We started our journey with data: In April, 11 Village residents conducted a trash audit at JOHN's Disposal facility in Franksville. We sorted an average day's worth of Elm Grove garbage into 8 categories, then weighed each category to understand what our trash stream looks like.

The results were eye-opening, and we invite you to take action with us:

\*Food waste was the largest divertible category at 18%. We've partnered with Waste Not, LLC to bring a composting service right to your door for only \$3.50/ week. It takes just 30 seconds to sign up online at www.wastenotcompost.org and get started today!

\*Plastic bags/film made up 3.9% of Elm Grove trash by weight – that's a lot of bags! These shouldn't be placed in curbside recycling because they jam the recycling

\*Clothing/textiles made up 3.4% of Elm Grove trash, which in a year adds up to 57 tons going into the landfill. Stav tuned for details on where you can drop off clothing/ textiles locally for reuse and recycling.

# Village Update

Trust everyone has enjoyed summer and are ready for school to start in September. Speaking of school, let's be extra careful with additional bus traffic and children in walkways. Take time to check crosswalks for bikes and pedestrians for everyone's safety.

Village Park Activities. Plan to attend the 8th annual Elm Grove Oktoberfest on September 15th and 16th. Plenty of fun activities are planned rain or shine. Thank you to the Elm Grove Community Foundation for hosting this fun event and the many volunteers!


Caroline Heights Construction. Construction activities are planned to commence after Labor Day. First actions taking place will include the construction of the water main under Watertown Plank Road and the demolition of buildings on the work site. Water main construction will progress east from about 124th Street and extend past Church Street. Construction is expected to take about two- and-ahalf months and will result in a detour of traffic to facilitate safety and expedite construction progress. Many detour routes were discussed and the route selected will direct traffic at 124th Street to proceed north on 124th to Elmhurst Parkway. Head west on Elmhurst to Legion Drive and then south back to Watertown Plank Road. Additional temporary stop signs will be placed at Legion Drive and Elmhurst Parkway. With over 15,000 vehicles using Watertown Plank daily, this route was deemed the safest and best for traffic flow by Police and Public Works leaders. Regular updates will be provided on the Elm Grove website (www.elmgrovewi.org). Additional signs will be placed during the construction period to help communicate that businesses continue to operate and need your continued support.

Resident Feedback. A topic raised by numerous residents is the traffic speeds within the Village. This is not in an isolated location and with the help of the Elm Grove Community Foundation a new speed trailer has been purchased to help communicate driver's speed. In addition, the Board, with significant input from the Public Safety Committee, will be reviewing best practices and any further actions at an upcoming Committee of the Whole meeting.

Transportation Fund Priorities. The Committee of the Whole (COW) reviewed pathway cost estimates at its August meeting. Revised estimates for the Highland Drive pathway from North Avenue to Gebhardt Road exceed initial estimates by approximately \$100,000. In addition, preliminary estimates were reviewed for extending the pathway to Juneau Boulevard. The ad-hoc Pathway Committee will be reviewing this information and engage in providing updated feedback to the Board. In addition, road ratings will be completed in September and 2024 paving priorities reviewed by the Public Works Committee.

Recreation Committee. The Recreation Committee has been reviewing the overall needs of the Village and has recommended that a comprehensive review be performed to define the needs for the Village. This study will engage with residents and inventory all recreation resources within the Village. This is an important project as it will facilitate applications for grants to maintain and expand the services available in the Village. In addition, priorities have been identified to reconstruct the Village Park basketball court and procure and install a second diving board in 2024.

Finance Committee. The Finance Committee requested an updated review of the Caroline Heights financial forecast



and impact on the Village be prepared by Ehlers, our financial consultants, on the TID. The update did highlight changes in the market including the expected cost to the Village resulting from increased interest cost on the financial support provided to the project. The review included an assessment of Mandel's financial capacity to support the project and any impact of expanded vacancies or other economic stresses on the project. This updated review indicated that the increased cost to the Village will approximate \$2,500,000. This will push out the time when financial benefit from the project will be available to the Village by about 2 years. The Finance Committee also kicked off the 2024 budget process in August and open meetings will be held in October.

Gebhardt Road reconstruction. The project is proceeding forward on time. The contractor is working to have asphalt paving completed before September 15th. Thank you again to the residents for your patience and understanding.



