

Elm Grove Veteran Takes 'Honor Flight' to Washington D.C.

Elm Grove resident **Bob Fischer** didn't really mind rising early on August 28 to take a free plane ride to the east coast. For this 87-year-old Korean War Veteran, it was a special, once-in-a lifetime journey --- an Honor Flight --- heading first to Baltimore, Maryland, then on to Washington D.C. Two planes, each with 100 passengers (50 veterans and their companions/guides) made the trip.

"My guide **Brian Bieganski** picked me up at 5 a.m. in Elm Grove to go to the airport. Brian lives in South Milwaukee and works as a Fireman / EMT in Madison. He paid \$500 to go along. He's a super guy!" Fischer said. Bob and his wife, **Mary Weller,** got acquainted with Brian and his wife, **Justine,** during a breakfast in the Village the week before the trip.

While on the plane, each veteran was given a bag filled with greeting cards and letters. Bob said he received "131 greeting cards from people at his condo, Kiwanis members, even some grade school and high school students from Albuquerque, New Mexico."

Washington D. C. highlights included: Respectfully viewing the Wall with its 58,280 names, representing American killed during the war in Vietnam; watching the changing of the guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier; visiting the Airforce



Memorial and the Iwo Jima Flag Raising statue, and, on a lighter note, enjoying complimentary dessert from an ice cream truck

It had been a long and eventful day and even after the planes and their most Honorable passengers returned to Milwaukee at 11:30 p.m., one more thing happened. Friends and family members, including his wife **Mary Weller**, gathered en masse to welcome all of the Veterans home. "Seeing Mary (and the others) there almost brought a tear to my eye," Fischer said. "I'd recommend it to anybody to take that trip. I'm so glad I did it."

Bob Fischer served in the U.S. Navy from January 31, 1955 through January 1959. His home port was Pearl Harbor.

Bringing Lake Michigan Water to Village is Beneficial to Residents, Businesses

We believe it is essential for Elm Grove residents to understand the value of obtaining a reliable municipal water source from a Firefighter's perspective.

For the most part, the buildings along Watertown Plank Rd (WPR) are pretty old and are predominantly wood in construction. Virtually none of these buildings have a sprinkler system to provide protection in the event of a fire. If a fire started in any of these buildings, the fire would quickly spread within the building and become a significant fire. When you add that many of the buildings are built relatively close to each other, you have a situation where a fire in one building can spread to a neighboring building.

The Elm Grove Fire Dept. will arrive at a fire with our two tankers and over 8,000 gallons of water, which is sufficient to handle many of our needs. But because Elm Grove does not have a municipal water system, many structure fires require the setup of a temporary water supply. It is a timely process that involves calling in additional water tankers from New Berlin, Tess Corners, Menomonee Falls, and possibly further out. Water tankers from neighboring communities need time to arrive and then set up a shuttle system. The tankers must make frequent trips to fill up their tank at a high-volume hydrant and then deliver it to the fire, dumping the water into temporary holding tanks to be used by our fire engines. The tankers repeat this process until the fire is extinguished. A fire in the

business district can grow to a large fire that will rapidly consume the available water.

If there were high-volume fire-hydrants in the business district along WPR, the resources needed to set up the tanker shuttle are no longer required. Once a fire engine connects to a nearby fire hydrant, the firefighters can direct their energy to fight the fire, saving valuable time in the process. Resulting in better-protected property and possibly saving lives.

There are community wells with fire hydrants in some of Elm Grove's neighborhoods. These fire hydrants typically cannot supply enough volume of water required to fight a fire. City water from Wauwatosa or Brookfield provides the volume of water needed to fight larger fires. A few years ago, there was a house fire on Fairhaven, just three homes north of WPR. The West Allis FD laid over 1000 feet of large diameter hose from the hydrant on 124th and WPR to get the volume of water to fight the fire. A time-consuming and labor-intensive process. The connection would have been quickly accomplished if Elm Grove had high-volume city water fire hydrants on WPR.

There are additional advantages to having fire hydrants on WPR.

