




Sustainable Acts of Thanks: 4 Simple Ways to Give Back By The Elm Grove Green Team

Village Update

Sitting here writing this update at the end of October, we can feel the fall weather beginning to take hold. Cooler morning temperatures and the leaves finally showing



the beautiful fall colors are upon us.

With the falling leaves, let's use extra care making quick stops while driving or riding our bikes to avoid sliding through intersections or falling. As the daylight hours diminish, let's fully enjoy the outdoors in November and I hope to see you in the Village Park or walking throughout our community.

Pathway Update

Great progress was made in October building out our pathways throughout the Village. Work recommenced after a lengthy battle with the railroad getting permits to complete the Highland pathway. Additionally, work on Gremoor and Juneau has moved forward significantly. The storm water upgrades along Juneau were impressive and work on the pathway paving will be completed in early November. Many thanks to our design firm **KL Engineering**, led by **Travis Brush**, and our construction contractor **Buteyn-Petersen** for a job well

Planning is underway to design the pathway from Gebhardt Road to Watertown Plank Road along the west side of Highland. We expect to let a request for proposals (RFP) related to pedestrian pathway construction work to be completed in 2026. The Board has elected to combine two phases of this project to realize cost savings of least \$40,000 on engineering alone.

Daylighting / Public Works Committee

As reported previously, the railroad has filed a complaint against the Village challenging the purchase of the 2.3 acres of abandoned land needed for this project. A ruling from the court is expected in mid – November. The Board has worked closely with outside council throughout this process and have offered solutions for all objections raised by the railroad, except for one. That objection is over price, which the railroad is seeking 3 times the appraised value for the parcel. We will keep you posted.

Concurrent with resolving this legal dispute, the Public Works Committee is working diligently to advance the project. Our Engineering firm will be presenting revised construction drawings reflecting cost reduction actions approved by the Committee by the end of October. After final review and approval, it is possible that the Project will be rebid based on the revised project scope. In addition, progress continues on the relocation of the Park and Shop sign and finalizing necessary permanent and temporary easements with impacted parties.

Numerous residents have commented their gratitude for the advance work performed on the 2025 paving work performed by our Public Works team, led by **Richard Paul, Jr**. Larger culverts and other grading and seeding were mentioned as huge improvements to storm water control and restoration of impacted areas after paving. Thanks to the whole team!

2026 Village Budget

Finance Director, Brian Lahey, has been coordinating Capital and Operating Budget meetings with the finance committee starting in October. Each year it is a challenge to balance the budget and sustain the high level of services expected by residents. The Committee does an excellent job reviewing the needs of all departments and providing feedback to staff to consider alternatives and how to continue to leverage technology to reduce waste and inefficiency. Work will continue through November and meeting dates are published on the website for anyone interested in attending. These workshops provide the community an opportunity to participate in understanding the scope and cost of services provided by the Village and supported by your tax dollars.

Caroline Heights Update

Final review of the storm water management plan is still pending. The Village's outside engineering firm will be providing guidance and any suggested updates towards the end of the October. Presently, the final building under construction has temporary occupancy approved for up to 60 units. The final occupancy will not be granted until all punch list items and storm water issues are resolved.

Other Community News

- Logan Kein, the Village's Recreation Manager, will be departing in November for a new opportunity offering a larger role and better options for career advancement. Logan has worked tirelessly to improve the recreation and special events coordinated by the Village and we wish him well.
- Sarah Muench, the Village's Library Director for many years will be retiring at the start of the new year. The Village was fortunate to have such a passionate supporter of the library and its many programs. We wish Sarah all the best in this new adventure.
- Congratulations to deputy police chief
 Ryan Unger on his graduation from
 the FBI National Academy. This
 highly competitive 3-month course will
 support the departments continuous
 improvement and high level of service.

In October, the Village of Elm Grove's Police, Fire, EMS and Public Works teams were recognized by the State Assembly for the outstanding community service provided during the August 9th historic floods. Well-deserved recognition for the entire team!

Elm Grove Residents: Adopt Your Drain! By the Elm Grove Beautification Committee

We are now almost three months out from the devasting rains that affected our community in August. But ongoing action and preparedness doesn't stop. Despite that event being called a 500-year event, it doesn't mean it'll happen only once every 500 years. Just that it has a 0.2% chance of happening each year based on floodplain modeling predictions.

SweetWater (SE Wisconsin Watersheds Trust) was formed to help restore the Greater Milwaukee watersheds to conditions that are healthy for swimming and fishing and to assist municipalities in assuring compliance with WI DNR MS4 (Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System) permit.

Adopting a Drain is one of the easiest actions that residents can take to be an active participant in the health and well-being of our community.

Did you know?

- There are 190 drains on the Adopt Your Drain map for Elm Grove.
- There might be a drain in front of your house that isn't on the map—reach out on their website to get it added so that you can adopt it!
- Keeping an eye on the storm drain near you helps minimize flooding and decrease pollution.
- It takes seconds each week to monitor your drain
- If there is trash, leaves, road salt, or anything other than rain water about to enter your drain—it takes minutes to remove it.
- The online form that allows tracking of removed items takes less than one minute to complete.



