Village Update



Katherine Gehl began work recently as Assistant Village Manager and Zoning and Planning Administrator. Katherine came to Elm Grove from a position with the Village of Richfield. Katherine has an undergraduate degree from the University of Minnesota and a Master's degree in Public Administration from Northern Illinois. An Oak Creek native, she also previously worked at the City of Gurnee, Illinois and the City of West Allis.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources has given final approval to the updated Village of Elm Grove Floodplain Zoning ordinance. The updated ordinance meets state and federal floodplain management standards. The updated ordinance maintains eligibility for the National Flood Insurance Program.

The Elm Grove election ballot will contain a referendum question regarding the proposed rebuilding and paving of Gebhardt Road from Pilgrim Road to Highland Drive and installation of a new pathway. In April 2022, Elm Grove voters approved a referendum requiring a separate referendum for any public works project estimated to cost more than \$1 million to be subject to a separate referendum vote.

Village Manager David DeAngelis and Finance Director Monica Hughes submitted the proposed 2023 operating and capital budgets to the Finance Committee for consideration. Finance Committee will face a difficult task in shaping a budget proposal for Village Board approval. State mandated spending limits for 2023 limit the Village levy limit increase to \$53,861 which is 0.72%. The draft budget prepared by staff includes Fire and EMS services "paid on call" increase totaling \$221,500; health insurance premium increases are estimated to be about \$65,000; Village staff wage increases for 2023 are 2.5% or \$88,000; workers compensation and property insurance increases are \$14,500; Wisconsin Retirement System charges are increasing by \$26,000; Village gas and electric utilities and gasoline expenses are estimated to increase by \$21,500 and computer storage and software costs are increasing by \$35,000. All in all, the proposed budget indicated gap between



"state allowed levy increases" and budget projected increase is wide.

The proposed budget supports operations at the current level but does include additional funding for EMS and Fire pay. Elm Grove emergency services, both of which rely on volunteer members are facing difficulty maintaining service. Any resident interested in joining the fire or emergency medical services is encouraged to apply. The Village supports educational classes necessary to obtain certification.

The Elm Grove Police Department is in the process of selecting a "School Resource Officer (SRO)" to serve at Pilgrim Park Middle School beginning in 2023. The School District of Elmbrook requested the SRO and they will pay the cost of the officer. Both of the Elmbrook high schools have SRO officers provided by the City of Brookfield. The City will also be filling a new SRO at Wisconsin Hills Middle School in 2023.

The Elm Grove Business Association will again host a Holiday Open House on November 11th and 12th. Watch for further information about merchant offers, library program and Elm Grove Woman's Club holiday events. The horse drawn wagon rides, always a family favorite, will be back this year.





Our History:

Remembrances of Things Past



In 1946, an aging insulated shed sat behind the Clara Svehlek home at 940 Elm Grove Road in Elm Grove.

WHATZZIT?

a "where-was-it?". To answer the second question first, the location was 940 Elm Grove Road, behind the home of Mrs. Clara Svehlek. (Today's readers might better remember the address as that of Shirley Grade's Yarn House until its demise in 2011.) Mrs. Svehlek was employed as a housekeeper for the School Sisters of Notre Dame at their convent on Watertown Plank Road. Her grandson, the late Waukesha Circuit Court Judge Richard Congdon, remembered being in the home with her for a time in the 1950s.

But, what was this small boxlike structure covered in makeshift insulation which sat in her backyard? It was an icehouse. This was not an unusual sight in mid-twentieth century America, but not as common as it once would have been. Actually, icehouses had been utilized since ancient times by Greeks, Romans, Persians, and others. In America, icehouses date back to colonial times, and even George Washington built one to service his estate at Mount Vernon. When the new Liberty Bell Center was under construction in Philadelphia in 2000, contractors uncovered the remains of a colonial icehouse with a gravel floor drain near Market Street. It was on property once belonging to Robert Morris, a signer of the Declaration of Independence and the U.S. Constitution.

Ice would be cut from lakes, rivers, and streams in the winter and used to lengthen the useful life of meats and vegetables. Icehouses used rustic insulation materials Stephen K. Hauser is a retired college history such as straw, sawdust, and animal fur to

This month's Whatzzit? could also be keep the cut blocks of ice viable for as long as possible.

