Village Update

Elm Grove now has guidelines and rules to allow you to raise chickens at home. Two different Village Board committees and the Planning Commission researched the rules and ordinances of other communities and reviewed the guidance of the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture and Consumer Affairs. The new rules allow homeowners to obtain a permit to keep up to four (4) female chickens for personal use if proper facilities are approved. Roosters are not allowed. You can review the regulations and application process on the Village website: www.elmgrovewi.org.

The Mandel Development Company has submitted a conceptual plan for redevelopment of the property owned by the School Sisters of Notre Dame (SSND.) The new concept proposal reflects numerous changes from the initial plans shared with neighbors and community groups at the beginning of the year. The number of proposed apartments has been reduced, rental townhouses have been replaced by proposed single family homes and the traffic access has been changed. The submitted plan includes a comprehensive traffic impact analysis concluding minimal traffic impacts.

The site plan preserves the historic Notre Dame and Maria Hall buildings and maintains significant open space and mature trees. The new buildings are sited to create an interior "village green" area with a swimming pool and other resident facilities. Mandel also proposes to naturalize the southern end of the property and develop walking trails.

Consideration of the Mandel / School Sisters proposal will begin with a presentation of the Conceptual Plan by Mandel at the September 14th Planning Commission meeting. The purpose of this initial meeting is only to determine if the proposal meets basic planning and zoning requirements and should be allowed to move forward into a detailed review

process. Members of the public will be able to comment on the proposal in person or in writing. If the Conceptual Proposal moves forward there will numerous future meetings of the Planning Commission, Building Board, Village Board committees and the Village Board to consider numerous detailed issues before a final consideration of approval or denial.

There are a great many other details included in the Conceptual Proposal. I encourage interested residents to study the submittal, follow Village meetings on Zoom or the Live Stream or even by attending (space is limited for in person attendance.) If you have questions you can submit them to Village staff or Trustees by email or telephone. The process is transparent and open for all to follow and participate in.

It is election time again. The November 3, 2020 election includes the Presidential, Congressional and State races. In mid-September, the Village will begin mailing out absentee ballots for those who have requested them. If you want to vote absentee rather than in-person you can request a ballot online at: https://myvote.wi.gov. Or you can stop at Village Hall and request an absentee ballot. If you choose to vote by absentee ballot please send your ballot back as soon as possible.

In-person early voting at Village Hall will begin October 20, 2020 and end October 30, 2020.

Also remember that if you are inclined to put up yard signs to support candidates or causes that you are not allowed to place signs in the public right of way along roadways.

The Firstfruits Center is organization located in the Village Court building at 890 Elm Grove Road, along Wall Street behind the BMO Harris Bank. Firstfruits is dedicated to helping women on their



unique path to a meaningful, lived faith. They offer programming to help spiritually nourish women in an accepting environment, whether they seek to awaken, deepen, or expand their relationship with God. As part of carrying out a lived faith they are partnering with the MacCanon Brown Homeless Sanctuary for a FOOD DRIVE on Sunday, September 13th from 11:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. Food will be collected in the parking lot in front of the Village Court building. There should be plenty of time to stop by before kickoff of the Packer game. Enter from Wall Street.

The MacCanon Brown Homeless Sanctuary offers a safe space and resources to the homeless and at-risk members of the Milwaukee Community. The Sanctuary is asking for the following critically needed items: Canned beef, chicken Spam, tuna, SpaghettiOs, mac & cheese, Dinty Moore canned stew, baked beans, and Vienna sausages... 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The Elm Grove Beautification Committee's annual Tree Sale is underway!

The Beautification Committee Tree Sale was initiated almost 20 years ago due to the massive loss of Elm trees throughout the village to Dutch Elm disease and was titled, "Put the Elm Back in Elm Grove". And now, with the recent Emerald Ash borer insect causing devastating losses of Ash trees, we are more in need of replacement trees to assure we do not lose the iconic tree cover that Elm Grove is so noted for.

