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# Village Update

The wonderful fall weather helped make the Elm Grove Foundation's Oktoberfest in the Village Park a huge success and the start of fall sports easier on spectators. It has also been a busy time for Village Board work.

Stantec Engineering has begun their preparing conceptual designs and surveying for the daylighting of Underwood Creek between Watertown Plank Road and Wall Street. Preliminary creek channel location and designs will be prepared for review and comment by residents and business owners with a goal of selecting a preferred option in early 2018. A project intern will be on board soon to help with communication and outreach activities. Grant funds are covering the costs of engineering and the Village has begun the effort to obtain grant funds for the construction work.

Hollyhock Lane residents have submitted a petition to the Village seeking the design and construction of a pathway along Hollyhock between North Avenue and Tonawanda School. Construction of the requested pathway would connect the north part of the Village to the Village Park and Village Center and provide safer pedestrian and bike travel. The citizen petition was submitted to the Village Board

on October 23 and will be first considered by the Public Safety Committee.




#### **Editor's Note**

Elm Grove resident Paul Lammers, who started the online petition and presented the proposal during the October 23 Board of Trustee's meeting explained: "This pathway would act as an extension of the current pathway which runs from Watertown Plank Road to Tonawanda Elementary School.

This project would allow citizens on the northern side of Elm Grove Village safe pedestrian access to Tonawanda School, Elm Grove Park, and the Village district. This project would also connect the southern end of Elm Grove Village to the northern end via pathway, allowing safe pedestrian access throughout the entire village...

There has been demonstrated support of this project by the citizens of Elm Grove. The petition... has gathered over 60 signatures as of 10-24-17... Many comments (included on the petition) reference the safety of their children, and how conditions are currently unsafe to walk along Hollyhock to Tonawanda School."

The Public Works and Utilities Committee received a report at their October 9 meeting regarding the status of the proposed Wisconsin Avenue extension project. Ayres Engineering is evaluating compliance of proposed plans with federal highway regulations and identifying possible state highway funding opportunities and schedules. When more information about intersection and road design and possible funding is available additional public meeting will be held.

The Village Recreation Committee concluded their analysis of water supply options for the proposed new pool Splash Pad area. The Committee recommended that a recirculating water supply system be installed. The Splash Pad will replace the Kids Pool which has been closed for two seasons due to a major piping failure. Splash pads are safer, cleaner and more popular than the old pool options. The next challenge for the community and the Village Board is how to pay for the new facilities and how soon it can be completed. Total project construction costs will likely approach \$450,000. significant investment like this through our hear from residents.

5-year capital planning process and perhaps some short term borrowing along with community donations. Many residents have expressed an interest in seeing the Splash Pad completed sooner since the Village Park currently has no facilities for small children to enjoy water play on warm days. The Village Board will discuss financing and timing at the November 27 meeting and you are encouraged to attend and express your opinions.

While it is important the Splash Pad plans move ahead to provide the needed recreational opportunity the Village Board has also decided to begin an analysis of options to replace the swimming pool and pool buildings. Our pool is more than 50 years old and while it is well maintained it will eventually need major investment. The Board believes it is prudent to identify issues and options for constructing and financing a new pool complex before major problems occur.

The Elm Grove Woman's Club "Christmas in the Grove" and the Business Association will be hosting the annual "Holiday Open House" celebrations on November 10 and 11 with merchants offering special sales and children's activities.

The Public Safety Committee will be considering revisions to the Village Wildlife Management Plan at the November 9 meeting. The new plan is expected to detail options to better control turkeys, deer and goose populations along with coyote management.



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## Past Times: I REMEMBER...

#### When "Shop Local" Was the Only Option

With the annual Christmas shopping season about to get underway once again, many locally-owned, family-run businesses are urging their friends and neighbors to "shop local". That phrase has become a yearly plea to support local shops and stores as the most important two months of the calendar year for merchants commence. It is the hope of local proprietors that shoppers will remember that money spent in their establishments tends to stay in the community. Each year a number of small businesses in every city and town unite their efforts to send out the Holiday request to "shop local".

Sixty years ago in Elm Grove and the surrounding communities of Wauwatosa and Brookfield there wasn't much choice in the matter. Mayfair Mall was not built until 1959 and Brookfield Square would not open its doors to the public until the fall of 1967. The vast array of strip malls and big box stores that now line Blue Mound Road and Capitol Drive were not even imagined. Even Ruby Isle in Brookfield would not open until 1963. Shoppers compiling their Christmas lists for 1957 were instead contemplating visits to a number of small shops and stores to find gifts for their children, relatives and friends.

The downtown village area of Elm Grove boasted one of the best menswear shops in the suburbs: Silverstone's, located in the Park & Shop. Not far away were the Colony Shop on North Avenue at 89<sup>th</sup> Street in Wauwatosa, Sullivan's Menswear on Grand Avenue in Waukesha, Dan's Tog Shop in Menomonee Falls and Tom's Tog Shop in Butler. All promised personal service, on-site tailoring and respected brand names, with Silverstone's advertisements that year hawking "a comprehensive collection of finest imported and domestic furnishings and accessories".

