn on which of the standing committees I will serve.

Two years-ago, when I was first elected, about one third of the twenty-five supervisors were new to the board. This year there will be two new members joining the board. Since the composition of the board will be nearly the same, I anticipate the supervisors elected to be board chairman and to the executive committee to also be nearly identical. I've requested to remain on the finance committee, but in this area the chairman will be the determinant.

In the two years as your supervisor, I think I've made a difference. I've worked to ensure Elm Grove received state funding to help pay for the new Watertown Plank bridge. I've also worked to give the sheriff's department more flexibility in their hiring process. That change has allowed the sheriff to expedite the hiring of qualified experienced officers, which reduces training time, and by extension, lowers overtime costs. I've also worked to keep your property tax bill down. Your Waukesha County tax went down in both of the past two years. In fact, Waukesha County has the lowest tax bill (of counties that do not also collect a sales tax) in the state. Our conservative fiscal governance is recognized by Moody's by awarding Waukesha County a AAA bond rating.

This past diligence will work in our favor going forward. Plans for the long overdue renovation of the county courthouse in 2019 are moving forward, with a total cost of about \$97 million. The county will need to take on debt in the form of bonds to manage this expense. The courthouse project is necessary for many reasons. The current courthouse, built in 1959, needs modifications to accommodate 21st century communication and energy technology. Modern security requires the total separation of three groups: the public, the judicial personnel, and the prisoners. That means, three separate entrances, hallways, and staging areas. Additionally, Waukesha County has grown since 1959, and as a result, it needs more court rooms.

At the same time, I will remain focused on the needs of Elm Grove and Brookfield, and work to maintain the quality of life in our corner of Waukesha County. As always, please contact me with questions, comments or concerns. I hope you find the time to enjoy this spring, whenever it decides to show up.

Elm Grove is a safe community where children play in yards and walk or bike to school, the Park or to get an ice cream. We all need to help keep the Village safe by slowing down and paying close attention for children, walkers and bicycle riders.

The Village Board is intending to select a planning firm to prepare a Downtown Business District Development Plan. One of the most frequent comments expressed whenever a development or renovation project is proposed is that the Village needs a plan. The selected firm will involve all Village stakeholders in preparation of the plan. There are a number of Village businesses and landowners considering development proposals and it is important that we develop and implement a plan to guide those efforts. Elm Grove is prized as a residential community with a "rural Village" feel. To keep our home values strong we must also support a local business service sector.

homeowner complaint. For homeowners who have to replace a well, as we have recently at our home, well water is a long way from being "free" as some like to think. The lack of municipal water supply also makes it much more expensive for business owners to redevelop or remodel as state law requires that commercial structures have fire suppression sprinkler systems. To comply with the law a special fire pump and water storage system must be added to a building. Condominiums and rental properties also have unique problems and costs operating a well and water treatment system.

There is a lot of **fun activity this month**: Fazio's Sweet Moments in the Park & Shop will hold a **Grand Opening for Piazza Fazio** on Saturday May 5. In addition to the incredible chocolate we can sit and enjoy a

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By the end of May, we also intend to have selected a contractor to design, plan and construct **restoration of the small wetland adjacent to Tonawanda School**, where numerous ash trees have been removed due to Emerald Ash Borer infestation. Without proper restoration the area will create stormwater pollution control problems and will be quickly overrun with buckthorn, reed canary grass and other invasive species. The project budget is \$126,082 with \$70,000 provided through a grant from the Fund for Lake Michigan and \$56,082 from Village of Elm Grove stormwater funds.

I continue to hear more calls for the Village to evaluate **expansion of our public water system**. At present public water is only available along Wall Street, on Elm Grove Road south of Wall Street and on a small stretch of Bluemound Road. Concerns over water quality, safety and cost are a frequent coffee or expresso.

The Elm Grove Beautification Committee will hold their **Annual Plant Sale on Saturday May 12** at Ray's Auto on Watertown Plank Road. You can also get free advice to your gardening questions from some of the most talented gardeners around from 7 a.m. until 2 p.m.

The Elm Grove Junior Guild & American Legion Post 449 will host the **Elm Grove Memorial Day Parade on Monday, May 28**. Following the parade the Elm Grove Men's Club & the American Legion Post will be providing music, food and refreshments on Watertown Plank Rd. between Church and Elm Grove streets while the E.G. Business Association will host food, refreshments and music at the Park & Shop parking lot.

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Past Times: I REMEMBER...