With aid from the village forester to ensure compliance with the International Society for Arboriculture guidelines for municipalities, we were able to expand tree selection to 5 species this year.



Unfortunately, extensive tree losses are nation-wide pushing the demand for trees and therefore dramatically increasing prices. However, the committee was able to procure an order for 5- and 6-foot bare root trees that will be delivered in Spring of 2021 for immediate planting upon pick-up.

The trees being offered include: Accolade Elm, Autumn Blaze Maple, River Birch, Chinkapin Oak, and Hackberry. Information regarding ideal soil, moisture, sun, and wind requirements along with detailed planting instructions is available on the village website: www.elmgrovewi.org.

We are excited to announce that in conjunction with the Friends of the Elm Grove Library there are two programs scheduled for September 12th at the Village Park at 10:30 a.m. One is a children's tree program being put on by **August Hoppe** from Hoppe Tree Service. The other is an outdoor question and answer session regarding the 5 chosen tree species hosted by **Ron Hill,** our village forester. Come learn more about trees!

For those who cannot squeeze one more tree into their landscaping, we highly encourage you to purchase a tree for the village. You can do your part help support the tree canopy and tree diversity within our village. Just fill out the order form and annotate "For the Village" anywhere on the form. Past Times: I REMEMBER

I Remember...The Enduring Legacy of the School Sisters of Notre Dame

We've all heard the story. Mother Caroline Friess, after arriving in Milwaukee from Bavaria, rode west from the city on horseback in 1855. She was prayerfully searching for a proper spot to found a convent and an orphanage. Her journey along the recently completed Watertown Plank Road abruptly ended when her horse reached a fork in the road. The plank road jutted to the southwest while an intersecting graded path (now Juneau Blvd.) continued straight west. Mother Caroline's horse (confused, tired or divinely inspired) refused to proceed further. She took this as a sign from heaven that this was the location that God had chosen. It was on the eastern edge of the crossroads settlement of Elm Grove in the Town of Brookfield.

The School Sisters have remained a part of the fabric of the Elm Grove community for the past 165 years. Now the Sisters are preparing to embark on a new chapter in their Order's long history. They will be relocating to the campus of Mount Mary University. While it is sad to contemplate their absence from the village, it is also a good time to reflect on what they have meant to the area residents and families over the years. Hopefully, much will be written in the next few months chronicling the Sisters' tenure in Waukesha County, but in the meantime, I wanted to offer a more personal remembrance of their sojourn here. My reflections are my own, and surely many would have others to share.

By way of disclosure, I am not Catholic. I am a Methodist. My grandfather and great-grandfather were Methodist ministers. While growing up in Elm Grove, it did not take me long to realize that I lived in a very Catholic community. The size of St. Mary's Visitation parish dwarfed the other three church congregations (Methodist, Lutheran and Episcopal) in the village. As a boy, almost all of my best friends were Catholic. It was quite easy in those days to slip into the overall Catholic ethos of the community. For my part, I never detected much Catholic vs. protestant rivalry, and much of that good fortune was due to the affability of our neighbors, the public spirit of our clergy, and the firm but peaceful demeanor of the School Sisters of Notre Dame.

This is not to say that the School Sisters couldn't be tough when the situation called for it. I remember well an incident from the Spring of 1964. My friend **Dick Schouten** and I had finished our 6th grade classes at Leland School and walked over to the lunch counter at the Elm Grove Pharmacy for a bowl of French fries and a couple of Cokes. For kids that age, French fries present virtually unlimited possibilities. We quickly discovered they made excellent swords, walrus tusks, vampire fangs and Martian antennae. This caught the attention of one of the School Sisters. She had apparently finished her teaching duties at St. Mary's school and was sitting at the lunch counter with a folder of class papers and an afternoon cup of coffee. Annoyed by our antics, she got up from her stool and calmly walked over to our end of the counter. She rapped (hard) on the edge of our bowl of fries. "This is a place for civilized people to eat, not for horsing around," she scolded. "You boys finish up your meal and get on your way. Surely you have homework to do." Neither Dick nor I were students at St. Mary's, but that didn't matter. "Yes, Sister," we replied and proceeded to tend to the business at hand. Like the other School Sisters, she saw herself as a guardian of the public tranquility and Dick and I had been guilty of a minor breach