> Small iceboxes used for keeping food cold in homes were developed in the early nineteenth century, and by the 1890s numerous American homes boasted their own iceboxes. They were serviced by horse-drawn insulated ice delivery wagons. Columnist Callene Rapp noted in a story in Grit magazine in 2017 that 1,500 ice delivery wagons prowled the streets of New York City in 1900 making deliveries to homes and businesses.

> The icehouse behind Mrs. Svehlek's home was shared with the Schumacher Hardware and International Harvester dealership immediately to the south (now Woller-Anger & Company), accounting for its larger size. By the time photographer Robert T. McCoy took this picture in 1946, most homes had replaced iceboxes with modern refrigerators, yet a few holdouts remained. Viewers of classic television programs will recall that Ralph and Alice Kramden of "The Honeymooners" still owned an aging and problematic icebox.

> By the 1950s, Mrs. Svehlek's icehouse was no longer needed for the storage of blocks of ice. It was torn down and replaced with a garage/shed which stood until it and the home were demolished in 2013 to provide additional parking for the Chocolate Factory eatery next door.



Rotarians Volunteer with Habitat for Humanity By Jackson Bubolz

The Elmbrook Rotary Club (ERC) made a decision in 2021 to actively search out opportunities to perform more "hands on" service work. One partnership that really took off was with Milwaukee's Habitat for Humanity, creating opportunities for 4 build projects this year.

Habitat for Humanity aims to bring affordable homeownership to anyone who desires it. A way they do that in Milwaukee is by purchasing vacant lots to build on. They fundraise to acquire building materials and wages for their employees, and Habitat relies heavily on volunteer groups for labor. Some labor volunteers come from large corporations, and some comes from churches and service groups like the ERC.

On September 22, 2022, Rotarians Paul Sawicki, Jack Hill, Paul Langer, and Tom Curl worked with Habitat employees and "Habituals" (volunteer 3+ days a week) to frame the second story of a home on 5th St in Milwaukee. They hoisted walls from the ground to the second level, they tacked in walls, and prepared the home to be enclosed. The home they worked on could be ready for a family to take over the mortgage as soon as Spring.



Community Wildlife Habitat

The Beautification Committee along with the Birders of the Grove group is working hard to help make Elm Grove the FIRST community in the STATE of Wisconsin to achieve the National Wildlife Federation's (NWF) Community Habitat certification. This program has been in existence since 1997—yes, 25 years and no community in our state has yet accomplished certification. Why? Because it isn't a simple endeavor!

This achievement requires attaining the required number of points in 5 different categories: registration, education, administration, community outreach, and certified habitats. Based on population, we require 150 points in certified habitats which we achieve by certifying homes, common areas, churches, and schools. Getting certified requires each space to assure it has what is needed to support birds, amphibians, and pollinators—food, water, cover, a place to raise young, and adherence to sustainability practices. So far, our community is 13.3% of the way to achieving certification.

And yet, the process is simple. Just log onto the NWF website at www.nwf.org/certify and follow the steps. Registering your yard does require a one-time tax-deductible application fee of \$20 which helps support NWF programs.


Hats Project Benefits People Who are Homeless

What Documents Will Your Family Need?

After you pass away, your surviving family members will need to gather many of your personal and financial records in order to settle your affairs. Keeping these documents organized and accessible is important for both you and your loved ones. Your filing system doesn't need to be elaborate, just organized. Your family will need the following documents when the time comes:

- · List of Funeral Instructions and prepaid funeral contracts
- · Last Will and Testament
- Revocable/Living Trust agreements
- Prenuptial/postnuptial agreements
- VA File Number, Military discharge
- Birth certificate and Death CertificatE
- Marriage license or Divorce Decree
- Medicare Card/Health Insurance Card
- · Bank statements, checkbooks, check registers, certificates of deposits
- · Safe deposit rental agreement and keys
- Deeds, mortgages, leases, homeowner's insurance information

- Stock and bond certificates and account statement
- Pension, IRA, retirement statements/ current employee benefit information
- Life insurance policies or statements
- Last several years' income tax returns
- Documentation regarding any debts, such as auto loans or credit cards

It is not necessary to give copies of these documents to anyone during your lifetime, but they should be easily accessible in the event of your death. The information should also be kept reasonably current.