- Underwood Creek, the body of water that flows through Elm Grove and connects to the Menomonee River and then Lake Michigan gets an overall water quality grade of a C- with failing grades in three monitored categories—bacteria, phosphorus, and conductivity.
- All storm drains lead directly into Underwood Creek and are NOT filtered or treated.

Volunteers Strive to Remove Buckthorn at Park Will you join in that effort? By Tyler Beckley

Over the last five years, the Beautification Committee along with community volunteers have been working diligently to remove common and glossy buckthorn from the village park, along with invasive honeysuckles, invasive euonymus species, and invasive autumn olive. Common buckthorn has unfortunately overtaken significant portions of the 79-acre park. In 2023, the Beautification Committee started using herbicide to treat the cuts stumps, which has allowed them to make significant progress in the last two years. The final goal is to make the park buckthorn-free and after that routinely monitor and survey it to ensure removal of seedlings.

Since the removal of buckthorn started, they've seen species returning to the area as the buckthorn is cleared. These include gray dogwood, oak seedlings, shagbark hickory seedlings, marsh marigold, Virginia bluebells, mayapples, purple meadow rue, and starry Solomon's plume.

Native plants are super important because they are crucial for supporting the wildlife that lives around the park. They are an

important food source for insects, which in turn are important food sources for the birds and small mammals that live in and visit the park. So, as the buckthorn dissipates and the plant variety increases, the Beautification Committee expects to see corresponding gains in ecological health and an abundance of wildlife.

The Beautification Committee is looking for volunteers to help with their work sessions each Sunday. Sessions are only one hour out of your day and are open to anyone-no special training required. Fall offers one of the most effective windows for buckthorn removal as it is easy to identify being one of the few species that holds onto its leaves very late in the year. Additionally, treating the cambium layer of the cut stump allows minimal herbicide use.

Sustained volunteer involvement is essential to continuing this work and protecting the long-term health of our village park. With each cleared section, we see the return of native species that support a healthier, more balanced ecosystem.



My bill had a hearing in the state senate last legislative session, and has been included in the Governor's state budget proposal in the past, so I am hoping we can soon gain the bipartisan support to sign this bill into law!

In addition to passing legislation to support small businesses, it's also important to be tracking the challenges Wisconsin small businesses are facing. Right now, we are hearing concerns about tariffs, healthcare, and childcare.

TARIFFS

Small businesses are getting hit hard right now by tariffs, and these tariffs impact both the small businesses directly, and the consumers who rely on them. Tariffs are raising costs and creating uncertainties for small business owners, increasing consumer prices, and forcing business owners to make hard decisions about their workforce. Wisconsin is a small business state, and when tariffs hit small businesses, tariffs hit Wisconsinites.

Wisconsin businesses and consumers purchased \$38.9B in goods imported from other countries in 2024, and those goods are going to be more expensive as we enter the holiday season. Some estimates show that since April, Wisconsin small businesses have already paid almost \$622 million in tariffs. I am actively working with my colleagues to address the financial pain facing Wisconsinites, and am certainly mindful of the approaching holiday season and how it affects small businesses and consumers.

HEALTHCARE

Many small businesses rely on the Affordable Care Act (ACA) for access to health insurance. There is a lot of uncertainty and concern right now about changes to the ACA: 300,000 Wisconsinites are likely to be impacted by Congressional Republicans' plan to end ACA premium tax credits that help make health insurance affordable, meaning that they will face surging premium costs or lose coverage altogether. For those living in Congressman Scott Fitzgerald's district, ACA premiums are estimated to increase an average of \$1,224 annually starting January 1st.3 These increases will hit small businesses-and the families that rely on them-especially hard, which is why 87% of small business owners want ACA tax credits to be made permanent.4

CHILDCARE

A lack of affordable childcare makes it even harder for businesses to attract and retain workers, and to juggle their own precious families with the demands of running their business. I will continue to advocate at the Capitol for access to affordable, quality childcare.



We're Team Alpha Geek, an FLL (FIRST Lego League) Challenge team of 4th, 5th, 7th, and 8th graders from Burleigh Elementary and Pilgrim Park MS.

Every season, FLL releases a theme to solve a real-world problem. This year's theme involves problems archaeologists face. We went to places like Aztalan, the Milwaukee Public Museum, and the Madison Archaeology Laboratory to conduct further research on problems archaeologists face. Archaeologists face the time-consuming problem of sorting potsherds and reconstructing them without a guide. We zoomed with an archaeologist researching in Greece to gain further insight.

Sherds are vital to archaeology because their durability provides insights into ancient diets and trade routes. Our solution is the Phoenix! The Phoenix is a robot that will help archaeologists sort pottery sherds using 2D imaging and LIBS, Laser-Induced Breakdown Spectroscopy, data. This innovative solution is a friend to all archaeologists!!

Additionally, each season, teams must build a Lego Technic Robot to solve as many of the 15 missions in 150 seconds. Our robot is really cool—it has attachments on 3 sides and is assisting us with achieving a maximum score of 350 points! Our 4th-year team is heading to Regionals in early November.