This sort of intervention did not rankle. Rather, it affirmed the fact that we were a part of a community that was kindlyintentioned but well ordered. It meant that we were secure because people were watching out for us. I can still see two Sisters walking together across the railroad tracks toward the Notre Dame convent after a visit to Hettiger's card shop or the Ben Franklin Five & Dime in the Elm Grove Park & Shop. (They still wore the traditional habit in the 1960s.) Years later, I recall offering a ride to a Sister who had just finished her medical appointment at Dr. Stephen Haughey's office on Legion Drive. "I'll say a prayer for you," she told me as she got out of my car at the convent.

The sense of moral commitment to the welfare of the village took many forms. When Peyton Place, Grace Metalious's steamy novel of sex and sin in suburbia was published in the mid-1950s, Monsignor Leonard Lieven, pastor of St. Mary's Visitation parish, made it clear to the Phillips family, owners of Elm Grove Pharmacy, that the paperback edition should not be stocked. It was, it can now be told, sold under the counter by request anyway. "But don't tell Monsignor," the clerk would whisper with a wink. My mother secured a copy this way, but never finished it, discarding it and calling it "trash". It would be considered quite mild by today's standards, to say the least.

Fr. John Arens, assistant pastor at St. Mary's, had similar feelings about Mad magazine. When my neighbor Bob Janicki and I went to the Elm Grove Pharmacy looking to purchase a copy as youngsters we were told, "We don't carry that magazine. Father Arens doesn't think it's right for boys your age." At eight years old, I would have disagreed, but looking back at the double entendre humor and ribald drawings that filled its pages, I can see his point in retrospect. However, it would also be very tame by the standards of the 2020s.

While the above two instances do not directly relate to the School Sisters, they do point out the extent to which Elm Grove's community life was intertwined with the faith community at St. Mary's school, St. Mary's Visitation Parish and the School Sisters of Notre Dame convent. In those days, it was an inseparable part of the village's public milieu. The Sisters' contribution to this has continued in various forms through the present day.

It is pleasant now to remember the semiannual recorder concerts offered to the public and led by Sister Rita Schweitzer, first at the Holy Family Chapel at the convent and later at the atrium at St. Mary's Visitation. For those who may remember "Sweetwinds" instruction in grade school music classes, I must assure readers that this was no such humble affair. Sister Rita led her Notre Dame Recorder Consort musicians through a varied selection of medieval airs, classical pieces, ethnic melodies and contemporary tunes. Alto, bass, soprano and tenor recorders were featured. The versatility of such simple instruments was amazing, as those attending these free public concerts would

I am also reminded of the generosity and hospitality displayed by the Sisters in offering public tours of their beautiful convent and grounds to those who expressed an interest. School groups, families, tourists and individual residents were invited to explore the history, architecture and faith community of the Sisters' home. The tours were led by **Sister** Eileen McKeever and, later, by Sister Marie Estelle Kuczynski. They were adept in explaining to visitors much of the background behind the establishment and long tenure of the convent. Of special interest was "the Castle", the Bavarianstyled older portion of the campus, built in part by a donation from King Ludwig I of Bavaria who was interested in fostering Catholic mission work in the United States.

Estate Planning: Vacation Properties

Whether it is a lake home, a cottage in the woods or hunting land, vacation properties can be the source of your family's best memories. However, if you are lucky enough to own such a property, you need to decide what will happen to it after you die, otherwise it could drive a wedge between your family members.

