A Memorial Day ceremony will be held at 10:00 a.m. at historic Oak Hill Cemetery, 3500 N. Brookfield Road, Brookfield, as a joint effort of several community organizations, including the Behling-Kutchera American Legion Post 296, the Oakhill Cemetery Association, the Elmbrook Historical Society, Brookfield Academy, and Boy Scout Troop 71.

"The program honors all those who gave their lives in defense of liberty, with special recognition given to **Nathan Hatch**, a Revolutionary War veteran buried at Oak Hill," noted spokesperson **Helen Moore**.





Spring is in full bloom. What a change from just a few short four weeks ago. It is great to see our Village Park increase in activity from residents enjoying the walking trails to high school tennis. Wildlife is returning, bringing with it the birds rich vocal sounds of chirps and whistles.

Congratulations to John Schindler, Jennifer Stuckert and Shawn Hillmann on their election to continue to serve the Village as Trustees. I appreciate their dedication and commitment to the Village Board team and look forward to their ongoing contributions.

River Keeper Clean-up and Earth Day **Celebration and Recognition**

On April 20th, volunteers participated in a clean-up along Underwood Creek and the Village Park. An extensive amount of refuse was recovered during this clean-up that extended to South Park. Thanks to all the volunteers participating in this important annual event.

On April 27th, Earth Day was celebrated throughout the Village. Activities from an inaugural recycling event, shredding day and food trucks made this day meaningful. Thanks to the Sustainability Committee, the Business Association, and the many recycling organizations for their support.

Recognition has been received by the Beautification Committee. The Committee Received the 2024 Invader Crusader Award from Wisconsin Invasive Species Council. In addition, a grant for \$1,000 was received for the continual fight against invasive species. Well Done!

Major Construction in the Village *Caroline Heights Project

The completion of the water and sewer mains for the project are in full swing with residents significantly impacted. Having walked the area, I know the Village staff is actively working to minimize the impact and disruption. Staff is also looking forward to installation of laterals for those residents electing to connect to the water main and restoring damage to roads and residents' property from construction crews driving on lawns.

*Culvert Replacement on Highland


The Board approved the bid to replace the more than 100-year-old culvert near the railroad tracks. There will be road closures as this project proceeds. Stay tuned for further announcements.

*Highland Pathway

The portion of the Highland Pathway from North Avenue south to Gebhardt will commence soon. It is expected that one lane traffic will be required at times, with the expectation that efforts will be in place to minimize the impact.

*Road repaying

The Village is seeking proposals for road construction. The budget includes a commitment of \$800,000 to address the deteriorating road situation.

The contractor needs dry conditions for two weeks to limit damage to the park. It is expected that this project will commence in June.

The projects underway will require a significant effort from all Village staff to organize, monitor and provide safe passage. I thank everyone in advance for their support and patience as this very busy schedule is completed.

Committee of the Whole May Meeting

The Board will be meeting on May 20th to review and discuss various topics. These meetings provide the Board an opportunity to have an open discussion with staff on future projects or actions and share direction with staff. Agenda items this month are expected

Underwood Creek Daylighting **Engineering Update

Stantec, our engineering consultant, will update the Board on progress to finalize the engineering design and internal cost estimates. In addition, discussions continue to acquire the railroad land and easements required.

**Discussion related to potential updates to the one-million-dollar limit in place requiring public works projects to be approved via referendum. The Public Works Committee will also discuss this in May and provide feedback to the Board. In addition, the Board will discuss how future Tax Incentive Districts will be approved.

Recreation Committee

I would like to recognize Logan Kein and the entire Village Staff for the commitment to bring the summer brochure and activities to life. This is a significant effort which includes hiring staff for all the programs and pool activities. Thank you, Logan, for leading this effort!

*Bookie Cookies to be Sold at Elm Grove Parade



Our History: Remembrances of Things Past


Oak Hill: Remembrance, Honor and a Place of Rest

Back in the 1840s when Brookfield Township was established by Wisconsin's territorial legislation, early settlers often buried their deceased loved ones in secluded areas of their own homesteads. Some may still reside there today, unbeknownst to current property holders. It wasn't long, however, before our early residents began to establish cemeteries, either through their various churches or through the creation of nonsectarian cemetery associations. One such was the Oak Hill Cemetery Association, established in 1851 on land previously farmed by the Joseph Ewbank family. Soon, family plots and individual gravesites were offered for sale to area settlers. Some of the remains of the folks who had passed on previously were subsequently relocated to the new cemetery as well.

Oak Hill Cemetery is located at 3500 N. Brookfield Road atop a pleasant hill on a wooded tract of land just north of the Brookfield Junction village. It contains about 200 burial lots, 179 of which are occupied or slated as "reserved" by family members. Many of the Elmbrook area's earliest settlers rest in peace there. Gravesites of 48 military veterans are to be found there, including the remains of Pvt. Nathan Hatch who enlisted in the Continental Army as a teenager at the outbreak of the American Revolutionary War in 1776. Hatch later migrated from New England to the Wisconsin territory in 1843 at age 85. The Waukesha Freeman of June 27, 1918 noted that a commemorative marker was to be placed beside Hatch's grave by the Waukesha Daughters of the **American Revolution** at that year's 4th of July celebration.

