

An Inside Look at Waukesha County Government

When I wrote my last article for the Elm Grove News-Independent, it was shortly after the spring elections. The Waukesha County Board was in a transition period between the last meeting for the old County Board's term of office and the first meeting for the new County Board's term of office. During this time the board is completely dissolved, a new board is constructed, and new committee appointments are made. At that time, I did not know to which committees I would be appointed. I am happy to report that I have once again been placed on the Finance **Committee and the Human Resources** Committee. In addition, I have been appointed to the Park and Planning Commission. I have a tremendous amount of respect for the individuals I serve with, and I am proud to represent you on the Waukesha County Board, its committees, and its commissions.

In this and future articles I would like to spend some time discussing some of the services and benefits provided by the Waukesha County Government.

About three years ago, Waukesha County and the City of Milwaukee jointly created a Materials Recovery Facility (MRF). The purpose of the facility is to collect, process and sell recyclables. Unlike previous recycling efforts where residents were required to separate their recyclables into paper, aluminum, glass, and plastic, this facility is a single-stream processor. In other words, MRF does the

sorting and separating for you. By making the process easier for the residents, it was hoped we would recycle more. The goal was to make enough money in the sale of recyclables to pay for the facility and its operation, and to set aside cash for plant and equipment repairs and upgrades. If any surplus cash was generated, it would be returned to the counties. Additionally, Waukesha communities would pay less to dispose of garbage, because they would be sending less to the landfill.

The cost to get the \$16 million facility up and going was split between Waukesha County (\$7 million) and the City of Milwaukee (\$9 Million). Within Waukesha County, 27 out of 37 communities participate in the recycling program. You may remember when this transition took place; it was when they took away the little blue recycle bins and replaced them with the larger recycling barrels.

Since then, the facility has proven its worth. Using the simplified single-stream process, tonnage of recycled product has increased 44% in Waukesha County. The increased recycled volume means more product to sell, allowing the facility to cover its costs and plan for normal maintenance, repairs and equipment replacement. Additionally, the facility turned a profit in each of the past three years, and that profit was returned to the participating communities in the form of a dividend.

The total 2018 Waukesha County

Recycling Dividend was over \$1,750,000 with each participating community receiving its dividend. Elm Grove's dividend was \$52,343, and Brookfield received \$228,682. Two factors determine the size of a community's dividend: the number of tons of recycled material sent to the facility, and the recycling rate (percentage of tons recycled to total tons of garbage).

The City of Brookfield sent the largest tonnage to the recycling facility (4,289 tons), where the much smaller Village of Elm Grove sent 743 tons. Both Elm Grove and Brookfield had about the same recycling rate of just under 30%. That recycling rate ranked Brookfield and Elm Grove at numbers five and six respectively. The Village of Lac La Belle had the highest recycling rate of 39.1%, and the Village of Eagle had the lowest recycling rate of 19.7%.

The recycling rate is the second factor in determining the size of a community's dividend. Using Vernon as an example, Vernon's tonnage recycled (809) was greater than Elm Grove's (743). However, Vernon's dividend was only \$40,852, almost \$12,000 less then Elm Grove's dividend. This lower dividend is because Vernon's recycling rate (24.7%) was lower than Elm Grove's (29.5%).

The recycling dividend is a nice benefit that helps keep property taxes **down.** Additionally, there is an even larger benefit that should not be overlooked. The

tons of trash not sent to the landfill (at \$45-50 per ton) is an expense of about \$35,000 that was avoided. The change from a cost of about \$35k to a dividend of about \$52k, represents a total dollar impact of about \$87,000 for Elm Grove alone.

If you were ever curious about what happens to your recycling after you set it out for pick-up, the Materials Recovery Facility located at 1313 W. Mount Vernon Ave. will have an Open House with 30-minute tours on September 22 at 10 a.m., 11 a.m., 1 p.m., and 2 p.m. The tour is appropriate for those 5th grade and up, and a 35-person limit on each tour. Check the Milwaukee Materials Recovery web site for more details.

The Material Recycling Facility is working to all of our benefit and, at almost 30% recycling rate, we can give ourselves a collective pat on the back. However, as Lac La Belle's 39% recycling rate demonstrates, improvements can be made. We should challenge ourselves to do even better.

Potential home buyers viewing homes in Elm Grove are often surprised to learn that the beautiful home they are considering has its own water well, iron filter and water softener. And it is not unheard of for Village Hall staff to receive a telephone call from a new resident seeking help for water issues. Most of the structures in Elm Grove either have their own well or are part of a "community well" like the Marian Heights subdivision area around St. Mary's Church. For a metropolitan suburban community, especially a prestigious one like Elm Grove, this is pretty rare.