- Reduction of fire insurance for the buildings near a fire hydrant
- The property value of the businesses near a hydrant will increase

- Availability of water to put sprinkler systems in commercial buildings
- The homes and neighborhoods near the water main may connect

If residents connect to municipal water, the benefits include:

- Possible reduced cost of fire insurance
- Elimination of the need for expensive water treatments
 Power entropy will not interrupt fresh
- Power outages will not interrupt fresh running water
- Elimination of the red stain in sinks, toilets, baths & showers

We support the current proposal to contract with Wauwatosa to bring Lake Michigan water down Watertown Plank Rd. The existence of high-volume fire hydrants will dramatically enhance Elm Grove Fire Department's ability to protect the business district and its immediate surrounding area. Additionally, the longer-term viability of the business district is improved, and by extension, the Village as a whole will benefit.

<u>Village Update</u>

Two new members of the Village Planning Commission were recently unanimously approved by the Village Board. Natalie Schneider, a civil and environmental engineer who works at the City of Brookfield and Sarah Winia-Smith, a research scientist at the Medical College bring the Commission back to full strength.

The Administrative and Personnel Committee recently directed Village staff to prepare a report outlining options for attracting new emergency medical staff for the Village EMS service. Elm Grove, like every other community in the state is facing difficulty hiring new staff to maintain services and replace existing members who retire or take positions elsewhere. The Committee also approved creating sleeping accommodations in the fire department to allow EMS staff who live outside of the immediate area to have a rest space. The shortage of help for our EMS and fire service is not a new problem. We have been spoiled by the excellent service provided by highly skilled and dedicated resident volunteers for a long time. Emergency Medical Technicians and Paramedics are required to be licensed and the required training takes hundreds of hours. The City of Brookfield recently accepted a federal grant to hire additional staff for their fire department to help with growing ambulance calls.

I, like many other residents, have enjoyed watching the pair of **Sandhill Cranes** who have taken up residence in the Village Park for most of the summer. Village staff have named the pair "**Mort and Sheila**"

and have many stories of the birds peering in the windows of Village Hall. In is very evident that these two birds have become very acclimated to people, dogs and cars and show no fear. Wild cranes normally migrate south for the winter, and I am hoping Mort and Sheila remember to leave before winter hits.

For most homeowners Fall means it is time to clean the yard in preparation for winter. Raking leaves, cutting back flowers and bushes and picking up sticks to make a tidy yard are part of many homeowners' routines. I want to encourage all to consider the Xerces Society phrase that "Leaves Are Not Litter," One of the most important things we can do to support butterflies and other invertebrates is to provide them with the winter cover needed to survive. Leaving the leaves doesn't mean you should leave them on your lawn. but you can rake some over garden beds, under trees or around wood piles. Most insects that work as pollinators in your yard stay in your yard over the winter if you help them survive. For those of you who like birds but aren't as fond of bugs it is important to remember that all songbirds feed their young invertebrates. Newborn songbirds don't eat seeds, they eat bugs. But, speaking of seeds, if you leave the heads on some flowers, you can watch birds which don't migrate feeding on them all winter.

The Elm Grove Police and Fire Commission has selected Lieutenant Jason Kubiak to be our new Police Chief when existing Chief Jim Gage retires on January 6, 2022. Assistant

Chief Jason Hennen is also retiring on January 6th and Sergeant Ryan Unger has been appointed Assistant Chief. In addition, Sergeant Natalie Riley has been promoted to Lieutenant.

Oktoberfest was blessed with beautiful weather this year and enjoyed success in the new two-day format. Oktoberfest, sponsored by the Elm Grove Community Foundation expects to realize about \$32,000 in profit to use for future community projects.

The Elm Grove Business Association "Walk the Plank" October Halloween celebration attracted many families to learn about Elm Grove businesses and share in Halloween treats.

Engineering and planning is moving forward to relocating a small portion of the Underwood Creek stream bed and stabilizing the stream banks, near the pedestrian bridge over the pond in the northeast section of the park, west of Legion Drive. The current creek location is over and near the buried 42-inch sanitary sewer interceptor which carries wastewater from Brookfield and Elm Grove to the Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage District for processing. Water flows in the creek erode the soil covering the interceptor and threaten interceptor integrity.