Begin by determining what your goal is for the property. Do you want it to remain in the family or are you okay with it being sold? If it is to remain in the family, are you willing to transfer full or part ownership of the property during your lifetime, or only after your death? Consult an attorney as to not only what legal steps need to be taken for either option, but also what the tax consequences would be to both you and your children. Lastly, discuss what form of ownership, such as a trust or LLC, would be the best manner for multiple family members to own the property together. Once you have made some decisions and

have the necessary information, have a meaningful discussion with your children. Find out who actually wants the property. What they have to say might surprise you. One or more of your children might enjoy visiting the property now, but may not have interest in it after you are gone. Another may simply live too far away, or may not be in a financial position to take on the taxes, insurance and maintenance of the property.

Lastly, once you decide who will receive the property, you must also decide whether your other children will receive something else from your estate instead. everything has been addressed and decided, follow through with any necessary legal work. Working through these matters with your family will require effort. However, a successful transition of your vacation property to the next generation will be well

Remember the Farmers Behind the Food

Like many people in agriculture, I was quickly sucked into the television series "Yellowstone" starring Kevin Costner as John Dutton, the patriarch of a large ranching family. Dutton, a rancher out West, fights to keep his rights to ranch and raise cattle while fighting off urban sprawl, all while trying to hold together what remains of his family.

I can't help but to see similarities to how many of us in the dairy community have felt this year. After 4½ years of low milk prices, sluggish markets and trade deals that didn't seem to ever find a conclusion, the worst was behind us. Our year of hope was 2020. The horizon was glimmering with the promise of rising milk prices, secure trade deals and more favorable weather patterns. Then COVID-19 hit.

Overnight the markets reacted to the fear. We saw restaurants and food delivery shut down and people panic-buying at grocery stores. The terms "essential worker" and "safer at home" became regular parts of our language. People in sectors like health care, energy, public safety, communication and information technology, transportation and logistics, and food and agriculture were looked upon to keep going. They were not able to shut down. We also saw demand for fluid milk, blocks of cheese and butter jump. Fearful they wouldn't have enough to go around, stores started to limit the

from their storage facilities to customers as quickly as possible. That meant determining how to repackage food intended for restaurant use ready for retail stores. The whole distribution system basically stopped and changed directions.

All the while, farmers kept farming. Kept milking and caring for their cows. Kept wondering what lie ahead. The future was so uncertain, but we knew we had a country to feed, and now was the time to rise up and meet the challenge with grace. Farmers had low prices thrown at them, requests to dump milk, mandatory herd reduction orders — all reasons to give up. But we clung to hope that the pandemic would only be temporary. That, just as we had done for the past $4\frac{1}{2}$ years, we would persevere and prove that despite all the factors working against us, customers could depend on a consistent and safe supply of food. And we did just that.

As the ranch hand character Lloyd Pierce said in "Yellowstone," (Season 3, Episode 1), "Makes you wonder, who's gonna feed this world when there is none of us left?" Dutton responds with a chuckle, "Nobody, Lloyd. World is just gonna go hungry."

The next time you reach for a container of milk, pound of butter or block of cheese, I encourage you to remember the farmers behind the food. The ones who have ridden out every sort of catastrophe, and are still here. Providing for you.

My friend Tom Ramstack and I participated in one of the last tours of the convent, led by Sister Marie Estelle. It was a bittersweet experience, since it had already been made known that the property was for sale and that the remaining Sisters would be moving. We knew that their time in Elm Grove was growing short. My mind flashed back to my old friend Bob Berndt. A graduate of St. Mary's grade school and a lifelong member of St. Mary's Visitation parish, Bob had known many of the older Sisters as his teachers. When he ran for Elm Grove village trustee in 1979, I chaired his campaign committee. When I suggested that he start gathering signatures of voters on his nominating petitions he told me not to worry. "I can do that in a single afternoon," he told me. "I'm taking

the petitions over to the Sisters." "Because they're your former teachers?", I asked. "No," he replied. "Because they're my friends." Moreover, Bob told me they prayed for him, too.

Remember that the Sister whom I had given a ride home from Dr. Haughey's office had promised to pray for me? I think that the School Sisters have been praying for all of us for a long, long time. Now that they are leaving us (in late 2021, according to the current plan) to enter a new phase in the life of their Order, perhaps it's time for all of us to pray for them. I know that I will.

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