The Annual Commemoration of Our Veterans

Memorial Day is a day on which all Americans pause to remember. We recall the sacrifices that many have made over the decades to win our independence and to sustain it. This year, as always, there will be solemn ceremonies of remembrance all across the country. One such commemoration will take place, as it has for many years, at Oak Hill cemetery, 3500 N. Brookfield Road in Brookfield. There, Elmbrook area residents will share a special experience in saluting the memory of Nathan Hatch, soldier of the American Revolutionary War of 1776. Such opportunities are indeed rare in the Midwest, although obviously quite common on the east coast. In fact, Brookfield's Nathan Hatch is the only Revolutionary War veteran buried in Waukesha County and one of only a handful buried in Wisconsin. Therefore, while it seems fitting that we should gather to honor those who have fought over the years to keep our freedom, we should all pay special homage to one who fought to first obtain that freedom. That is why I chose to tell Nathan Hatch's own remarkable story in my May, 2017 Past Times column, "A Man Three Times Brave". (Visit www. elmgrove.news and click on ARCHIVE, then scroll to May 2017 issue to read it on Page 4.)

I believe, however, that a patriot such as Nathan Hatch would want honors bestowed upon his comrades from all of the wars in which they were called to serve throughout America's history. He would not wish to see any of them overlooked on his account, and would certainly want their service and sacrifice to be remembered along with his own.

Oak Hill Cemetery is truly a pioneer cemetery. It was established in 1851 on a portion of farmer Joseph Eubank's homestead. This was only eight years after the Town of Brookfield was established in 1843. As a nonsectarian burial place for early settlers, a few prior burials on area farmsteads were removed to Oak Hill over the next several years. Among them were the remains of Nathan Hatch. As a result, Oak Hill is the place of final repose of heroic pioneer residents. They were those who moved here while Wisconsin was still a territory, far from the safety and convenience of more settled areas. (Statehood for Wisconsin didn't come until May 29, 1848, entering as the 30th state of the Union.) These early residents had to be self-reliant and independent.

to perform maintenance and clean-up chores at Oak Hill each spring, prior to his death in 1983. (I wrote an account of Harvey's long life and his devotion to his fellow veterans in my *Past Times* column of May, 2014. (See www.elmgrove.news.)

Harvey was certain that there were veterans of the 1898 Spanish-American War buried at Oak Hill as well. The late **Emory Moore**, longtime officer of the Oak Hill Cemetery Association whose property abutted the cemetery, agreed, and told me he had long heard stories that this was so.

There is also a likelihood that a few veterans of the 1832 Black Hawk wars along the Mississippi may be resting at Oak Hill, but this proves difficult to trace because the conflict was fought primarily by volunteer militia units made up of settlers from Wisconsin, Iowa and Illinois and formal records are incomplete. Among the better-known militiamen in that conflict were young **Abraham Lincoln** and future Wisconsin territorial governor **Henry Dodge**.

For the past thirteen years it has been my privilege to deliver an historical address each Memorial Day to those gathered at Oak Hill. One abiding memory that I will always carry with me from those annual gatherings is that of watching a father and his two young children, down on one knee in front of the grave of a Civil War veteran.

His arms around his youngsters as they stood by his side, he was telling them of that 150-year-old conflict as they stared at the headstone with wide-eyed wonder. That image stays with me as I write this, because it is also a part of what Memorial Day is meant to be about: the passing on of the tales of courage, valor and honor and the relating of a long-ago response to a call to duty to protect and defend the America that these veterans loved. This patient dad was explaining that same love to his modern family. I trust that this year we will all share once more in passing on that sacred tradition of remembrance.



Along with early settlers, Oak Hill also is the burial place for veterans of every major war that the United States has fought. A few years ago, the Oak Hill Cemetery Association and Commander **Tom McDermott** of Brookfield's Behling-Kutchera American Legion Post #296 compiled a revised list of the veterans believed buried there. They documented 16 Union Army Civil War veterans, along with veterans of the War of 1812, World War I, World War II, Korea and Vietnam. Of course, peacetime veterans also repose there along with many others.

My old friend **Harvey Celley**, a World War I vet and a past commander of the Behling-Kutchera post, led some of the annual commemorations at Oak Hill, beginning in 1940. He also was active in organizing local Boy Scouts and others Cemetery, see Page 9.







Elm Grove Men's Club's Memorial Day Block Party to Benefit Veterans

Twenty-five years ago, before the Elm Grove floods of '97 and '98, American Legion Post 449 was located along Underwood Creek on the corner of Juneau Blvd. and Legion Drive. After the Elm Grove Memorial Day parade every year, Post 449 would have a party. We would take our children to the post, where they ate hot dogs and gobbled up the free ice cream, joining many other families from Elm Grove and the surrounding area.

A group of men, now in their 50s and 60s, who would jokingly call themselves The Elm Grove Men's Club (EGMC), offered to sponsor a local rock'n roll band and provide beer to compliment the Vets' party. After the Legion Post was destroyed by flood, the EGMC continued to provide beer and music for a postparade Memorial Day party that was held in the Park & Shop parking lot. All funds earned from the sale of beer, donated by Pabst, was contributed to the Legion Post, which was now relocated to 124th Street in Brookfield. Over the years, we developed a relationship with Post 449 members and eventually became members ourselves. The EGMC members who were not vets, joined as Sons of Veterans.