Activities to kick off our holiday season. The Elm Grove Woman's Club hosts their annual two-day Arts and Craft Fair on November 12 and 13. The Business Association Holiday Festival, including horse drawn wagon rides will be held on November 13th. And over at the Elm Grove

A Waukesha Freeman article, dated February 6, 1919, noted, "Pvt. George Bresnan, who has been overseas for over a year, stopped at the Behling home, at Elm Grove, for a couple of days last week

en route to his home at Madison, Minn. While in the service he was wounded in the foot with a piece of shrapnel and was gassed. He was in a hospital in France for two months."

As chronicled in "Following The Trail" (c. 1998), a book of local history compiled by **Stephen K. Hauser** and **Jean Stackpole** and sponsored by the Elmbrook Historical Society, Belling served in the Great War (World War I) as a sergeant with Company K from Beaver Dam and was shipped to France with the U.S. Army Expeditionary Corps. Rasmussen was a corporal at the Army Training Center in Oshkosh and served stateside.

As the book notes: "The 1984 Memorial

Day parade in Elm Grove was the only one rained out in the history of the event. Still, Belling and Rasmussen were prepared to ride in the open-top car designated as the World War I vet's vehicle. It would be the last Memorial Day ceremony that both would participate in. Sgt. Belling and Cpl. Rasmussen were the last two World War I veterans active in Post #449. Belling, of New Berlin, died in December of 1986 at 92. Rasmussen, of Elm Grove, died in April of 1987 at 89."



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

Village Shares Composting Resources

(ELM GROVE) Did you know that more than half of all municipal waste is compostable? That includes 21% food scraps, 15% paper, 8% yard trimmings and 8% wood waste.

If the thought of composting has seemed overwhelming, the Elm Grove Beautification Committee has pulled together several helpful resources that just might make it easy for you to get started.

Start by learning. Attend the free Beautification Committee Winter Lecture Series at 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, November 16, in the Village Hall O'Neill Room, where Ryan Laswell from Nourish Farms in Sheboygan will expand your knowledge base and answer your questions. You can learn about how valuable compost is for plants and soil health. Not only does it help retain moisture, suppress plant diseases and reduce the need for fertilizers, but it also encourages the production of beneficial bacteria and fungi that help create humus. Registration is not required, and refreshments will be served.

You also can take advantage of multiple options available within the village to help divert compostable material from the landfill. If you want to compost at home with a bit of help, you can sign up for one of the two services available in our area: Waste Not LLC or Compost Crusaders. Both provide weekly pick-ups at home. Waste Not provides a 5-gallon bucket and picks up most kitchen waste while providing finished compost each season. Compost Crusaders has subscriptions for 32- or 64-gallon containers, which will accept all compostable items, indoor and yard.

If you are interested in more hands-on learning, the Beautification Committee has constructed a three-bin system at the Elm Grove Recycle Center. The Committee is planning informational sessions on composting this fall while providing educational materials to anyone interested. 
Elmbrook Rotary Club Awards Grant to Engineers Without Borders

Elmbrook Rotary Club (ERC) began a partnership to support the Marquette University Engineers Without Borders (EWB) Student Chapter in 2017. The club's goal was to establish an on-going relationship, leverage future support from other local Rotary Clubs, and also compliment the on-going ERC projects with Common Hope in Guatemala.

Recently, Elmbrook Rotary awarded a \$5,000 grant to the Marquette University chapter. The current project being designed by the Marquette students is to provide clean water for El Tesoro, Guatemala. This is a community of about 324 people located one hour north of the municipality of San Martin Jilotepeque, department of Chimaltenango, Guatemala. Since the 1990s, they have implemented different methods to capture fresh water. Each one has been problematic. Water arriving to their households is often contaminated, leading to health problems.

These people live in extreme poverty, and purchasing clean drinking water is very costly. The community requested help to collect water from the sources, construct a conveyance, distribution, and storage system, and connect to the homes' tap stands. The source of the water is a spring about 4 km from the system. Approximately 115 families will receive a tap stand to serve



the entire community of over 324 people.

The grant funds from ERC will be used to purchase materials for the project. Because of COVID-19, the Marquette team responsible for building the system was unable to travel there. EWB Guatemala provided a local volunteer engineer and organized local resident volunteers to construct the project and collaborate with the team leads in Milwaukee. The teams meet virtually to discuss the project's progression on a regular basis. Implementation of the water project is scheduled for August 2022.