In 2010 the Village Board evaluated construction of a Village wide water system development, but that effort was dropped due to lack of resident support.

The Village did recently construct a limited municipal water system on Elm Grove Road south to Bluemound Road which receives water and services from the City of Brookfield. This small start to a possible Village wide system was prompted by the development of the Heritage Senior Living facility on Wall Street. Some of the homes and apartments along Elm Grove Road and on Bluemound took the opportunity to connect to the new system.

I frequently hear from homeowners and condominium members who want the Village to reconsider the concept of developing a plan to extend a water system through downtown and into the neighborhoods. What do you think? Send me an email at npalmer@elmgrovewi.org

In the meantime, homeowners and businesses should consider the advice to have their well water tested for contaminants.

The Waukesha County Division of Environmental Health encourages private well owners to test wells annually or after modifying them in any way. Wells should also be tested when any change in taste, odor or appearance is noticed. You will need a water sample kit that includes a sterile bottle, detailed instructions for collecting the sample and a lab reporting Our state-certified laboratory can analyze your water sample for bacteriological contamination and/or one or more chemical tests including nitrate, fluoride, hardness, chloride and iron. Private laboratories also provide these https://www.waukeshacounty. services. gov/watertest

The Elm Grove Downtown Master Plan effort being facilitated by SEH consultants has been meeting with Village business and building owners after an area tour. The Master Plan will help guide Village development consideration in the future.

Past Times: I REMEMBER...

Elm Grove's First Home to Have Electricity

This year, an historic village home is celebrating its centennial year. The former **John** and **Margaret Reinders** residence at 13550 Watertown Plank Road was built in 1918, one hundred years ago. Its story, a cornerstone in the Reinders family saga, is one well worth telling.

Most village residents know that the Reinders clan ranks among Elm Grove's founding families. **Gerhard Reinders** came to the United States in 1850, shortly after the failed European revolutions of 1848. He, along with thousands of other German emigres of the era, became known as "Actundvierzigers" (48ers). Most of them had simply been on the wrong side of the prevailing forces in their native states. They sailed to a new life in faraway America.

Settling originally in southern Milwaukee County at Oak Creek, Gerhard Reinders subsequently drove his cattle over fifteen miles to a homestead north of Blue Mound Road in the Town of Brookfield. He commenced farming near present day Longwood Avenue. Former village resident **Mark Birnschein** remembers playing as a boy amid the remnants of Gerhard Reinders' farm just south of Watertown Plank Road in the early 1950s. (Several years ago, a resident on Longwood Avenue accidently uncovered Gerhard's original well.)

Gerhard's son, John Reinders, married Margaret Reitter in 1886 and joined her family in running a general store on the east banks of the Underwood Creek. He assumed ownership of the business the following year, renaming it Reinders' General Merchandise. In 1887, **President Grover Cleveland** appointed him as Elm Grove's Postmaster. He served in that capacity until 1915. During those years, the Elm Grove post office was located inside Reinder's general store. John Reinders developed a reputation for honesty and frugal business management. He and wife Margaret were stalwart members of St. Mary's Visitation parish.

In 1941, John Reinders purchased land from the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railroad along their defunct right-of-way. There, in 1918, he built a bungalow-style home for his family at 13550 Watertown Plank Road, just west of the village business district. This style of home, with its open front porch and spacious front yard, was very popular in the early twentieth century. More interestingly, however, was the fact that it was the first home in Elm Grove to have electricity. It contained examples of the best building techniques of the time, including built-in cabinetry, tasteful stained glass, quality woodwork and leaded glass windows. It also boasted indoor plumbing, something not yet standard in rural communities. In all, the house reflected John Reinders' success in business and his standing in the community.

Retiring from active management of his business in 1926, he turned operations over to his three sons: **George**, **Roland** and **Clarence**. His wife Margaret passed on in 1936, and John followed in 1944 at age 89. His funeral Mass was attended by friends, family, neighbors and longtime customers.

The Reinders family sold the cozy bungalow home in 1951 to **William** and **Clara Darling**. The property comprised 50,660 square feet, including the residence, a garage and a large tool and garden shed. Those readers who remember the Darlings

may recall that Mr. Darling was an avid gardener, especially proud of the large pumpkin patch in his back yard. The soil in the yard seemed overly amenable to pumpkins, and each fall the Darlings harvested quite a large crop of that colorful autumn favorite. I well remember the drive on the west side of the Darling property filled with various sizes and shapes of pumpkins, all for sale just in time for Hallowe'en. Each year, my Dad would drive us over to Mr. Darling's home, parking along Katharine Drive. Together, we would pick out a couple of suitable candidates to carve into jack-o'lanterns. Our old family tradition endured the decades.