Lastly, if you maintain important information on your computer, or have social media accounts, leave instructions regarding username and password information. Not having this information can cost both time and money. Maintaining organized personal and financial records is one of the best gifts you can give your family.

Gebhardt Road Reconstruction Referendum **Supports Critical Infrastructure**

Elm Grove voters will be asked in a referendum question on the Tuesday November 8 ballot to decide whether the Village should rebuild Gebhardt Road and install a pedestrian pathway between Highland and Pilgrim. I recommend that residents vote YES to support the renewal of this core infrastructure in our Village and allow the Village to achieve the most competitive pricing possible.

The reconstruction of Gebhardt Road is necessary because its condition has deteriorated substantially and is crumbling at its edges, which is unacceptable for a key arterial road in our Village. Roads in the Village are assessed biannually and Gebhardt is in dire need of replacement. The road will be rebuilt with the current base removed and shaped and the culverts replaced so it will last for the next 50 years. A badly needed pedestrian pathway will be installed along the southern edge of Gebhardt to improve safe walking conditions, an important enhancement since we have a growing number of families with young children in the Village. This will also provide easier and safer access to Pilgrim Park Middle School. Highland Road will also be shaved down one foot to meet the minimum State standards for sightlines for drivers turning from Gebhardt and Hillside onto Highland Drive. Village engineers evaluated whether to relocate the

intersection of Gebhardt and Highland but ultimately deemed it an unnecessary expense.

The estimated total project cost is \$1.7 million (including a 20% cost contingency), an amount that requires approval by the voters per the public works referendum approved by voters earlier this year. The Village intends to fund this project including \$550k from the 2023 tax levy, \$220k from the capital budget (funds set aside for this project over the past 5 years), and either a grant from the state of Wisconsin or public bond. The Village has applied for grant that would provide 80% of the cost with the decision due from the State of Wisconsin later this fall, which would substantially reduce the net cost to Village taxpayers.

My recommendation is that Village residents vote YES on Tuesday, November 8, because: Gebhardt Road is part of the Village's critical infrastructure; its reconstruction will benefit residents for many decades.

The proposed funding provides the most fiscally responsible approach, combining the Village's prudent long-term conservative approach to budgeting with an opportunity to access federal infrastructure funds to cover a majority of the cost.


Vote YES on Gebhardt Reconstruction Referendum

Vote YES for safety November 8th.

How to Spot and Eliminate Buckthorn

Take a drive anywhere through the state or throughout Elm Grove in late fall, and buckthorn will be easy to spot. That's because buckthorn is one of the last plants to shed its leaves for the winter. Some people think buckthorn provides a nice privacy hedge, but it is a very invasive shrub, and late fall is a great time for getting rid of it.

Buckthorn is very fast-growing woody vegetation and can spread quickly from yard to yard. It is quite prolific tolerating both full sun and deep shade. As it matures, it shades out other native plants, wildlife habitat and food sources.

Fall is a good time to get at the buckthorn. As noted, it's easily spotted, and because most of the native plants have gone dormant, the risk of them being damaged by control efforts is lower. It is best to eliminate this woody weed by pulling the plant root and all out of the ground, and if larger than 3 feet tall, cutting at the base and treating with a herbicide, since this very tough and resilient weed will grow back if not treated. In fact, 2-inch weeds can grow into a buckthorn tree in just a few years.

Following up is the key to controlling buckthorn. It's easier to remove new growth than established growth. Learning to recognize buckthorn seedlings and small buckthorn trees is key to keeping growth of this species under control. A program of repeated surveillance of your landscaping will give you the best bang for your buck(thorn).

Key facts about Common Buckthorn (Rhamnus cathartica)

- Common buckthorn has a broad environmental tolerance. It leafs out very early and retains its leaves late into the growing season, giving them a longer growing season than native plants.
- The branches of mature common buckthorn will have a small thorn at the tip of the twig.
- The fruits are eagerly eaten by birds, and the seeds are thereby spread widely. When the trees reach maturity, they produce abundant fruit and within a few years there are commonly thousands of seedlings around the base of each mature tree. A cut stump will sprout vigorously.
- Buckthorn berries have a laxative effect (hence the species name cathartic), robbing birds of nutrition and ensuring the seeds are spread quickly across the landscape.
- Allelopathic; produces chemical compounds that inhibit the growth of other vegetation.