Both ERC and the Marquette EWB chapter continue to collaborate on projects to benefit communities who need to better their living situations but do not have the resources to accomplish this goal. Elm Grove Junior Guild Drives Support Jack's Toy **Shop and Beat Childhood Cancer** By Sarah Wynia-Smith

The Elm Grove Junior Guild officially kicked off the 2021-2022 season of service with a set of twin drives to support both G9/Beat Childhood Cancer and Jack's Toy Shop. September was Childhood Cancer Awareness Month and both of these organizations are dedicated to supporting and raising awareness for children struggling with a cancer diagnosis.

G9/Beat Childhood Cancer is the outgrowth of multiple family foundations merging with the common goal to fund research and clinical trials treating childhood cancers. Despite cancer being the top cause of death in children, research into treatments remains woefully underfunded. The sledgehammer style "kill anything that grows" approach of traditional chemotherapy and radiation are often devastating and create new complications that can persist even when cancer is in remission. In 2005, a local four-year-old boy named Jack **Bartosz** was diagnosed with neuroblastoma. In 2007, Jack's neuroblastoma relapsed; his physicians were in the middle of researching a more tailored treatment. The Bartosz family saw a critical fundraising need, creating the I Back Jack Foundation. The first goal was a million dollars. Meeting that goal, the Bartosz family continued their fundraising with the foundation; the new treatment is now used worldwide.

The I Back Jack Foundation gifted Children's Hospital of Wisconsin to start Jack's Toy Shop. It is a free toy shop housed within the MACC Fund Center Clinic for Cancer and Blood Disorders at Children's Hospital of Wisconsin. Jack sadly passed away in 2012, but his legacy and playful spirit live on in Jack's Toy Shop. Children of all ages receiving treatment can choose toys. In September, Elm Grove Junior Guild members purchased and donated 81 toys. These included LEGO sets, UNO card games, play doctor bags, pop-its, playdough, and other activity sets. Jill Fahner, a Child Life Specialist at Children's Wisconsin says "While in clinic, children often need to have a variety of procedures done, and we want to make sure that they are able to pick out a little something special when they leave. All the toys in

the 'shop' are received through generous donations in the community."

The legacy of Jack does not stop there; Jack's surviving twin sister Annie came up with a new name for the I Back Jack Foundation: Gold in September, also known as G9. Over the years G9 has raised millions on its own, but in 2020 merged with other family foundations to become a part of Beat Childhood Cancer. This consortium has amazingly funded clinical trials for childhood cancer research at 60 hospitals across the USA. Jack's mom Sarah notes 'We always need help and involvement! The truth is that we need people to help us raise awareness of Gold and the need for support of childhood cancer. Kids deserve less toxic treatments and that is what Beat Childhood Cancer is doing by making trials available, even here in WI."

Seeing the need for involvement, the Elm Grove Junior Guild community service co-chairs Chris Schulta and Jamie Niederbaumer set up a Penny War to take place at the Junior Guild's September membership kickoff event. Each of the 11 subcommittees within the group decorated containers and members were instructed to bring their loose change to add to their favorite containers. This one-night fundraiser yielded over \$400 to give to Beat Childhood Cancer.



What Documents Will Your Family Need?

After you pass away, your surviving family members will need to gather many of your personal and financial records in order to settle your affairs. Keeping these documents organized and accessible is important for both you and your loved ones. Your filing system doesn't need to be elaborate, just organized. Your family will need the following documents when the time comes:

- List of Funeral Instructions and prepaid funeral contracts
- Last Will and Testament
- Revocable/Living Trust agreements
- Prenuptial/postnuptial agreements
 VA File Number, Military discharge papers
- Birth certificate and Death Certificate
- Marriage license or Divorce Decree
- Medicare Card/Health Insurance Card
- Bank statements, checkbooks, check registers, certificates of deposits
- Safe deposit rental agreement and keys

- Deeds, mortgages, leases, homeowner's insurance information
- Stock and bond certificates and account statement
- Pension, IRA, retirement statements/ current employee benefit information
- Life insurance policies or statements
- Last several years' income tax returns
- Documentation regarding any debts, such as auto loans or credit cards

It is not necessary to give copies of these documents to anyone during your lifetime, but they should be easily accessible in the event of your death. The information should also be kept reasonably current.