In the early 1980s, my wife **Janice** and I in the early years of our marriage still purchased pumpkins from Mr. Darling to dress up our front porch in the fall. The *Elm Leaves* newspaper even published a nice photograph of the Darling pumpkin harvest at that time, calling his annual sale an Elm Grove "tradition". But, sadly, one year Janice and I noticed that Mr. Darling had grown no pumpkins for us to buy.

William Darling died in 1987. Clara Darling sold the property to Elm Grove attorney **Ed Rudolph**, who had a law office on Legion Drive. He bought the property as an investment, and subsequently divided it into two separate lots of 25,330 square feet apiece, with the garage abutting the back of the newly-established lot line.

In 1989, he sold the home and the southern lot to tax attorney Don DiDio, whom he knew professionally. A graduate of Dartmouth University with a law degree from the University of Wisconsin - Madison, DiDio held advanced degrees from Georgetown University and had worked for the Internal Revenue Service in Washington D.C. After buying the old Reinders home from Ed Rudolph, he opened a law office in the front of the home, as well as residing there. Don DiDio passed away unexpectedly in April, 2018, and his estate subsequently placed the home on the market. Realty Executives indicates that at this writing a sale of the property is pending. It will be interesting for us to see what the next chapter in the century-long saga of this historic village home will be.



Oktoberfest 2018 — Saturday, September 29

Elmbrook Senior Taxi, Inc. is providing more than 10,000 rides annually for seniors and adults with disabilities in the City and Town of Brookfield as well as the Villages of Elm Grove and Butler. Our mission is to promote an independent lifestyle for those we serve by providing safe, reliable and affordable transportation. We are very proud of the services we have provided since 1993 so that these special residents maintain their quality of life.

We take seniors to the grocery store, doctor appointments, hair appointments, social occasions, to work, to the Senior Center, etc. We drive adults with special needs to work and activities. For example, for over 20 years, we drove an adult with special needs to Sendiks (previously Grasch's) on North Avenue and Lilly Road to work and home 3 to 4 times per week.

We doubled the number of rides we provide in the last few years, from 500

rides per month to 1,000 rides in April of this year. This required investments in both our operational structure and our cars. We currently own a fleet of 4 cars and are finding that we need a 5th car to keep up with demand. We are a 501(c) (3) non-profit organization subsidized by Waukesha County and the communities we serve. As budgets become tight, subsidies have not kept up with demand and we are more dependent on community members for support.

Our 25th Anniversary is this year and we are celebrating by hosting a Wine Tasting/Fundraiser on October 25 at the Elm Grove Woman's Club. We are expecting 200 people to attend and local leaders will be among the speakers. Our goal is to raise \$25,000 towards the purchase of a 5th car (gently used) and the cost of insurance for one year. This will address our growing need for service. Safety Village is a five-day safety education program that emphasizes traffic, fire, and personal safety procedures in accordance with National Safety Town Guidelines. Legal Issues

Estate Planning: Vacation Properties

Whether it is a lake home, a cottage in the woods or hunting land, vacation properties can be the source of your family's best memories. However, if you are lucky enough to own such a property, you need to decide what will happen to it after you die, otherwise it could drive a wedge between your family members.

Begin by determining what your goal is for the property. Do you want it to remain in the family or are you okay with it being sold? If it is to remain in the family, are you willing to transfer full or part ownership of the property during your lifetime, or only after your death? Consult an attorney as to not only what legal steps need to be taken for either option, but also what the tax consequences would be to both you and your children. Lastly, discuss what form of ownership, such as a trust or LLC, would be the best manner for multiple family members to own the property together.

Once you have made some decisions and have the necessary information, have a meaningful discussion with your children. Find out who actually wants the property. What they have to say might surprise you. One or more of your children might enjoy visiting the property now, but may not have interest in it after you are gone. Another may simply live too far away, or may not be in a financial position to take on the taxes, insurance and maintenance of the property.

Lastly, once you decide who will receive the property, you must also decide whether your other children will receive something else from your estate instead. When everything has been addressed and decided, follow through with any necessary legal work. Working through these matters with your family will require effort. However, a successful transition of your vacation property to the next generation will be well worth it.

Brookfield Academy Student Improves Nature Trail By Marie O'Brien

Brookfield Academy Primary School students have the benefit of exploring a nature trail alongside their playground but with wear and tear the area needed restoration.