Other veterans buried at Oak Hill have included those who served in every American war and conflict from the War of 1812 through the Vietnam era. That is one reason why Brookfield's Behling-Kutchera American Legion Post #296 has long been involved in maintaining the cemetery grounds. Harvey Celley, a Brookfield veteran of World War I and a charter member of the Behling-Kutchera Post, helped in decorating the veterans' graves from the 1930s through the 1970s, though he did not own a plot at Oak Hill. When asked why he would volunteer, Harvey simply noted his own service overseas and gestured toward the graves, saying, "They're my buddies!" Harvey passed away in 1983, but other Legionaires

have continued to provide services and contribute at the cemetery.

The Oak Hill Cemetery Association continues, as it always has, to take the lead in the preservation of the graveyard's grounds and amenities. Today, the site is immaculately maintained. For decades, Amory and Doris Moore, who owned a home nearby, served as inspirational figures, humbly and quietly seeing to it that the respect and dignity of the property was secure. Amory Moore was a longtime treasurer of the Association and was instrumental in persuading the Wisconsin State Historical Society in Madison to add Oak Hill to its list of notable burial sites in the Badger state.

As a resting place for founding families, brave veterans and longtime area residents, Oak Hill Cemetery continues to be a local touchstone of heritage, history, patriotism and remembrance.








Public Safety Reports

An Interview with Eileen Cruz (Alvarado)

May is the Mental Health Awareness Month. On this occasion, I interviewed Eileen Cruz (Alvarado) who is an author, youth advocate, and survivor. For the past sixteen years, she has worked in the Milwaukee community to help survivors who have different forms of abuserelated trauma.

*What inspired you to write books?

Eileen: "As a survivor of trauma, I spent most of my life trying to live, yet inside, I did not want to be seen. This only had me living in the shadows of what my heart desired. When I got older, I began to experience social anxiety. The more I hid from the pain, the more paralyzing it became, causing depression. I had to step away to understand what was causing these emotions in my life. I began to fearlessly seek my peace by writing my story and thoughts to help release the hurt from my past."

*Tell me more about your community works and books.

Eileen: "Today, with the help of nonprofit organizations, Milwaukee Public Schools, and other community partners, I am using my books to help people uncover the pain that tries to keep them from living a mentally healthy life. My published books, Caught in My Thoughts, Fearlessly Finding My Peace, and Thoughts Unspoken, along with workbooks are helping participants of book club discuss complex topics. These activities help the participants connect with their feelings and emotions. The purpose is to help them build self-esteem, engage in conversations about trauma, address depression, develop coping skills, and build healthy relationships. Participants also discover how to become emotionally healthier by becoming aware of their emotions and unmasking their thoughts."

*Why is mental health an important issue today?

Eileen: "It is very important to understand mental health because it can affect how you feel, think, and act."

*Any message for the youths/teens in the community?

Eileen: "I would like young people to know they do not have to face mental health alone. My mission is to provide a safe place for participants to be understood, have their voices heard, and discover a path to hope and healing."



Calling 911 from a Cell Phone vs. a Land-line

Elm Grove Emergency Services Recommendations

When you call 911 from your cell phone, the call is sent to a centralized dispatch center in either Waukesha County or Milwaukee County, depending on what cell tower picks up your call. Before the call taker can transfer your call, they need to determine your location for transfer to the proper dispatch center.

In most cases, the county dispatcher will not be familiar with landmarks and business locations by name, and they will need an exact address before they can transfer the call to our Elm Grove Dispatch Center.

We strongly suggest that you program our direct emergency line, 262-786-4141, into your cell phone to avoid delays in service for emergencies happening in Elm Grove.

Our dispatchers have intimate knowledge of our geography and are capable of discerning your location quickly, with limited information. When it is your emergency, you will want to be speaking to the person who is talking directly to the responding fire, ambulance, or police unit that is coming to your aid.

There are no changes to your current land-line 911 service.
All land-line 911 calls continue to be answered
by Elm Grove dispatch personnel.

Green is Good!

Bright Lights Spell Trouble for Birds Heading NorthBy the Elm Grove Green Team

Did you know up to 80% of migrating birds travel at night? Flying conditions are better when winds are calmer, and darkness provides cover from predators. Night flying is not without risk though: Bright outdoor lighting and especially upward-directed lighting can disorient migrating birds, leading to often fatal collisions with homes and buildings.

We're at the peak of spring migration (April 15-May 15), and Elm Grove is a critical rest stop on the flight path. During this 4-week period, you can save birds and save energy by turning off unnecessary lights!

What to do?

- Turn off exterior decorative lighting
- Turn off lobby and atrium lighting
- Turn off interior lights especially upper stories

When to do it?

- Between midnight and dawn
- Spring: from March 15 to May 31
- Fall: from August 15 to October 31

Take these steps to participate in Elm Grove's "Lights Out" initiative, a voluntary program that encourages residents to turn off non-essential outdoor lighting during the peak spring and fall migration periods.