Fashion-conscious female shoppers could find apparel for themselves at Ann Irwin sportswear in the Bliffert building at 1105 Elm Grove Street. The emphasis here was on "quality casuals for suburban living", with seasonal advertising spotlighting "authentic ski and curling wear and woolen imports". The Grand in Wauwatosa offered an alternative, but many suburban wives and mothers of the 1950s, themselves recent transplants from the cities, made the drive to Milwaukee to shop at Chapman's, Gimbel's, Smartwear and Lou Fritzel, all located downtown on or near Wisconsin Avenue.

what was then an open, rural highway attracted customers from throughout the western suburbs. The additional refinements and accouterments for the modern home could be found in the village at Elm Interiors, 13280 Watertown Plan Road, which advertised extensive stock of "wallpaper, shades, draperies and match-stick bamboo", the latter of which was perfect for the recreation room or den "Tiki" style of the late 1950s and early 1960s, best exemplified in retrospect by theme restaurants the like of Giles' Leilani on Blue Mound Road and the Polynesian Village (Boulder Junction nowadays) on Burleigh Road in Brookfield.

Christmas shopping focused, of course, on toys for the children in the family, and some of the best of the era could be bought at Hettiger's Hobby Shop in the Park & Shop, operated by Elm Grove resident Elden Hettiger and his wife. A pioneer tenant of the Park & Shop when it first opened in 1955, the store was a destination for Elmbrook youngsters and their doting parents. Games, puzzles, athletic equipment, dolls, models and collectibles made it an after-school stop for kids from Leland and St. Mary's elementary schools. On Blue Mound Road, Drews Variety Store in the Autumn Grove shopping center had on hand a variety of children's gifts, toys and games, and its advertisements in 1957 touted its membership in the "Toy Guidance Council", a group that promoted sales of wholesome and educational gifts for kids. For good measure, the Elm Grove Pharmacy also stocked a section of toys and games which grew somewhat larger each Christmas season, and the A & P grocery store (now Sendik's) also featured an isle of children's toys.

the Avalon Hotel, both in downtown Waukesha. A festive meal at a fine restaurant or supper club was a 1950s tradition for many suburban families.

It is with a degree of melancholy that I offer the list of establishments recalled in this article. I do indeed remember them all, some of them quite fondly. The fact that they are now long gone is a reminder of how quickly time passes. Some of the businesses noted here, such as Elm Interiors, Ann Irwin, Biwer's and Elm Grove Shoes, Aliota's and the Halfway House managed to make it all the way into the 1980s and Dan's Tog Shop in Menomonee Falls was still serving its customers in the 2000s. I bought many of my favorite suits and

sport coats from **Bob Baer**, the friendly proprietor, and often had thought about the fact that the store had also served my father in the 1950s.

There is no reason, however, not to urge 2017 readers of the Elm Grove News-Independent to continue to "shop local". There are a variety of locally-owned and family-run businesses in Elm Grove and in our neighboring communities ready and willing to serve customers during this Holiday season. Good service and good quality merchandise can still be found just around the corner and down the street.

The largest selection of shoes for both adults and kids in Waukesha County, meanwhile, was to be had at Biwer's Shoe Store in downtown Waukesha, which boasted in their ads of "famous name" brands, including Florsheim, Westport. Naturalizer and, for the youngsters, Buster Brown and Jumping Jacks.

Furnishings for the home could be found at Bluemound Furniture just west of Elm Grove on Blue Mound Road at 159<sup>th</sup> Street. Catering to those seeking contemporary furniture and décor for their new spacious suburban ranch and

Even area restauranteurs got into the Holiday spirit, offering two-for-one drink specials for beleaguered shoppers and, perhaps most useful of all, dining certificates for that person on the list who was simply impossible to shop for. 

#### What is an Arbitration Agreement in a Nursing Home Admissions Agreement and Should You Sign It?

As noted in the first column of this series, nursing home residents are frequently asked to sign arbitration agreements when they are admitted to a nursing home. The arbitration agreement is a contract between the resident and the nursing home to resolve any dispute outside of the court system.

The nursing home will say arbitration is a cheaper and more efficient way to resolve a dispute. Is this true?

#### What is the cost of a lawsuit versus arbitration?

Filing and pursuing a lawsuit is expensive. At the outset, the person filing the lawsuit has to pay a filing fee to the court. The fee varies from county to county, but is generally around \$300 in Wisconsin. Other costs include process servers' fees, experts' fees (for reports and testimony), deposition fees, and copying costs for information that is required to be exchanged between parties.

Arbitration does not require any filing fee. However, the parties to the arbitration generally share in the cost of paying the arbitrators. The arbitrators serve as both judge and jury. (Parties to a lawsuit do not bear any cost in paying the judge. Jury fees, for a jury of 12, are \$72 in Wisconsin.) Arbitrators are generally attorneys who are paid hourly at their billable rate, which generally ranges between \$250-400 per hour. If one arbitrator spends 50 hours

working on a case, and bills \$300 per hour, her fee will be \$15,000. If there is a panel of three arbitrators, versus a single arbitrator (which is most common) and each arbitrator spends 50 hours, while billing \$300 per hour, each party to the arbitration will pay \$22,500 in arbitrators' fees alone.

#### What is the timeline of a lawsuit versus arbitration?

Both lawsuits and arbitrations take several months, and often years, between the time they are first initiated and the time final resolution is reached. However, because arbitrations provide for very limited appeal options, there is far less likelihood the arbitration process will extend beyond the final arbitration hearing. That said, it is important to note that arbitrations are overwhelmingly resolved in favor of the company that drafted the arbitration agreement, that is the nursing home. Thus, the limitation on appeals may not be in the best interest of the nursing home resident.

The next column will discuss what arbitration agreements mean and how they affect you if you have a dispute with the nursing home.