# **Our History:** Remembrances of Things Past

## WHATZZIT?

There was a time, not too long ago, when you could buy, lease or repair a tractor in Elm Grove. The spot to do so was Schumacher Equipment & Hardware, formerly the John Messer Implement Company & McCormick-Deering dealership at 930 Elm Grove Road. Back in the 1950s, there were still a number of active farms in the Elmbrook area and they needed a local licensed dealership to service their machines, sell them a new tractor or equipment when needed or, in a pinch, rent a machine to complete a job that their own "old standby" had started but was unable to finish.

A number of communities in Waukesha County once boasted farm implement dealerships. Elm Grove was no exception. International Harvester (IH) was one of the most trusted suppliers of agricultural implements. Founded in 1902 by the merger of the five largest harvesting and farm equipment manufacturing companies (including the McCormick Harvesting Machine Company of Chicago), it was one of the world's largest industrial corporations. International Harvester franchised nearly 9,000 local dealerships throughout the United States and Canada by the 1950s, making its name a household word for millions throughout North America and the world.

Cyrus Hall McCormick had developed an automatic reaping machine in 1845 that he claimed could do the work of 100 farm hands. He subsequently developed a franchised network of local dealerships to sell his machines, and he created a credit company so that cash-strapped farmers could pay off their purchase, plus interest, over time. Henry Ford, the Dodge brothers and others learned from McCormick and would later market their automobiles in the same way, as is still done today at local car dealerships everywhere.

At one time, the farm trade made up most of Schumacher Hardware's business in Elm Grove. To the south of their building was a display lot of various tractors and agricultural equipment awaiting purchase or rental. Always a fan of antique tractors, I remember stopping several times in the 1960s to look them over. As late as the 1970s, some of the older machines still remained on the property, available if needed.

As Milwaukee's western suburbs began to develop in the post-World War II era, much of Schumacher's business began to turn toward the needs of newly-settled suburbanites. The family firm began to offer a stock of lawn mowers, and rebranded itself as "Your Headquarters for Lawn & Garden Supplies". Harold Schumacher took a seat as Vice-President of the Elm Grove Business Men's Association in 1951, and Schumacher Hardware continued to serve Elmbrook area residents into the 1980s.

In 1984, the property was sold to the Village Bank of Elm Grove and the old hardware building was extensively

remodeled. The Village Bank's tenure was brief, however, as the bank was absorbed by Marshall & Isley (M&I) Bank and the building was subsequently sold to Woller-Anger & Company insurance in 1990. At present, it houses Woller-Anger, a Relation Company. The old tractor lot to the south is now a parking lot for customers, but sometimes hosts a few classic cars during Cruisin' the Grove events. I'd like to see an antique tractor join the fun on occasion, just for old times' sake.

## Elm Grove to Begin Village-Wide Plastic Bag and Plastic Film Recycling

There is so much confusion surrounding plastic bags. These bags usually have an imprint that says recyclable, but Elm Grove's curbside recycling program cannot accept them. Some stores in our area offer plastic bag recycling receptacles, but those receptacles are not consistently available. Throwing bags away means they will take 10-20 years to decompose. Sadly, plastic bags in our curbside recycling are re-routed to the landfill.

Why can't we put plastic bags in our recycling bins? They damage single-sort recycling machines, which adds to the overall cost of recycling. Furthermore, damaged machines can injure recycling employees.

How big is this problem in Elm Grove? In April, a group of village residents headed to Johns Disposal's Franksville facility to sort

through a portion of Elm Grove's garbage as part of a "trash audit."

We found that 3.9% of our trash's weight was made up of plastic bags. On an annualized basis, this would be 132,600 pounds of plastic going to the landfill. While at the facility, we were stunned to see plastic bags flying through the air after the recycling sorting machine rejected them.

Starting September 1, Elm Grove will partner with NexTrex (nextrex.com) to collect plastic bags and film and then convert those to plastic benches.

#### Drop-off receptacles (like the one shown above) are located at Sendik's, Tonawanda, Elliott's ACE Hardware, and Elm Grove Village Hall.

#### Other spots may be added.

How does this work? Please bring your *clean* and *empty* plastic bags to these drop-off locations. Acceptable materials include: plastic bags, bread bags, Ziploc bags, bubble wrap (even Amazon plastic packages!), salt and ice bags, newspaper bags, case overwrap, dry-cleaning bags. Remember this: if the plastic is "stretchy," it's good to recycle!

Unacceptable materials include: candy wrappers, frozen food bags, chip bags, net or mesh bags, compostable bags, pre-wash salad bags, six-pack rings, lamination film, shower curtains, shiny or crinkly film, bedding or linen packaging, and pet food bags. Unacceptable plastic is often "crinkly."

While the overall goal is to reduce our usage of plastic bags, let's properly dispose of our plastic bags in this new recycling program.