Last year, after many discussions about how to make our event more productive (and fun), we petitioned the Village Trustees for a permit to keep Watertown Plank Road closed after the Memorial Day parade for a Memorial Day Block Party to honor and to raise funds for veterans. It was a tough sell to the Elm Grove Trustees, who, of course had to be skeptical about closing Elm Grove's main street for 3-4 more hours. We assured them that it would be a fun family event and would be good for the village. They agreed. We also invited the Legion Post members to join the party, and they were happy to cook brats and burgers next to our beer/soda/ water tent. Generous donations from Pabst, Usingers, Cedar Crest, Langer Roofing, and other local businesses allowed us to substantially increase our donation to the vets. The EGMC spouses, who have supported the event in various capacities over the years, worked alongside the vets, satisfying the appetites of hungry partiers.

This year the block party will again be located on Watertown Plank across the



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Legal Issues

Estate Planning: Top 5 Reasons for Updating Your Plan

1. A Change in Marital Status

A change in your marital status will require significant changes to your estate plan. If you've recently married, Wisconsin's marital property will now apply to the division and distribution of your estate upon your death. The resultant distribution may be far from what you planned. If you've recently divorced, then your estate plan should be updated to ensure that your former spouse is removed as a beneficiary and fiduciary, as well as any of his or her relatives.

2. A Change in Financial Status

A change in your financial status may also require a change to your estate plan. If you've recently won the lottery or received an inheritance, you should review your existing estate plan to ensure it meets the needs of your now larger estate. The same is true if your estate has declined in value. Does your estate plan still make sense in view of a lower net worth?

3. The Birth or Death of a **Beneficiary or Fiduciary**

If a beneficiary or fiduciary named in your estate plan has died, then you should update your plan to remove the individual's name. However, if your spouse has died,

then your plan may need to be completely restructured. On the other hand, if you or a beneficiary have adopted or had a child, then you should review your plan to ensure that the new child is included.

4. Moving to a New State

A move to a new state is one of the most overlooked reasons to update your estate plan. Every state has different law affecting the requirements for estate planning documents, and also the administration of those documents. This is particularly true of anyone moving to or from Wisconsin, as our Marital Property Law is unique.

5. The Passage of Time

If your beneficiaries were younger when you set up your plan, then as they get older you should assess whether they still need the protections incorporated in your documents. They may now even be ready to take on the fiduciary roles in your estate plan, such as power of attorney for finances and health care, or the Personal Representative of your Will. Your lives, and those of your beneficiaries and fiduciaries, are works in progress. Your estate planning documents should reflect the changes brought by the passage of time.

Economics in the Classroom: Brookfield Academy Students Strategize with Stocks By Marie O'Brien

Brookfield Academy student Margaret Walsh watched her stock picks carefully for weeks. One week, a \$100,000 investment looked promising and the next week the stock performance didn't look so good. She and her investment team, comprised of other Level 8 classmates, smiled as they recounted the ups and downs of watching their money perform. The reason for the smiles? The stock performance was real, but the investment money was not.

Margaret and her classmates were participating in a stock market simulation competition sponsored by Economics Wisconsin.

"We are competing against other teams from around the state. How we perform depends on how our stocks do — if they go up, we go up in placement. If they drop, we drop in placement," she said. "We could go from 15th place to 300th place very quickly."

Level 7 students Laurette Blanchard, Stuart Frohna and Emily Courtwright experienced similar fluctuations. "We were 13th in the region and in 200th place in the state at one point, but we learned about buying and selling certain stocks," said Laurette. Their strategies worked. Laurette, Stuart and Emily placed 3rd in the state competition out of nearly 700 teams and two Level 8 teams placed in the top 10 regionally in a competition held earlier this year.

Students participating in the stock market simulation are taught by Middle

School teachers Matt Wasmer and Eric Volmar. "Any stock that is for sale on the New York Stock Exchange or NASDAQ our students can select. They start with \$100,000 of fake money but apply it in real time over a 10-week period," said Mr. Wasmer.

While participating students bring home new knowledge about how the stock market works, they agree the competition prepares them for the real world in other ways.

"I think it helps shape our future for careers, and if it's not a main career, it will help me manage my personal savings one day," said Level 8 team member Natalie Cartwright. Classmate Carly Zeiler enjoyed working with a team. "You don't

have to have a certain set of skills, we learn as we go and we make decisions together," Carly said, "It's definitely a fun competition to do with your friends."

The Stock Market simulation is one element of Brookfield Academy's Middle School curriculum which complements another economic lesson in the classroom called BAME (Brookfield Academy Mini-Economy). BAME is a nationally recognized program which exposes students to the world of a simulated economy and government. Both classroom activities reinforce the mission of the school: the development of responsible and constructive free people in a free market economy and a free, democratic society.