Lastly, if you maintain important information on your computer, or have social media accounts, leave instructions regarding username and password information. Not having this information can cost both time and money. Maintaining organized personal and financial records is one of the best gifts you can give your family.

Numerous other studies and review such as traffic, public safety, infrastructure etc. also take place as a project is more fully defined. The original concept included 3 apartment buildings, side by side townhouses along Red Barn Land and a Senior housing facility west of Green Meadow near the railroad tracks. The first step in the Village consideration process took place after the developer submitted a request for the Village Plan Commission to hold a "Conceptual Review. "The purpose of a conceptual review is to provide a highlevel presentation to allow the Planning Commission to give an opinion on whether the project is likely to meet requirements and concerns before either the Village or the developer incur the high costs necessary to move a project application forward.

The proposed development requires the acquisition of a municipal supply of water from Lake Michigan to be successful. The extension of clean Lake Michigan water has been the wish of many Elm Grove residents and businesses for decades. The initial extension provided by this redevelopment could serve as the backbone to provision of water downtown and into the neighborhoods.

Since the summer of 2020, public meetings discussing various aspects of the proposed redevelopment have been conducted to consider several issues:

- Village Board: issues of process, finances, public involvement
- Public Works and Utilities Committee: streets, sewer, water, stormwater
- Police, Fire and EMS departments: evaluation of impacts expected from the proposed development
- Village consultant to analyze possible vehicular traffic impacts
- Analysis of possible impacts on public school system
- Planning Commission: eighteen different criteria considered to evaluate compliance with rules of "Planned • Development Overlay District" review
- The Village hired Ehlers and Associates to serve as financial consultant to evaluate risk and benefits of the project
- During the evolving process the Mandel development team held neighborhood meeting and small group meeting and Village Board members met with various Village groups to discuss and encourage input.
- During the many months of review since the Conceptual presentation numerous changes have incorporated into the proposed redevelopment.
- The side-by-side townhouses on Red Barn have been eliminated
- The Senior housing has been eliminated
- Single Family housing has replaced the Senior housing and the side-by-side townhouses
- The total number of proposed housing

units has dropped from 400 to 256

- The density of units per acre has dropped from 15.6 units / acre to 10.1 / acre
- Significant building design, materials have been incorporated

Three different analyses of the possible traffic impact have been conducted and found negligible impact. I realize it seems a little hard to believe that traffic from 258 units wouldn't plug up Watertown Plank Road. First realize that whether a renter or a single-family homeowner virtually no leaves for work or returns at the same time as their neighbor. Plus, some likely tenants will be retired or working second or third shift and the medical complex. Think about it; when you leave your home to shop, go to work, or get the kids are all your neighbors lined up behind you at the first intersection? Of course not.


In the last three months the Village Manager, Finance Director, Attorney, and the Village President have participated in many hours of negotiation over a proposed development agreement. The Development is a contract which defines all the obligations and guarantees of the Developer and the Village. There have also been numerous meetings between the Village staff and the financial consultant to analyze the proposal finances and issues surrounding a possible Tax Incremental Finance (TIF) grant.

The TIF concept has been existence for decades in Wisconsin. The TIF process is an economic development tool used to help accomplish redevelopment of sites which have unique/expense issues. Essentially it is a process where a community borrows money to help pay for some aspects of a project and the NEW property taxes of the project are then used to pay back the loan. The value of the project is the asset backing the loan and the community loan payment has first call on project tax payments.

Negotiations with the City of Wauwatosa to supply **potable water services** to the site (and the rest of Elm Grove eventually) are nearing completion.

Now, we are nearing the end stage of the redevelopment proposal review. Once all parties agree on a final draft for the Development Agreement and the financial analysis is provided by Ehlers they will be distributed to Village Board and Committee members and be available to the public. A public hearing before the Village Board to hear public comments on the final proposal details will be held two weeks after a notice is issued.




